2,500 RUSSIANS REPORTED DEAD

Unconfirmed Rumor that They Fell in Engagements Between Uniposts on Yalu.

Japan to Take Her Time In Manchuria-Weeks May Elapse Before Decisive Move is

Special to The Planet. London, Feb. 22.—Baron Hayashai, the Japanese minister to Great Bridain, once not credit the report that 2,500 Russians have been killed in an outpost engagement at the Yalu River. He says there is no Japanese lorce in that vicinity large enough

to inflict such a loss.

The latest advice of Baron Hayashai, the Japanese m.nister to Great Britain, lead him to believe that the

Britain, lead him to believe that the Japanese troops may now wait possibly two or three months before undertaking aggressive operations in Manchuria. He said:

"We have found that Russia is so unexpectedly unprepared that I should not be surprised if the Japanese land forces contented themselves with establishing a thorough organization and advancing as the construction of the railroad towards the Yalu River progresses. Russia construction of the railroad towards the Yalu River progresses. Russia appears to be less prepared than was china in 1895. I believe that only three trains a day can be run through Manchuria. Supposing these are equally divided between froops and supplies, as would be necessary, Russia could non perceptibly strengthen her land forces before April.

"Japan's naval coup has been so unexpectedly successful that I rather think bur troops will take their time. The shallow inlets are now frozen over, retarding the disembarkation of our forces. This is especially true at Port Arthur, where a mear landing of troops is impossible owing to the ice."

The only naval development Baron Hayashal expects in the near future is a possible attack on the Japanese fleet by the powerful Russian torpedo flotilla at Port Arthur and hitherto unusued. On the Japanese side, except possible actions against the Russian Vladivostock squadron, the Japanese minister does not look for developments at present, believing that Admiral Togo will be satisfied to keep the disabled Russian squadron prisoners at Port Arthur. The minister credits the Russians with having barely 100,000 troops in Manchuria. Manchuria.

From a reliable quarter the Moraing's Post's Chee Foo correspondent says he learns that tens of thousands of Japanese are advancing by forced marches from various parts of Korea on the Yalu and that severe fighting is expected shortly. These are the only references to actual operations that have reached London.

The Standard's Kiel correspondent hears that the Caucasus and Turkestan armies are to be mobilized. He adds that the rumor is not confirmed officially, but says if it is true it can only be interpreted as a veiled threat against India in certain emergencies.

The correspondent at Tien Tsin of the Standard reports an attack by 500 Chinese "brigands" on the Russian post at Foo Chow as probably an at-tempt to wreck the railway.

PORT ARTHUR OUT OF BEEF AND

VEGETABLES.

Che Foo, Feb. 22.—The Russian authorities insist that there is no truth in the story that a force of 1,000 Japanese landed at Pigeon or Dove bay had been annihilated.

Fout Arthur is said to be entirely out of beef and vegetables, and drawing upon Dalny for a slim supply. Troops are being rushed toward the Yalu with all expedition possible.

The Pronto was sent from Port Arthur to Dalny for refugees, chiefly Japanese women, While leaving Port Arthur, with all lights out, she was fired upon by a Russian cruiser, 15 shots striking her upper works. It was subsequently explained that she was mistaken for a Japanese torpedo boat.

The catrance to Dalny is honeycombed with mimes. Nothing was seen on the passage to this port of either the Russian or Japanese fleets.

The crew of the Tamagawa Maru, which arrived at Shimoneski on Sunday, report that the ship was followed by four warships from a point seven miles off the harbor of Fusan until close to the island of Tsuhima, where the chase was abandoned.

COAL SITUATION

About Fifteen Cars of Coal Received in the City This Morning.

Dealers Said to be to Blame for the Recent Scarcity—Railroads Are Very Active.

The coal situation is much relieved o-day by the arraval of many cars for different dealers about town. The three cars received in the city Saturday morning by J. L. Scott and J. J. Couzens was dealed out to about five hundred families in the city and thus the situation was relieved over

thus the situation was relieved over Sunday.

It was learned yesterday that there were twelve cars of coal for flooal dealers at Fargo, and the L. E. & D. R. R. sent out a special engine to bring it in this morning.

The cars were billed as follows—J. J. Couzens two, Moore & Bensen two, A. Crow four, and J. H. Scott four.

The reilroads took advantage of the break in the weather and ithousands of cars were moved that have been snow-bound for many days. Special attention was given to coal to relieve the distress that has been experienced lately.

BRAKEMAN MET INSTANT DEATH

Fatal Accident on the Lake Erie in Which James' Huchison Lost His Life.

Trains Collided Near Port Lamb ton with Terribie Result Both Brothers met Death on Road.

Another fatal accident occurred on the Lake Erie at Fort Lambton, Sanday morning about half-past five, by which Brakeman James Hutchison, of Walkerville, was instantly killed and Engineer William Gossip slightly injured. One locomotive was completely smashed and a caboose and three freight cars disabled and smashed.

It seems, from all accounts, that the ac-cident was the result of carelessness. The matter will be investigated later by the authorities of the railroad. At Port Lambton the Easthake special was ordered to take the siding in order to allow the double header gerishable extra freight to pass ahead. Here is where the mix up came. Whether the order was misinterpreted or whether the first freight had not time to get out of the way, is not known. The blow came when the Thurlow special came thundering along and crashed into the rear end of the Eastlake special. The double header was running on "pass orders," that is, it had the right of way. A flagman was sent back from the first train to flag the double header. At this point there is a sharp curve and also a very steep

double header. At this point there is a sharp curve and also a very steep grade, and it is supposed that either the flagman did not go back far enough or that the slippery rails and the steep grade prevented the other from stopping in time.

Hutchison was the head brakeman on the double header. At the time of the accident he was riding in the cab of the first engine. When it was seen that the wreck was inevitable both engine crews jumped for their lives with the exception of Hutchison, who, queer to say, remained in his position in the cab. His comrades cunnot understand why he did not jump. He was killed instantaneously. Fortunately, none of the other train's crew were in their van when the crash came. The auxiliary from Chatham was called out, and started for the scene of the wreck in charge of Foreman Wm. Turtle and Trains to K. R. Cameron, of Ridgetown, who happened to be in the city. The track was cleared in a short time and all of the trains from Sarries are on time to

Hutchison, the unfortunate victim of the accident, was 38 years old and married. A widow and a small child are left to mourn his sad and untimely death. He was a brother to the Hutchison who was killed in a similar accident just outside the city on the Lake Erie a few short weeks ago. The news of his death has come as a sudden shock to his family, and it is expected that his father, who is an aged gentleman, will not be able to bear up under this his second affliction.

Mr. Hutchison was a well known and greatly respected railroad man of Walkerville, where he has lived for several years. Mrs. Hutchison and her daughter were visting relatives in Leamington when the accident ocburred. The remains were taken to Walkerville for interment.

FOUL PLAY OR FREEZING?

Wiarton, Ont., Feb., 21.—What appears to be a case of death by freezing or foul play was discovered at Oliphant, six miles west of here this morning. An old lady named Mrs. Cockrane was found dead by her bedside frozen stiff. For years the old lady has lived a secluded and some say a miscrable existence in a little shanty in the woods, She was the possessor of a good bank account, but it was generally supposed she did not keep any of her wealth in the cabin. The severity of the recent storm and her helplessness make it probable that she was the victim of the weather. There was no wood and little to eat, in the house. An inquest will be held.

FRIENDLY WARNING

Says the Hamilton Herald, L'beral; The Laurier Government has no better friend than the Montreal Witness. It is a valuable friend because it does not flatter and fawn, but offers criticism and advice when they are timely and appear to be needed.

The day before the recent bye-elections the Witness spoke up warmly in behalf of the Government, dllating eloquently upon S:r Wilfrid's moble leadership." But the day after the elections, viewing the results, which were anything but satisfactory from a Liberal standpoint, the Witness deemed that the time was opportune for a bit of friendly warning. So it gave that warning. There has been, it admitted, "a gradnal fading of the enthusiasm of oldtime Liberals towards the Liberal party, which has suffered in proportion to the loftiness of the hopes with which they hailed its long-deferred advent to power." And the reasons for this fading of the ioldtime enthusiasm are thus pointed

"When the Liberals should come into power there was to be no more bestowing of places of responsibility as a reward for political services. There was to be no more squander-ing of the public funds on enterprises in which politicians were interested far more than the country. There was to be no more determining of every question of administration down to the purchase of a paper weight on the basis of politisecuring of bonstituencies by local expenditures. There was to be no more extravagance with the public funds such as had been so moundly denounced for so many weary years. These hopes have all proved more and more illusory, and the ardor of those whose party loyalty was based upon them-not possibly the less politically important in the long run because they were not found among the office-seeking electioneens-has

There is no doubt of it. The Liberal Government, has fallen far short of the party pledges, But the reason for that, perhaps, is not so much (a want of conscience on the part (of Liberal statesmen as the extreme difficulty, if not impossibility, of living up to the high standard of political conduct to which the Liberal leaders were pledged. It is always a mistake to promise very much more than can be fulfilled.

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY.

A singular revelation has been made in connection with the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal. The Hon. John W. Foster, who acted as the American agent during the proceedings, recently dised the case in his lectures on "American Diplomacy," in Columbus University, washington, and his narrative has been printed in the National Geograpical Magazine. Much of Mr. Foster's lecture is on familiar ground, but he gives us some fresh and important information. Im particular, he notices the Canadian protests against President Roosevelt's selection of Messrs. Root, Lodge and Turner, as "impartial jurists of repute." He of the tribunal behaved admirably, and adds, as a partial answer to the criticism that they "displayed a judicial temperament at least equal to their Canadian colleagues, and were as susceptible to the arguments of opposing counsel. On one of the points strongly contended for by the United States, that of Portland Chanmel, they decided against their own government, an example which seems to have had no effect on their Canadian associates." The Canadian re tort to this naturally is that the Americans managed to save some material advantages from the wrech of this part of their case,.

Continuing, however, Mr. Foster makes an important announcement "It is due to the President to state, he says, "that he offered the appoint ment to one of the justices of the Supreme Court, and the latter declined, as it is understood, on the ground that he did not regard the post as in the proper line of his duties, and that it was not just to his associates to accept a position which would im-A second justice was approached, with a like result. 

FAMOUS SHIP ENGINEER.

Mr. L. Temlinson, Who Estimates He Had Traveled About 2,125,000 Miles.

Mr. L. Tomlinson, one of the most

Mr. L. Tomlinson. one of the most famous of ships' engineers, completed his last voyage as chief engineer of the Cunard Liner Campania on her arrival in Liverpool recently, retiring on a liberal pension after fifty-one and a half years' service with that company. As the vessel neared port on Saturday morning the saloon passengers met and formally presented him with his portrait, an illuminated address, and a purse of gold. One of the many feats which he performed at sea, just eleven years ago, stands out as remarkable. In the middle of December the Umbria was fighting her way through a great gale, about 800 miles out from New York, when her thrust shaft to which the propeller is attached snapped. On land no news could be obtained of the vessel, and Christmas passed without any tidings. Both in England and America the greatest concern was felt, and the vessel was given up as lost. But just before New Year's Day the Umbria very slowly and very gingerly steamed into the Cunard wharf at Liverpool. The old shaft could not be replaced, and the chief engineer had to piece up the great steel rod, on which practically the whole force of the engines is thrown. For eighty hours the engineer and his staff toiled, and at last with feelings of intense anxiety the engine was started. The shaft stood the test, and not a penny had to be paid in salvage. Mr. Tomlinson has served as engineer on fourteen of the company's ships, and estimates that he has traveled about 2,125,000 miles.

A Veteran Jeurnalist.

Mr. Mason Jackson of The Illustrated London News, died the other day after forty-two years' service.
Mr. Jackson's artistic experience dated back to the days of the Rebellion of 1837. Some years ago in an interview with The Sketch, Mr. Jackson told the story as follows: "It came about in a curious way," said Mr. Jackson, in answer to a question as to how he first became connected with the pictorial press. "In 1837 a rebellion broke out in Canada, the interest of which chiefly centred in Navy Island, in the Niagara River. There were no regular illustrated Journals then, though The Weekly Chronicle and The Observer used occasionally to blossom out with a woodcut. Mr. Wyld, the map publisher, called to see my brother, John, and said that a block of Navy Island was urgently wanted for The Morning Chronicle. In my brother's absence I successfully undertook the work. The nect incident was the fire at the Royal Exchange in 1838. A rough sketch of it was given me to execute for The Weekly Chronicle in a great hurry. I well remember working on it through a winter's night, the weather being as cold as the theme of my engraving was warm. Four days later my picture appeared in the paper. When the Queen's Coronation furnished the subject of a picture in The Weekly Chronicle I helped to engrave the Coronation procession. Thus as a young man I became equipped for the duties which ultimately came to me in the office of The Illustrated London News."



The made against whitaker wright. The halance sheet represented a profit of \$2,445,000, and showed that the company had \$2,672,275 in the hands of its bankers. All the figurhands of its bankers. All the lighting was done by Wright, the confiding directors simply accepting his statements. They declared the usual dividend of 10 per cent., and added that they would have been justified in declaring a dividend of 25 per cent, but that it was thought better to give the second of the second of the confidence of

in declaring a dividend of 25 per cent., but that it was thought better to pursue "a sound and conservative course." The financial statement, however, was entirely false. The actual bank balance on Sept. 7, 1899, was \$163,000, about two millions and a half less than it was represented to be a few weeks later. The money had, in the meantime, been obtained by manipulations with the other companies. At the time the profits were represented at two and a half, millions they had not exceeded \$285,000. This process of falsification has been described as "window dressing."

In the following year affairs were in a worse state. The corporation had experienced a loss of \$8,000.000. but the balance sheet again showed a profit of about \$2,200.000. Wright had valued shares in the balance sheet at double the price he was selling them to the public. The South African war and general scarcity of money precipitated the collapse, which came in December, 1900. At that time the company's balance sheet showed a surplus of \$13,785,000 over all liabilities. Wright had unloaded nearly all his founders' stock. The \$20,000,000 invested in the corporation was a total toss. The failures of the auxiliary companies add greatly to that figure.

Wright fied to France, and afterwards took refuge in New York under the name of M. Andreoni. There he was caught and extradited. His prosecution and conviction to seven years' imprisonment was under the Larcenv Act, which makes it a criminal offence for a director of any company to prepare and issue financial statements calculated to deceive and defraud. From the jurisdiction of earthly courts death almost instantly released the ruined and disgraced man.
