London, Aug. 3.-The British steamer Ranza has been sunk. The captain and eleven members of the crew of 24 have been landed safely.

The Ranza, of 2,320 tons gross, 303 feet long, with a beam of 41 feet, probably was sunk by a German submarine, but a statement to this effect is withheld by the British admiralty, which has announced that it will make public information showing the waters in which German underwater boats are operating. The Ranza, which was built at West Hartlepool in 1902, and was owned by W. Christie & Company of London, was last reported as having arrived at Liverpool on July 4.

THIRTY MILLION GERMAN PEOPLE

Depending Upon Government Food-Ten Million Directly Under Military Control.

London, Aug. 3.—Thirty million persons, at least, out of Germany's total population of little more than 70 million, are dependent upon the go7-ernment for their food to-day, according to a statement by Frederick E. Smith, Soicitor-General, at yesterday's session of the meat cargo cases before the prize court. They are living upon government rations, which the government must supply, and this is done by a vast conspiracy to smuggle contraband across the borders of the empire from the United States and elsewhere.

"We estimate that 10 million persons in Germany are directly und r military control, including soldiers and various workers. When the number of dependents upon soldiers and the workers is added it is further estimated that 30 million in all depend upon State rations. It is, therefore, presumable that the enormous supplies of foodstuffs consigned from the United States to Denmark are destined, not for private, but for State consumption."







TENDERS will be received by the undersigned up to and including Wednesday, the fifteenth day of September, 1915. For the right to cut pulpwood on a certain area situated north of the Transcontinental Railway, west of Lac Seul and south of English River in the District of Kenora.

Tenderers shall state the amount they are prepared to pay as bonus in addition to the Crown dues of 40c, per cord for spruce and 20c, per cord for other pulpwoods, or such other rates as may from time to time be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, for the right to operate a pulp mill and a paper mill on or near the area referred to.





Has Been Unearthed at Memphis, in Egypt.

Philadelphia, Aug. 2.—The unearthing of a great temple at Memphis, Egypt, is announced by the University of Pennsylvania Museum. Dr. Clar-ence L. Fisher, curator of the muse-um, was the leader of the Eckley B. Coxe Jr. expedition to Egypt, which made the discovery.

The temple it is estimated is of the

period of Rameses II, and was erected about 8,000 B.C. While no definite date can be given out at this time, the Egyptologists are inclined to believe that the temple is one that was built by Seti I, and the same one as descriped in Herodotus.

Memphis was the oldest and the greatest of the ancient Egyptian cities and was noted for its art and architecture. Dr. Fisher reported that he had collected more than 4,000 specimens of art and curios which will be brought to the museum when he returns to this country.

Knew of the Contemplated Sinking of the Lusitania.

London, Aug. 3 .- The Daily News has the following: Edward Legge, whose books on King Edward VII. created some sensation, brings forward in his latest volume, "The Public and Private Life of Kaiser Wilhelm II." a remarkable piece of evidence as to the complicity of the Kaiser in the Lusitania crime. An American gentleman, he declares, "who had founded an organization for succoring our troops and those of our allies, was sending his son out to further his benevolent work. Having been long on intimate terms with the Emperor, he wrote to inform him that his son would be passing through Germany, and expressed the hope that the young man would not be interfered with. By return post came a letter from the Kaiser in his own peculiar handwriting, imploring friend not to allow his son to take passage to England on board the Lusitania. Berlin and Bernstorff may have suggested the commission of the crime, but we have here the Kaiser's own admission that he knew all about it, and sanctioned it."

MOTORBOATS

Of Great Speed the Answer to German Submarines.

Washington, Aug. 3 .- Great Brit ain's answer to the German submarine is almost ready.

The so-called war zone about the British Isles is to be constantly patrolled by an enormous fleet of extremely speedy motorboats, each of which will mount one or two quick-

firing guns. Within a few months, it is exand of these sea wasps in commission Orders have been already placed in the United States for five hundred of them, and the work of construction is far advanced.

SIXTY MILES AN HOUR.

The submarine hunters will be from sixty to eighty feet in length over all. They will be driven by gas engines which will send them through the water at from thirty to sixty miles an hour. Their small size will make them a poor mark for torpedo attack, even f it were worth while to launch a missile which costs \$8,000 on the chance of destroying a boat, which compared with other war crafts is not expensive to build. Their great speed and ease of handling will also aid to make them almost invulnerable to attack by gun-fire.

FITTED WITH SEARCHLIGHTS. It is planned to guard the sea lanes with swiftly moving patrols of these armed motorboats. A number of them will be sent out to meet and convoy incoming munition ships and merchantmen. They will be fitted with searchlights, and once a screen of them has been formed about a liner it is not thought any submarine will be safe in poking its periscope above the surface of the water within gunshot distance.



The Empire Needs YOU!

"If we do not do more in the future than we have in the past, we are going to be beaten." These are the words of Sir John Simon, British Home Secretary. We are going to do more and WE WILL NOT BE BEATEN, but Canada must send more men and Brantford and Brant County will continue to do their share. What would happen to the women of Brantford if Britain were beaten? Ask the women of Belgium! They know!

MEN OF BRANTFORD

Will you let the Hun trample British liberty in the dirt, or will you do your bit? Never mind the shirkers and the won't-works. The women of Canada want you to protect them and fight for them. WILL YOU DO IT?

Here are the questions you would ask and their answers

- Q. I am a married man. Must I have the consent of my wife
- A. Yes, the following must get proper consent in order to be able to enlist for active service: (a) Husbands, (b) men over 18 and under 21 years of age must get the consent of both parents, (c) sons who are the only support of a widowed mother or whose parents are dependent upon them for their support.
- Q. What are the rates of pay?
- A. The rate of pay is One Dollar per day before moving to camp. A further allowance of 75c a day is made to cover meals and lodging, making \$1.75 per day white in Brantford. When in camp and on active service a field allowance of 10c is made, making the total pay \$1.10 per day.
- Q. What examinations must a man pass in order to be accepted?
- A. The recruit must be over 18 and under 45 years of age. The minimum height is 5 ft. 3 in. and the minimum chest measurement 33½ inches, with the chest normally expanded. The eyesight must be good, teeth in good condition. He must have free use of his limbs and not be flat footed. It is also necessary for the heart to be strong.
- Q. What is the reason in making a man assign at least one-half his pay?
- A. The Government believes that if they are willing to allow a separation the soldier should be equally willing to assign at least one-half the pay received.

 It is hoped the families of soldiers will have the foresight and common-sense to put in the bank all the assigned pay received, so that when the soldier returns there may be a nest egg to help the family along until he receives



- Q. I am a married man. What provision will be made for my wife and family?
- A. It has been found that a woman requires an income of \$30.00 per month on her own account, \$7.50 for a child between the ages of 10 and 15, \$4.50 for a child between the ages of 5 and 10, and \$3.00 for a child under 5 years.
- Q. When does the separation allowance start?
- A. Immediately upon being sworn in and enlisted in Brantford, but the first installment will not be paid until after the final acceptance for overseas service.
- Q. To whom are Government Separation Allowances granted? A. Separation allowances are granted (a) wives, (b) children of a widower if they are in the care of a guardian. Girls over 16 and boys over 14 years of age are not eligible. (c) Widowed mothers, if the son is unmarried and her sole support.
- Q. What pensions are paid in case of the death of a soldier?
- A. The widow receives \$22.00 a month and \$5.00 a month for each child. In the case of a soldier leaving a wife and three children the pension would be \$37.00 a month or \$484 a year. It would require \$10,800 worth of Government Bonds, paying 4½ per cent. interest, to give a pension of \$484 a year.

- Every man who receives a separation allowance for his wife must assign one-half his pay (\$16.50 per month) and may assign as much as \$25.00 per month, but not more.

- count by the Patriotic Fund in determining the amount to be paid to a depending family for support. In the case of the family described above, if the soldier assigned \$20.00
- Q. Are the requirements with regard to teeth as strict as before? - O. How is the Patriotic Fund allowance paid?
- A. It is paid by the local branch of the Patriotic Fund.
- Q. My wife is in England. Will she receive a Government separation allowance?
- A. Yes, this will be forwarded from Ottawa regularly just as if the wife were living in Canada
 - Q. Will the Patriotic Fund help dependents of soldiers living in
 - England or out of Canada? A. No. The separation will be forwarded, but any other assist
 - ance needed would be of a local nature. All children under group ages 10 to 15 are carried at minimum of \$3 per month, one child alone in each family between these ages being carried at \$7.50; ditto between the ages of 5-10, \$4.50 per month being paid one child and the minimum of \$3 being allowed the others.
 - Thus, if a man leaves a wife and four children, aged 13, 11 and 7 and 3, the income would be \$30 for the wife, \$7.50 for one child between 10 and 15, \$4.50 for one between 5 and 10, and \$3 for each of the other children, being a total of \$48 per month.
 - Q. How much of the family income does the Patriotic l'und pay? A. The Government allowance is \$20.00 per month to the wife of a soldier, the balance is made up by the Patriotic Fund. Thus in the above case \$20.00 would be paid as a Government separation allowance and \$28.00 per month would be paid by the Patriotic Fund. In no case, however, will the Patriotic Fund pay more than \$40.00 per month, and in the case of large families a certain amount of discretion is allowed to the officers

DEDUCTIONS

- The following deductions have to be taken into consideration by all branches when giving patriotic assistance:
 - A. Amount of separation allowance.
 - B. Allowance from husband's employer.
 - C. Help from private sources.
- D. Earnings of other members of family. Casual earnings as apart from regular wages should not be considered, otherwise selfhelp would be discouraged.
- E. If living rent free and fuel free, the amount should be
