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



## JACOBUS MARIS

1837-1899.

Honourable mention, Salon, Paris, 1884; Gold Medal,  
Exposition Universelle, 1889.

The eldest of the three brothers, whose father and teacher was an able artist of the last century, was born at the Hague in 1837. On leaving his father's studio, he went first of all to Antwerp where he studied at the Academy and then in 1865 to Paris working under Edouard Hébert a pupil of Couture, and at the École des Beaux Arts.

He first exhibited in the Salon of 1866 a *Petite Fille Italienne* and in 1868 a *Récolte des Pommes aux Bords du Rhin*, Holland, in 1869 a *Tricoteuse* and *Enfant Malade*, after this with occasional lapses into figure paintings he appears to have devoted himself to landscape.

He was well known in London and sent a good deal of his best work to the Goupil Galleries, being not less facile than industrious, painting with equal freedom in oils and water colours, his achievement, which comprised all manner of subjects, is very large.

At his highest his productions rank with the best of their time, his work is stamped with a fine sincerity and is unsurpassed in vigour, directness and variety; he was one of natures intimates, and his expression of her innumerable moods most true. His skies are a case in point, not solid and still, but active in space, full of the daylight and the wind, menacing with storm or charged with rain, and they look out upon you from the canvasses like the children of the weather that they are.

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## MATTHYS MARIS

Born at the Hague, 1839.

The life of Matthew Maris, the second brother, has been secluded and uneventful, he began like his brother James at the Antwerp Academy; going to Paris in 1867 where he studied under Hébert and at the École des Beaux Arts; ten years later he went to London where he has made his home ever since courting neither publicity nor distinction.

He is an artist of rare parts and great merit with a gift of exquisite colour and feeling, his works which are difficult to obtain are chiefly figure or genre subjects, and are full of poetry and imagination, and rank with the best Dutch art of this century.

## WILLEM MARIS

Born at The Hague 1844.

William, called "der Zilveren" or "the Silvery," the youngest of the Maris Brothers, like his elders, James and Matthew, began to draw while yet a boy and was to some extent a pupil of his father, unlike them, however, he did not go abroad in search of instruction but learned his art at home.

He is a painter of Cattle and the Country, his work is not vigorous but is seldom lacking in distinction and has often a peculiar charm of its own.


