NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C.—Mayor Gearty has announced that he has induced English capitalists to subscribe \$25,000 towards the erection of a modern hotel in this city. It will probably be located on the Douglas-Elmott square at corner of Sixth and Columbia streets.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—The Water and Light Commissioners have submitted estimates to the Council for improvements costing \$50,000 and including the building of a 2,000,000 gallon reservoir, cost \$10,000, construction of pipe line, cost \$8,000, purchase of new pump, cost \$13,500, purchase of two generators, cost \$5,200.

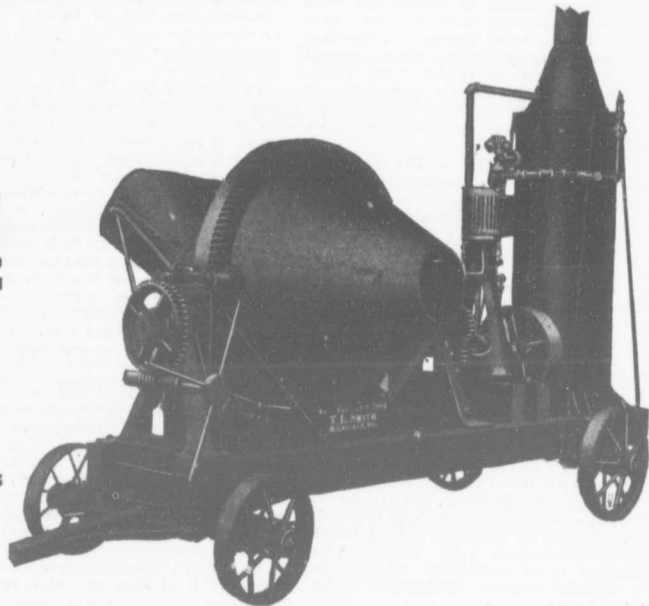

OTTAWA, ONT.—The Council intend constructing an asphalt and stone sett pavement on Nicholas street, from Wilbrod street to Laurier ave., estimated cost \$8,435.90.—Mr. Morse, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, states that the construction of the Lake Superior branch will be commenced as soon as specifications are printed.

GUELPH, ONT.—The by-law to raise \$55,000 for extension and improvement of the gas plant was carried by the ratepayers on Saturday last.—Dr. Smith, Ontario Inspector of Public Institutions, last week visited St. Joseph's Hospital to inspect the site selected for the new buildings to be erected this summer.
