Rejection of the T., G. and B. Amalgamation Bill.—In the Railway Committee of the Local Legislature, the Bill to amalgamate the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway and the Grand Trunk was considered at considerable length. Several counsel spoke against the amalgamation on behalf of the bondholders. Mr. Hodgins, Q. C., argued that it was highly improper to legislate on the subject while the question of the agreement was before the courts. Mr. Osler said that every precedent went to prove that legislation going to trial was utterly irregular and was often disallowed. The bill was rejected on the following vote: Yeas, 14; Nays, 26.
