Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may home stead a quarte section of available Dominion land in Manucha, Saskatche-wan or Alberta. Applicant unus appear in person at the Dominion Lanus Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion. Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency,) on carasia coditions.

certain conditions. Dutes-Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm o at least 80 acres, on certain conditions A habitalo house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homestead re-restication districts a homestead re-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead pre-emption pattern ay be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

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
