Town Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with Councilors all present.

The minutes of the last regular and special meeting were read and approved.

The Clerk read a communication from Mayor DeWitt, regretting his absence from the meeting, and directing the attention of the Council to several matters which should engage the attention of the Board.

The Streets Committee reported that during the month considerable work had been done in the matter of covering the east end of Main street with crushed stone and gravel, and that a permanent work had been done.

The Sewerage Committee reported that during the month about fifteen connections had been made with the sewer, some of the man-holes had been covered and other work had been done.

A communication was read from Mr. C. M. Gormley, with respect to the Sewerage by-laws, which he interpreted as making the trap at the wall as optional.

Mr. J. L. Murphy, Sewerage Inspector, presented his report of work done during the month.

The following accounts were read and ordered to be paid: Mrs. Forsyth, \$10.00; A. J. Woodman, \$16.02; Mrs. Irene Pith, \$22.50; T. McAvity & Son, \$12.50; Herman and Charles Kelly, \$1.75; J. E. Hales & Co., \$12.10; Davison Bros., \$21.25; James Bush, \$1.50; Mrs. H. I. Crandall, \$1.90; Acadia Electric Light Co., \$48.70; B. G. Bishop, \$6.00; Town Clerk (postage), \$2.69; Chas. H. Borden, \$2.25; John Starr, Son & Co., \$2.10; John S. Smith (rebate water), \$2.16; Valley Telephone Co., \$8.34; Wolfville Coal & Lumber Co., \$6.25.

Resolved that the Council request the Recorder to take such steps as may be necessary to secure possession by expropriation of the marsh-land through which the eastern outlet of the sewer runs.

A petition was presented from the management of Willow Bank Country asking that a water-pipe be laid from the residence of Albert Weatherbe to the top of the hill in the cemetery for use in watering plants, &c. The distance, it was claimed, would be about 300 feet, and owing to the fact that the water would only be used during the summer season the pipe would only require to be laid at a slight depth. On motion it was decided that the prayer of the petition be granted.

By resolution the Black Knot Inspector was requested and authorized to proceed in a legal manner and have the Knot destroyed in all orchards within the town limits.

Resolved that the Sewerage Committee be requested to nominate at the next meeting a name or names for appraiser and arbitrator on expropriation matters.

By resolution the chairman of the Streets Committee was authorized to establish a pond on the water-shed lands.

Resolved that the Streets Committee be empowered to cut down in places every other ornamental tree or trim out as they deem best on Highland avenue and Main street.
