Professor Gentill has quite set his heart on making the tapestry his masterpiece, and it is largely on account of this desire that some fourteen years will have been required has been done by him by hand,

RENAISSANCE OF TAPESTRY WEAVING

The art which had ormerly reached a high perfection in Italy fell into disuse in the seveneenth century.
