SELF-CANCELLING POSTAGE.—A self-cancelling postage stamp has been invented in the United States. Instead of moustering the back of those stamps, the face being gummed, it is stamped and placed on the letter as usual, when such an impression is made on the face of the letter as renders its removal impossible. If by any process the stamps are taken off, it must be destroyed, while the impression remains plainly upon the letter. The self-cancelling operation will save a vast amount of time and labor in all post-offices, and insures security against being re-used or picked off by thieves. The main point of inquiry now appears to be whether there is any light and delicate stamps will be found able to resist the action of the heat in warm weather, and be as completely portable as the present issue; whether, when folding, they would not adhere to each other or break so as to disfigure the vignette.—Chicago Times.

DEATH FROM HYDROPHOBIA.—We regret to learn that Widow Cruikshank, who was bitten by a rabid dog on Monday, 10th October last, died at her residence in Kingston, on Sunday morning last, the 20th inst. At the time she was bitten, the unfortunate woman suffered much bodily pain and mental anxiety, but the wound healing up, her friends concluded that as time wore on her mind would become settled. On Sabbath two weeks, while attending church in Elton, a dog jumped at her, and so frightened was she in consequence that her mind became affected, and symptoms of hydrophobia became apparent. Mr. John Marriott had a better bite by the rabid dog, which went mad last week, and had to be destroyed.—Guelph Herald.

Recrudescence of the Cod-Fish. The cod is one of the most prolific fishes as may be supposed, when we call to mind the vast numbers which are caught at the principal fishing stations through a long succession of years, where one man in Newfoundland has caught 552 in a day, and upwards of 15,000 in a voyage. 10,000 cod fish were reckoned a proper yearly capture for a man. The fact is well borne out by an examination of the multitude of bones of the species which have been counted in the mass of the ovaries. In a fish of 21 lb, the roe weighed 11 lb, or more than half of the whole fish; but, in another which weighed 30 lb, the roe only weighed four pounds and a quarter; and yet, in this last instance, the following proportion was fully obtained, in repeating twice, two grains in weight of this roe gave the number of over 425; so that making a full allowance for the member mingled with them, the number of living individuals which might have been produced from this fish in this roe was of less than usual proportions. That very many of these eggs never reach a useful size is highly probable; and yet it is to be remarked that a young cod is more readily found in the stomach of other fish than the generality of its fellow-natives of the deep.—Cook's Fishes of the British Islands.
