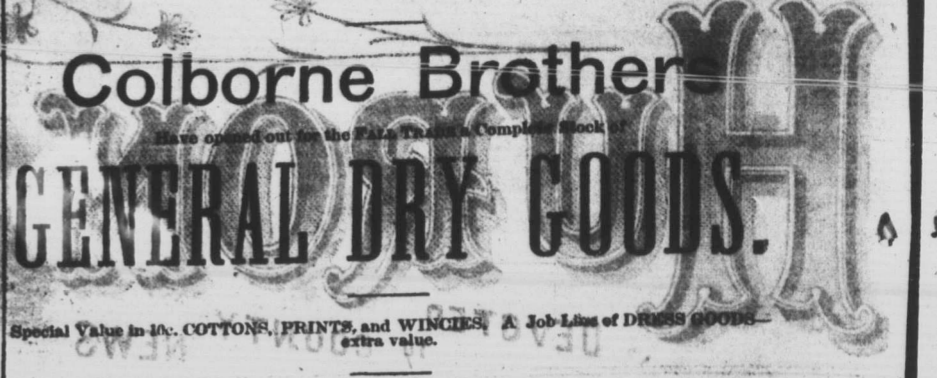

The Chicago of To-Day

To the Editor of The Signal. Taking advantage of the very cheap excursion to the above city on Tuesday the 20th ult., I thought a few observations taken while there, might possibly interest your readers.

So far as we know, ancient or modern times fail to give an instance of such rapid growth as this great city of half a million inhabitants, presents to day.

The marvellous way in which it was rebuilt soon after its destruction by fire, reflects the highest praise on the indomitable energy of its people. Standing on Madison where it intersects State Street, and looking up at the magnificent establishments on all sides, it seems almost incredible that less than half a century ago the locality was nothing but a dreary swamp, and the abode only of a few red men.

To the Goderich visitor the city offers unusual interest, considering that upwards of 50 of its inhabitants formerly resided in the town and immediate neighborhood some of whom have their mark in its progress, notably, Ben. Allen, the great jeweller, where watches will be shown you varying from seven dollars to eight hundred.

From real estate men and others I learned that the city was unusually prosperous, and at no time since the fire had things looked so hopeful—everyone was at work—laborers getting as high as \$1.75, carpenters \$2.50 and bricklayers \$3 per day, while teamsters were almost impossible to obtain at any price.

The street car service seems perfect, a ride of six miles only costing five cents, upwards of a thousand cars being constantly engaged on splendid tracks laid with steel rails.

Churches of all denominations, presided over by the most eminent divines of the age, are both numerous and beautiful; while those who court the advanced liberal opinions of the day can be abundantly satisfied by spending an hour every Sunday morning with Professor Irving at the Music Hall.

The Presidential election coming off during my stay, I had an opportunity of observing the attitude of the people on this occasion. From what I saw they were remarkably quiet, not as much excitement being evident as at some of our municipal elections.

The solid business men, and in fact the whole community seem well pleased at its result, as a strong feeling pervaded all classes that they could not afford to run even a risk (by a change of Administration) of disturbing the present prosperous condition of commercial affairs.

On many sides I heard of the high esteem in which Goderich and its locality were spoken of, for its pure air and health producing properties, and now with unmistakable return of better days it is but reasonable to expect a large influx of Chicago visitors during another season.

Should another excursion be got up an effort ought to be made to give publicity through the local press, as scarcely any one was aware that the low sum of four dollars and fifty cents would take him from Goderich to Chicago.

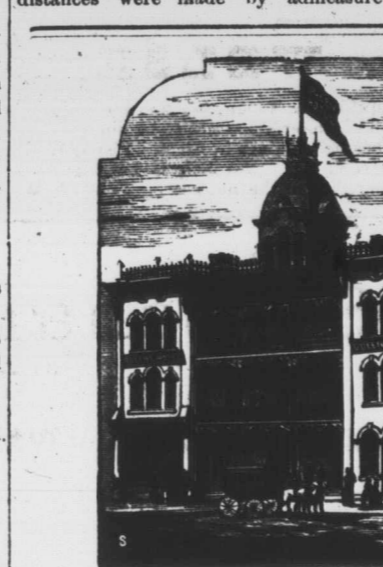
BRUSSELS.

A Handsome, Well Built Village.

The Location—Hotel Accommodation—Municipal Officers—Manufacturers—Railway Facilities—"Society."

Brussels is one of the handsomest, if not the handsomest, village in Ontario. This statement may look very broad on the face of it, but will be fully borne out by every person who has visited the place of late years.

ITS LOCATION is a pleasant one, being situated on the southern branch of the river Matiland, some sixteen miles north of Seaford, and ten south of Wroxeter. The village is divided by the northern gravel road and in elections for the House of Commons this road forms the voting boundary in the village of Brussels between North and Centre Huron.

THE MANUFACTURING ENTERPRISES of the place are up to the average and Livingston's flax-mill, Wilson's foundry, Bennett, Smith & Co's. planing mill, McIntosh's woolen factory, Watson's Hunter's and Scott's carriage factories, the brickyard, the lime kilns, and a full quota of Butchers and bakers.
