Corcoran, the millionaire philanthropist, who died there at the age of 90, in the early part of last month. In the State of Illinois alone there are more than 30,000 who are dependent upon railways for their occupation. THE LATE JOHN T. HOFFMAN.

He was Governor of the State of New York during the Tweed Regime. John Thompson Hoffman, ex-governor of New York state, ex-recorder of the city and formerly a prominent Tammany Hall politician, was apparently in the prime of life when he died, and yet he had outlived all his political power and no small share of his reputation. His case is one of the many witnessed in the United States in which a man personally honest is dragged down by the dishonesty of political associates whom he has too implicitly trusted, and too earnestly supported. The nation has but recently had to blush anew for a great soldier whose great fault was that he "stuck to his friends" a little too long in some instances; and though he was too great to be politically ruined by such an error, men like Governor Hoffman must generally be crushed by such a downfall as that of the Tweed ring in 1871.

John T. Hoffman was born in Sing Sing, N. Y., his father, Dr. Adriaus Kieffer, a prominent physician. He obtained his early education at the thesine noted Dr. Irenaeus Prime, who commended his firmness of character and predicted a great future for him. He was graduated from Union College in 1846, completed his law studies and became a member of the Democratic state central committee before he was of age. In 1849 he moved to the city of New York and was elected city recorder in 1850, the youngest man who ever held the place. Then, and for many years after, he was the great power in Tammany Hall. As recorder he won such popularity that he was unanimously re-elected. In 1865 he was elected mayor. In 1866 he was nominated for governor and beaten by Governor Fenton; but Hoffman was elected in 1868 and re-elected in 1870. Then his star suddenly paled. In the anti-Orange riots of 1871 his conduct was universally condemned, and immediately after came the exposures of the Tweed ring and overthrow of Tammany, and Governor Hoffman was politically prostrated. He never re-entered public life. He leaves a fortune of about \$400,000 to his wife and only child, Mrs. Sandfort.

THE NEW GREEK MINISTER. John Gennadius, who has lately arrived at Washington. The new Greek minister has become very popular in Washington, writes F. G. Carpenter. He is invited everywhere, and his evenings here have a series of dinners. He was received very nicely by the president, and his speech in reply to that of the president has been complimented. Greece sends a minister to the United States to investigate the obstructions to the importation of Grecian currants to this country. Currants are the most profitable export which Greece has, and in the year 1885 she sent over \$7,000,000 worth of these to Great Britain. This Grecian minister comes of the purest of Grecian blue blood. He is a black haired, bright eyed, handsome young man of between 30 and 40 years of age. He is full of fire and life, and is one of the most cultured men in diplomatic circles. Like all of the Greeks he is an excellent linguist, speaks English fluently, and never wants a word. He is now stopping at the Arlington hotel, where he has a room pleasantly furnished, a desk filled with papers and a mantelpiece crowded with pictures of noted people. Queen Victoria's picture stands in the center, and at the right and left of this are photographs of the Princess of Wales and Albert Edward, with their autographs written below them. This Grecian minister's name is John Gennadius, and he is here on a special diplomatic mission. He is the regular Greek minister to Great Britain and Holland, and is one of the most popular diplomats of London. The English society pairs delight to do him honor. Vanity Fair devoted a colored cartoon to him last month, and The London World gave him a couple of pages not long ago as one of the celebrities of the British capital. He has been given an honorary degree by the Oxford university, and has written some books. He is especially well up in Grecian history, art and literature, and his home in London contains the principal editions of the Greek classics. He has here Luther's original pamphlet, "Tom Kriego Wieder die Turken," published in 1529, and he has an edition of Hesiod which belonged to Racine and which contains manuscript notes by him. He has Queen Elizabeth's picture which belonged to Queen Elizabeth, and his copy of Daphnis and Chloe was once owned by Napoleon I. His home in London is hung with beautiful pictures and water color sketches of Greek scenery, queer carvings, paintings of the Parthenon, and the other surroundings of a classical taste are scattered throughout his home.

One of John Gennadius' ancestors was the first patriarch of Constantinople after its capture by the Turks, and his father, George Gennadius, was one of the foremost teachers of Greece, and did a great deal toward the inauguration of the present school system of that country. This Grecian minister was born at Athens, and he was just of age when he was appointed secretary of the legation at Washington in 1870, but before starting for his post he was transferred to Constantinople. Ten years later he was sent to London, and has also acted at Vienna as charge d'affaires. He is, I am told, a very efficient minister. He is proud of being a Greek, and thinks the Greeks are to be one of the nations of the future, as well as the great nation of the past. He is making an impression for his country in the United States, and if he succeeds in his mission, the Americans will eat more Greek currants than they ever have before.

Of the congressmen now in Washington who held commissions in the Union or Confederate armies during the war, the highest rank was attained by Representative Joseph Wheeler, of Alabama, who was a major general in the Confederate service and a distinguished cavalry leader. -New York Evening World.

MORRISON REMICH WAITE.

Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, Recently Deceased. Those who are fond of tracing a natural proneness in the successive members of a single family to follow in the same footsteps, will find something to study in the family history of the late Chief Justice Waite. As far back as the days of Oliver Cromwell, Thomas Waite, a member of the house of commons in England, a "Roundhead," was one of the judges who condemned Charles I to the block and put his signature to the death warrant. In America, John Waite, of Malden, Mass., was a member of the general court of that colony and afterwards speaker of the colonial house of representatives. From Thomas Waite, married in 1704, came that branch of the family best known during the last and the present century. Their grandson, Martin Waite, was a lawyer, and was nineteen times chosen to the general assembly of Connecticut. His son, John T. Waite, of Norwich, was long a representative of the state in congress. Another grandson, Thomas Waite, was fourth son of a member of the Connecticut legislature, and became justice of the supreme court of the state in 1824. The oldest of his eight children was Chief Justice Waite, who has just died.



Morrison Remich Waite was born at Lyme, Conn., Nov. 29, 1810. He was graduated at Yale college in 1837, and returned to Lyme to study law in his father's office, but soon after emigrated to Ohio. At Marietta, Ohio, in 1839 he was admitted to the bar. He formed a partnership with Samuel M. Young, and began practice at Maumee City. In 1850 the partnership was dissolved, and the firm of Young & Waite was dissolved, and the two brothers formed a partnership. In 1849 and 1850 Mr. Waite was a member of the state legislature. He was a Whig in those days, but upon the organization of the Republican party he joined its fortunes and was a staunch Republican the rest of his life. In 1862 he was a candidate for representative in congress, but was defeated. This was his last candidacy for office. He was repeatedly offered state and federal positions, but for a time declined them all.

In 1871 Mr. Waite was appointed one of the counsel to prepare and argue the case of the Alabama and other claims before the international tribunal of arbitration at Geneva, his colleagues being William M. Everts and Caleb Cushing. In this case Mr. Waite attracted considerable attention by the power of his arguments and his comprehensive understanding of international law. Two years after the Alabama arbitration he was admitted to practice law at the bar of the supreme court of the United States, and a few months later was elected to the Ohio constitutional convention and was chosen its president.

In 1873 came the event which resulted in the elevation of Mr. Waite to office in connection with the government—next to the president—the chief justiceship of the supreme court. This event was the death of Chief Justice Chase. President Grant offered the position to Roscoe Conkling, who declined it. George H. Williams and Caleb Cushing were successively nominated and withdrawn. Finally, on Jan. 19, 1874, Mr. Waite's name was sent to the senate while he was presiding over the convention in Ohio and ignorant of President Grant's procedure. A telegram was brought to Rufus King, a member of the convention, who arose and read the announcement of Mr. Waite's appointment, whereupon the convention burst into vociferous applause. The nomination was unanimously confirmed, and on March 4, 1874, Justice Waite took the oath of office and at once entered upon his duties.

The most important of Justice Waite's decisions were in the civil rights cases, 1878; polygamy cases, 1879; the constitutional amendments, 1880, and three decisions in 1881. These were—one regarding the powers of removal by the president, one on polygamy cases, and one on the Virginia bond case. In 1883 two important decisions were given covering the civil rights act. In 1884 came the decision in the Alabama claims, the legal tender act, and the Virginia claim case. The decision in the Chicago Anarchist case last year attracted considerable attention, from the interest attached to their execution. The last of Justice Waite's most important decisions was in the Bell telephone case.
