EARLY ME

BIG STRIKE IN BERLIN. LONDON, Jan. 30. Nearly 500,000 persons already are on strike in Berlin and the number is being added to hourly, says the Exchange Telegraph Co. The correspondent of the Politken, of Copenhagen, reports that the strikers have formed a Workmen's Council of 600 with an action commission of ten men and women, including Hugo Hasse, the Independent Socialist leader, and Philippo Scheidemann, the Majority Socialist leader. Other members of the commission include George Ledebour and Wm. Dittmann, Independent Socialists, and Frederick Ebert and Herr Braun, Majority Socialists. The despatch adds: The Socialists, it is stated, asked Herr Wallrat, Minister of the Interior, to grant permission for the holding of meetings. Herr Wallrat, it is added, declared he would not negotiate with the workmen, but would receive the Socialist members of Parliament. Herr Hasse and two other workmen went to the Minister of the Interior and informed him of the action of the commission, demanding unanimously that negotiations take place in the presence of the workmen. The result of Herr Wallrat's deliberations are not yet known, the despatch adds, but it quotes the local press as saying that important negotiations are occurring between him and General Von Steubne, the Prussian Minister of War.

the workmen in the Kiel shipyard and in the Vulcan works at Hamburg, and thousands of miners in the High Westphalian districts, struck on Monday, according to the Berliner Vossische Zeitung.

ITALIANS FORGING AHEAD. VIENNA, Jan. 30. The Italians, who are attacking on the northern front, are being reinforced constantly by large numbers of troops, says to-day's official announcement. After a stubborn struggle, in which the Austrian troops are said to have made heroic defence, they were forced to give up Monte Di Val Bella and Col del Rosso.

STRIKERS ADDRESS GOVERNMENT. ZURICH, Jan. 30. The Socialist paper Vorwaerts announces that Berlin strikers have now become more numerous and threatening. They have addressed the Government an ultimatum in which the following are the principal demands: First. An accelerated conclusion of a general peace without indemnities and annexation. Second. Participation of workmen's delegates of all countries in the peace parliaments. Third. Amelioration of the food situation by a better distribution. Fourth. Immediate abolition of the state of siege and the restoration of

ITALIAN OFFICIAL.

ROME, Jan. 30. The Italian official statement today says: The Austrians have been bombarding with extreme violence the positions captured by the Italians. The Italian fire has been powerfully centered on points behind the enemy lines. Extremely heavy losses were suffered by the Austrians, two of their divisions being almost completely wiped out. Col del Rosso was taken on Monday, and the Italians' success was extended yesterday by the capture of Monte Di Val Bella. Our gallant troops in the plateau zone of the army, successfully crowned yesterday the action begun on the eastern Asiago Plateau on Sunday, by wresting from the enemy his position to the west of the Frenselva Valley, Col del Rosso and Col De Chelo, which are in the descent towards the western edge of the valley, having been taken on Monday and since then held with valor. The enemy in the region of Sasso Rosso was hard pressed, and his numerous counter attacks were repulsed with the bayonet. The success was yesterday extended by the capture of Monte Di Val Bella. Among the captures were more than 100 officers, 2,500 men, six guns and about 100 machine guns.

U. S. ARMY OFFICERS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. Army officers to-day estimated that 11,000 officers will be graduated for the third series of training, from camps now in progress making a total of 56,000 officers turned out through these camps. Commissions were issued to 17,341 graduates of first camps and 17,287 of second. Complete statistics of the third camp which opened Jan. 5, show that 18,348 men are under instruction, of whom 60 per cent are expected to qualify for commissions. Only 2,682 of these are from civil life and all of these have had more or less military training. Of the remainder 5,366 were drawn from the National Guard, 7,511 from the National Army and 3,189 from the regular army.

ROBBING BELGIUM.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. Robbing of Belgium and the destruction of Belgian industries by the Germans continues relentlessly according to despatches to-day to the Belgian Legation here. Linen and mattresses are being taken from hotels, boarding houses and convents

and Belgians are not allowed to have wool in their possession. They are offered seaweed as a substitute for wool at five cents per pound. The big electric plant known as Lesaut is said to have been stripped and its machinery placed in a German plant known as Romdacherutte.

HELD RESPONSIBLE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. Ambassador Francis B. Petrowsky cabled the State Department to-day that a group of Russian anarchists had notified him he would be held personally responsible for the safety of Alexander Berkman and Emma Goldman, under prison sentence in the United States for violating the draft law.

FRENCH CITIZENS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. Natives of Alsace-Lorraine living in this country without having been naturalized will not be registered as enemy aliens but as French citizens of the lost provinces provided they obtain identification cards from the Association General Des Alsaciens Lorrains D'Amérique and have them counter-signed by the French Consulate. It was announced here to-night. This arrangement was made as a result of conferences held by Ambassador Jusserand with the Department of Justice in Washington.

ON IMPORTANT MISSION.

PENANG, Jan. 30. The departure to-night of acting President Feng Kw Chang has created uneasiness in government circles. The ostensible purpose of the visit of the Acting President is a conference with the government generals concerning the military situation. The Presidential special attached a large number of soldiers and machine guns, and it is reported that other trains following it took 10,000 men.

GOOD USE OF ENEMY SHIPS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. Secretary Daniels is discussing a despatch from the American Army headquarters in France regarding the commandeered German ships being used to transport American troops abroad, disclosed to-day that between 600,000 and 700,000 tons of former enemy shipping now is actively engaged in augmenting the expeditionary force and maintaining their supply. The Leviathan, formerly the Vaterland, is capable of carrying up to 10,000 troops in a single trip. Daniels said, but 8,000 was considered the largest number which could be comfortably accommodated. In connection with the repair of the Leviathan it was learned that the alterations made by American engineers resulted in the increase of several knots.

ONLY AFFECTS BERLIN.

LONDON, Jan. 30. A semi-official despatch from Berlin, forwarded by Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent, says there's no news of a serious strike movement in any part of Germany except in Berlin. In Ruhr district in particular work is reported to be in full swing in all factories.

U. S. MAJOR IN HOSPITAL.

PARIS, Jan. 30. Major General Leonard Wood of the United States Army, who was wounded recently while visiting the French front, is confined to Ritz Carlton Hospital, where he is doing well.

THE KAISER'S REPLY.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 30. The German Emperor replying to birthday congratulations from the King of Saxony, sent the following message, according to the Lokal Anzeiger: "You know how I sympathize in the sacrifices and distress which these hard times have laid upon our people, but I begin the new year full of confidence. Despite the many difficulties everything goes to show that our superior military command and our splendid peoples' great power of resistance will break our opponents' war, and will create foundations of a good, happy and safe future. God grant it."

ASKS AID OF SWEDEN.

LONDON, Jan. 30. A Stockholm despatch to the Times says that the Finnish Government has sent a representative to Sweden with an appeal for military help against the revolutionists. So far as it is possible to foresee, the despatch says, Sweden will not agree to the request.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, Jan. 30. French patrols carrying out operations north of the Aisne brought back prisoners, the War Office announces. In the Vosges the artillery fighting was continued vigorously during the night at Hartmannswillerkopf. There is nothing to report from the remainder of the front.

RAID CASUALTIES.

LONDON, Jan. 30. In last night's air raid three persons were killed and ten injured. It is announced officially. It is feared bodies of six other persons are buried in the ruins of a house.

MUTINY ON BRITISH SHIP.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Jan. 30. A call for help from a British steamer which reported a mutiny among

Arab firemen, was received here to-day. The vessel, the name of which was not given, was several hundred miles off the coast.

WAR TILL VICTORY.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. Declaring that every member of the next Congress, whatever his views on domestic questions, must be for "war till victory," the executive council of the League for National Unity, in conference here to-day, issued an appeal to the voters of the United States to support the Government and defeat every pacifist and pro-German candidate. Samuel Gompers was present at the meeting.

ITALIAN SHIPPING LOSSES.

ROME, Jan. 30. Shipping losses for the week ending Jan. 26, were two Italian steamers of more than 1,500 tons and two sailing vessels under 100 tons. One steamer that was damaged was able to reach port.

VATICAN FINANCES.

ROME, Jan. 30. An international committee is to be formed to reorganize the finances of the Vatican, which Cardinal Gaspari, the Papal Secretary of State reports are in an alarming condition. The committee, one of whose members is to be Thomas F. Ryan, of New York, will be called upon to devise means of obtaining funds, possibly by the underwriting of a world-wide loan. The Vatican's usual sources of revenue, such as rentals from properties, gifts from Mexico, Belgium, France, Austria and the United States have been reduced or cut off by war conditions. At the same time, Pope Benedict daily expends thousands of dollars in war charities, including the sending of food and clothing to prisoners of war in Germany and Austria. Appeals for contributions are received in large number from the Vatican from many countries. Under the present system of financial administration the Pope acts as treasurer of the Vatican, having in his office a safe in which he deposits the funds to be disbursed. When the safe is empty the Holy See nominally is bankrupt.

The Merchants and the F. P. U.

Despite the closer acquaintance which he has lately enjoyed with the courts, we do not think Mr. Coaker is yet a good lawyer or that he shows much improvement in that capacity for argument which is supposed to be the quality which distinguishes those most eminent in that profession. Not that he lacks arguments,—far from it—but those he uses are apt to be more numerous than sound. It is a good ground for dismissing a plaintiff's claim that it contains itself its own defence. Therein, perhaps, lies the most essential difference between law and journalism, at least if we can accept the Advocate as any representative of the latter. We cannot conceive for what purpose exactly it quoted at such length and with such commanding type the report of Hon. John Harvey's remarks to the Board of Trade on the subject of the F. P. U., unless possibly to show that there was one of the tyrant merchants at least who did not wish all the members of that excellent brotherhood to be hanged, drawn and quartered. While his remarks exhibited only the sound sense that we always expect from Mr. Harvey, we do not think he would wish to be singled out as being alone in his views and the brilliant exception Mr. Coaker would make him appear. No merchant that we know of has ever been fool enough to exhibit the slightest antagonism to the F. P. U. as such, representing as it does a large section of the mass between whom and himself the closest commercial interests must exist to their mutual benefit. That no such antagonism at all has been exhibited in other ways we cannot pretend, though we wish we could; but that which has been shown from time to time has been more in the nature of a very natural resentment of the venomous, scurrilous, unjust and altogether untruthful attacks constantly levelled at the merchants as a whole by Mr. Coaker himself. The true keynote of Mr. Harvey's remarks is, we think, struck by the opening words of the Advocate's report, where it states that he "regretted the impression spread abroad by certain sections of the press that the one aim and object of the mercantile community is the ultimate destruction of the Fishermen's Union." This is quoted with evident gratification by the Advocate though it refers in the plainest possible way to the Advocate itself!

That impression is, in fact, the one impression that Mr. Coaker has consistently for years laboured to create throughout the country, the one impression which he will never cease to create as long as a certain state of things exist, which is the numerical superiority of the fishermen over the merchants, or, to put it directly, their greater voting power. Aiming always and solely at his own political advancement, he has sought to compass his aim by currying favour with the larger of the two important classes in the country, and, the better to ensure his success, has endeavoured upon every possible occasion to set them against one another. This again he has sought to do by the simple but contemptible expedient of representing them as being opposed, when in reality their interests have always coincided, and of appealing not to the reason but to the passions and prejudices of those he wished to win to his own side. Affecting to champion the fishermen, he has in reality harmed them more than their most open enemy. He has acted in every way like one who would stir up strife between the captain and crew of a ship, or set the man on the bridge quarrelling with the man at the helm. What would be the fate of a ship under such conditions? And what will be the fate of the ship of state if this troublemaker is allowed to set both factions of the crew at loggerheads?

Although this senseless strife between merchant and fisherman has been so sedulously fostered by Mr. Coaker ever since the formation of the F. P. U., and although he has so frequently boasted of the benefits he has thereby secured to the fishermen, we have yet to learn of a single instance in which the boast has been justified. If the one given by the Advocate is a fair sample, we shall have to wait a good while longer yet. The F. P. U. had as much effect upon the price of seal fat last spring as the South Sea Islanders; Mr. Coaker had as much to do with it as the man in the moon. It was fixed at the final figure by the operation of the most ordinary and simple commercial principle, the competition of the two firms concerned. It would have been fixed at that figure if the F. P. U. had not existed, if its worthy President had been still bathing at Palm Beach or exchanging weighty confidences with the statesmen of Ottawa. The claim is on a par with the "Coaker" recruiting. After all, what an easy thing it is to take credit for others' achievements! But isn't Mr. Coaker wasting himself in his petty and re-

stricted surroundings? Ought he not to seek a wider sphere and bring about, say, the end of the war? For we know that when that desirable consummation is achieved he is as likely as not to tell certain of his admirers in confidence that he did it all. But Mr. Coaker must be forgiven. If a man can only get others enough to believe everything that he tells them, he ends by believing half of it himself.

The Menace to the Country.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir,—My observations in respect to Profiteering, and the responsibility of the Government in the matter, require further elucidation than I was able to give yesterday. When the Coalition was announced in the House of Assembly by Premier Morris he gave in justification for the agreement with the Coakerites that it was "the desire of both parties to put Country first and party second. . . . to form a strong united party to deal with the question of Tonnage and Food Supply, and to be in a better way to cope with the difficulties and obstacles that come in our way." Mr. Coaker said, on the 22nd June, according to the official report of debates,—"A strong government backed by a large majority was wanted to deal with such problems as food supply, price of food stuffs, and other necessities of life. . . . Regarding the food question and a Board to control it. Why not appoint one man, a giant, on that board and give him full power, and let him do his duty, and not trouble about what Water Street says? Is there not one strong man in the crowd who will do his duty? One man who does not care for the opinion of Water Street!"

Mr. Stone said,— "The fishermen and laborers of this country were being fleeced since the beginning of the War. For instance, take food stuffs and see how they have jumped up in price without any interference from the Government. What was the Government doing for the past two years and a half or three years when they allowed importers of this city to fleece a people who could ill afford it at this particular time."

Mr. Hickman said,— "While I was in New York, when the price of food stuffs went up, the Government didn't appoint a Commission to investigate, but they went out and bought all the food stuffs and re-sold them to the jobbers and fixed the retail price at which the goods were to be sold."

And all the smaller fry said Amen. Let the public take notice of the fact that these men, who dominate the Government to-day, and who have exercised supreme power in the Council of the Government for the past six months have done nothing to meet the conditions they thus portrayed. Were those utterances only intended to deceive, and mislead those who they designate "underdogs" and "toilers" and "poor fishermen"? Or have they no "giant" or "one strong man in the crowd who will do his duty. One who does not care for the opinion of Water Street"? Or, was their professing love for the poor, their concern for cheap food and clothes and decent homes for the poor nothing more than a sham, an hypocrisy? Let the Fishermen's Union, who those men represent in particular, let the fishermen generally, let everybody who feels the terrible burden of the present high cost of living answer that question.

In view of the sufferings of the poor to-day from dear food and clothes. In view of the fact that since those men got hold of the Government six months ago, the price of food and clothing has not gone down but up, surely, we may hope that the above form of hypocrisy has forever lost its effectiveness. The people have met a bitter disappointment, and it must be all the more bitter because they have met it at the hands of their professed champions and friends. It has been well said that of all the agonies in life, that which is most poignant and harrowing—that which for the time annihilates reason, and leaves our whole organization on an incandescent, mangled heart,—is the conviction that we have been deceived where we placed all our trust.

I have said that the present Government have done nothing. They have set up a make-believe. Instead of appointing "a giant," or, "one strong man who will do his duty," or, as Mr. Hickman suggested for the Government to buy up the food stuffs and re-sell them at fixed retail prices, they appointed what they termed a Food Control Board which is a standing joke in the community. It consists of a "Drapers' Clerk, Mr. Grimes; an Engineer, Mr. Hall; a newspaper Editor, Mr. McGrath; and a Customs officer, Mr. LeMessurier; the latter, the only competent man to deal with such a matter. They have done nothing, except to tell us that the Butchers are making more than fifty per cent profit on beef, that the Farmers are unable to sell their milk for less than sixty cents per gallon, that the Butcher's Factories prices are fair and reasonable, that the flour dealers will probably increase the price of that commodity, that we are using too much sugar in our tea, and that before very long we shall probably have to live on one small meal a day. In the meantime the taxpayers will be called upon to pay those gentlemen for their services, and the poor will go hungry. This is the first time, Mr. Coaker has informed his friends, through the medium of the "Official Organ," that the fishermen have been properly represented in the Government of the Colony.

Milady's Boudoir.

KEEPING THE FINGERS BEAUTIFUL.



A great many women cut the nails way in at the corners and run them out to a point, believing that it assists greatly to give a tapering effect to the fingers, but they are sadly mistaken. It takes away the support from the flesh and its sprouts out wider and wider the more one trims the nails in this way. Let the sides of the nails alone. Shape only the tops. Keep them well polished and cut the cuticle back from the half moon and your fingers will look natural and attractive. One of the best polishes is composed of one half ounce of oxide of tin, one grain of powdered carmine and one grain of powderedorris root. Sift through a muslin cloth several times using a clean piece each time. This will give you a quick and lasting polish with just a natural shade of pink. Never use scissors if you can help it. If you do be sure and give the nails a final finish with a file. Always remember that grease not only keeps the nails from becoming brittle, but also improves the texture and makes them shapely. It frequently happens that ridges appear on the nails, which make them look coarse. Soak the fingers every night in sweet almond oil that is heated quite warm but not hot. This may be used over and over. After the bath in the oil wrap the finger tips in muslin, first smearing the nails about with vasoline. There is more nourishment for the cuticle and the nails in vasoline than there is in cold cream. The use of oil is especially good in winter and also has a tendency to strengthen your nails and keep them from breaking.

From Abroad

We take the following from Halifax Chronicle of date Jan. 29:

DEFICIT MADE UP BY NEWFOUNDLAND.

Handicap imposed by Prohibition in Newfoundland has been overcome.

St. John's, Nfld. Jan. 23.—The handicap imposed upon the customs revenue of Newfoundland by the passage of the Act which made illegal the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors after December 31, 1916, has been entirely overcome. The revenue for the calendar year just amounting to \$4,442,476, was more by \$25,876 than that for 1916. Liquors were still being imported. Customs officials had estimated several years would elapse before revenues would be restored to their former figures. That the deficit was made up in a single year is attributed to the increase of all manufactured articles imported, and to the fact that the abolition of the liquor traffic has diverted large sums to her business.

As fish and other exports are commanding high prices because war conditions, with resultant prosperity in the Island and demand for labor which cannot be met, other believe that the revenue for the next year will show a still further increase.

Home News From Abroad
We take the following from the Halifax Chronicle of date Jan. 25:
DEFICIT MADE UP BY NEWFOUNDLAND.
Handicap Imposed by Prohibition Has Been Overcome.
St. John's, Nfld. Jan. 23.—The handicap imposed upon the customs revenues of Newfoundland by the passage of the Act which made illegal the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors after December 31, 1916, has been entirely overcome. The revenue for the calendar year 1917 amounting to \$4,424,476, was more by \$25,876 than that for 1916, when liquors were still being imported.
Customs officials had estimated that several years would elapse before revenues would be restored to former figures. That the deficit was made up in a single year is attributed to the increase of all manufactured articles imported, and to the fact that the abolition of the liquor traffic has diverted large sums to other businesses.
As fish and other exports are commanding high prices because of war conditions, with resultant general prosperity in the island and demand for labor which cannot be met, officials believe that the revenue for the current year will show a still further increase.


