





Meanwhile the city suffers. It is not at all perfectly clear to the ordinary citizen as to what is meant by the various opinions ventilated in the newspapers. What is quite visible to him, however, is that conditions in the city are rapidly becoming worse and worse as time goes on, and no Municipal benefits are accruing, though taxes have to be paid with unremitting regularity.

It were better perhaps for the citizens themselves, were they to call a public meeting and thresh the whole matter out there and then. To make their decision effective this meeting should be convened before the Legislature closes in order that the result may be communicated to the law-makers. In a matter of this sort, considering its vital importance to everyman and woman, yes and child, there should be some way of uniting popular sentiment and having the whole affair adjusted on the basis of the greatest good to the greatest number.

This, however, is not necessarily an argument for giving him his liberty, and the New York Times would cage him up and claims to see ways of doing it legally, and believes that, on the whole, it would come nearest to punishing him as he deserves, since "capital punishment seems miserably inadequate in his case."

"That would end his sufferings at once. Remorse, the tortures and torments that will prey upon his mind and soul would seem to be a penalty more nearly commensurate with his crimes; so long as he holds his former greatness in memory he must be the most miserable man on earth. That he must be under restraint, a prisoner, that he must never be a free man, is indicated by common prudence. There the Conference will be upon solid ground, with a multitude of precedents to ustify the process against the ex-Kaiser, with the whole body of of the court. There will be no difficulty in drawing up the indict-ment against him for many and flagrant violations of international law; and the supreme law of selfdefence and safety gives abundant sanction, after conviction, for a sentence imposing restraint or imprisonment. The decision of the Council that he must be placed on trial may be expected to lead to that end."

Under the head-line, "Naughty, Naughty Wilhelm!" the Pittsburg Gazette-Times ridicules the plan to let him off with a mere reprimand, and declares, "Keen disappointment will be felt over the decision reported to have been made at Paris that the former Kaiser can not be legally executed for starting the worldwar and ordering or approving the atrocities which characterized the German operations." As for the objection that it is bad policy to make martyr of him, the Baltimore Manufacturers' Record asks: "When a vile criminal has been hanged, does he become a martyr?" and the Ashville (N.C.) Citizen emphatically objects to "cheating the gallows."-Literary





Consequently, on her return to London she took a studio out Chelsea way, and now has it converted into a kind of chapel. The walls are decorated with devices of skulls, crossbones, eyes, little fingers, and representatives of Oriental evil deities.

It was the telegram from 300 members of Parliament which brought him to London, and his assurance to them was the same as he gave them in his telephoned reply to their telegram-namely, that he stands by his election pledges and that the peace terms will be found to be entirely in accord with those pledges. We will withhold our opinion as to this until we see the terms, but we have no doubt that in any event Mr. Lloyd George will vigorously maintain that he has kept his word. The country will judge, as we said on Monday. It will look at his pledges and it will look at his performances, and it will form its judgment on a fair comparion of the two things. We suspect the otherwise inexplicable ferocity of his allusions to the Northcliffe Press was due to a fear that the expectations he has aroused will not be fully satisfied, and that he wishes to discredit his critics in advance. 

(\$1.78) a yard, from which "standard" costumes, coat frocks, and unlined skirts were to be made for sale to the wearer at the respective prices of 75s. 9d. (\$18.92) 69s. 9d. (\$17.42) and 25s. 9d. (\$6.42) for other than extra out sizes. In addition, 1,-300,000 yards of a cheaper eloth were allocated for "standard" skirts only, to be sold at 22s. 6d. (\$5.60) lined and 15s. 11d. (\$3.97) unlined for normal figures. True, weather conditions have been mentioned freely in connection with the efforts now being made to win that \$50,000 but they have been mentioned in a wholly insufficient way. If the weather on as face is bad, the aviator will keep out of the air: if the weather looks as though it might be favorable, he will start, and trust to a benevolent Providence to see him safely across. This does not constitute adequate discussion of a determining factor. Weather is a complex of temperat-

ure, humidity, pressure, wind direction and velocity, precipitation. On all these heads there is much to be said with regard to the difference between conditions at the surface and above it, between conditions over land and over water. There is much to be said, much even to be learned, with regard to average and extreme values under each head mentioned, with regard to seasonal and local and casual variations, with regard to probable values at a given time and place, with regard to the effect of each of these factors upon the functioning of plane and pilot. There are special ramifications to be discussed with regard to fog, its altitude, duration and extent. and with regard to other items of

equally special nature. A compilation of what we know and what we hope to find out under each of these heads is essential to flight across the ocean on any basis other than that of a sporting proposition with death. Accordingly, the United States Weather Bureau has assigned one of its meteorologists to investigate the subject; and among his duties is that of being present at the starting point of trans-Atlantic flight to advise the aviators upon weather conditions. Further than this, he has prepared a statement showing just what bearing the meteorological conditions known and suspected to exist along the probable routes of flight may have upon the success of the venture. This state ment considers the various questions which we have suggested, and disposes of them so far as it is possible to do so.-Scientific American.
