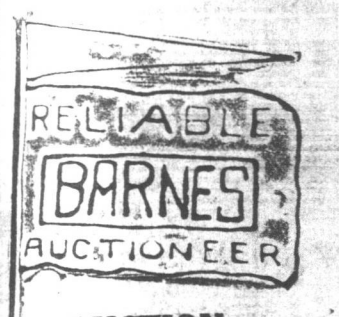

Six Months Imprisonment for Lord Alfred Douglas.

Rebels Execute Mexican General—Labour Demands Government's Plans to Relieve Unemployment.

CHANCELLOR MARK INTERVIEW.

BERLIN, Dec. 13. The German Chancellor's first reception of foreign press representatives yesterday was an occasion of unrelieved gloom and the keynote of his address was that Germany was absolutely at the end of her resources. In reply to a question as to the possibility of Germany appealing to the League of Nations, he stated, on behalf of Chancellor Marx, that Germany has not yet resolved to throw herself upon the League, but might as a last resource be forced to adopt that course.

RETRENCHMENT IN GERMANY.

LONDON, Dec. 13. As a result of salary cuts, decided upon by the German Government, President Ebert will receive only £1,500 a year and Chancellor Marx £1,200, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Daily Express. Members of the Reichstag will get £170.

UNCONFIRMED STATEMENT.

PARIS, Dec. 13. The German Government to-day formally announced its intention to initiate direct negotiations with the French, concerning the Rhineland and the Ruhr, according to a Havas despatch from Berlin.

AUSTRALIA SEEKING BETTER DEBT TERMS.

LONDON, Dec. 13. Premier Bruce of Australia, speaking in London to-night, revealed that his Government is negotiating with the British Government for revision of the terms under which the Australian war debt to Great Britain was funded two years ago at five per cent. Interest with one per cent. sinking fund provision. Mr. Bruce explained that Great Britain since that time had funded her debt to the United States under much more advantageous terms, and also that five per cent. was higher than customary rates were likely to be in the coming years.

CHURCHILL VINDICATED.

LONDON, Dec. 13. Lord Alfred Douglas was found guilty by a jury in Old Bailey today, of criminal libel upon Winston Churchill, former First Lord of the Admiralty, by publication of a statement that Mr. Churchill issued a false communication after the Battle of Jutland for the purpose of influencing the stock markets. Lord Alfred was sentenced to six months in prison, at the expiration of which he must find security to keep the peace, particularly towards Mr. Churchill. Failing to find security he must undergo another six months imprisonment.

THE SINGAPORE PROJECT.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The British Government in cancelling the proposed tour of inspection by the Earl of Cavan, of the General Staff, to Singapore and Australian ports, is accepted here as definite abandonment of the project to construct a big naval base at Singapore by the Government.

LABOR PARTY ACTIVE.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The Baldwin Government was called upon by the Labor Party in a resolution passed during an executive session of the party this morning to make immediate public announcement of its plans for dealing with the unemployment problem.

REBELS EXECUTE CAPTURED GENERAL.

NOGALES, Arizona, Dec. 13. The rebel force at Manzanillo, Mexico, have captured and executed Miguel Pina, of the Federal Army, who was returning to Mexico City from Lower California, where he had been on a mission for President Obregon, according to advices received in official circles to-day.

MEXICAN SITUATION UNCHANGED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. The Mexican Embassy here issued a statement to-day, saying that information received from official circles at Mexico City was that the military situation in the Republic has been unchanged since yesterday's reports. The Federation Government says the statement "control the whole Republic except a small section of Vera Cruz and Jalisco."

ARRESTED ON SMUGGLING CHARGE.

HALIFAX, Dec. 31. Captain Dicks of the Charlottetown sloop D. C. Mulhull, is under arrest here to-night following investigations by mounted police at Mahone, which resulted in a charge of liquor smuggling involving spirits said to be valued at thirty thousand dollars. The warrant was sworn out to-day and this afternoon the officers boarded the schooner which is lying at Black and Finn's wharf, and placed the skipper under arrest. He will be taken to Mahone to-morrow. The D. C. Mulhull was in difficulties last summer, when seized within the three mile limit with a cargo of liquor, but was later released when no proof was advanced that there had been any efforts at smuggling.

NEW BANK STATEMENT.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13. An increase of \$166,378,119 in the total assets of the Canadian Banks and of \$416,630,209 in the total liabilities over September figures, is shown in the bank statement for October, issued by the Finance Department this evening. The large increase in the total liabilities is to the shareholders consisting of capital and reserve fund which must be shown in the total under this head. Heretofore, though these figures appeared in the bank statement, they were not included in the total liabilities. Oct. statement is the first under the amended act.

Alberta Aims to Leave Arid Her New Liquor Law

PLANS TO BLEND DRYNESS WITH WETNESS IN MEASURE YET DEMANDED.

CABINET VIEWS.

EDMONTON'S PROHIBITION MAYOR SLATED TO HEAD BOARD IN CHARGE.

Alberta promises to be the first Province in the Dominion to attempt real temperance.

When the Provincial Legislature meets early in the New Year, it is predicted that it will have laid before it the draft of an act that will not so much represent Government control of liquor, as that phrase is generally understood, but rather controlled consumption of liquors of all sorts.

Following the recent referendum, when a majority of more than 30,000 was rolled up for Clause D, or "Government control and sale of all liquor," the popular assumption was that Alberta "had gone wet." But there are degrees of wetness, and if the Legislature gets through with the new liquor act, it is safe to say that Alberta will discover that its wetness has a considerable amount of dryness mixed in with it. All indications are that Alberta will have something quite different from anything that has been yet set down on the statute books of the Canadian provinces.

Information from the Parliament Buildings here shows that there are several reasons for this assumption. In the first place, practically all the members of the Cabinet are either strong prohibitionists or else have dry inclinations. Premier Greenfield has gone on record as declaring that prohibition is a good public policy. Hon. Alex. Ross, Minister of Public Works, came out just prior to the referendum with a strong declaration in favor of continuation of the prohibitory legislation. Hon. George Hoadley, Minister of Agriculture, is a prohibitionist of long standing. Mrs. Irene Parfily was an active worker for the dry forces during the referendum. Attorney-General Brownlee, under whose care will be the administration of the liquor vending department, is one of Alberta's most rigid prohibitionists. Hon. R. G. Reid, Provincial Treasurer, only recently told a country audience that he was in favor of making the new act as "temperance as possible." Hon. Percival Baker, Minister of Education, is a "dry" and that leaves only Hon. Vernon Smith who, while not publicly on record either way, will hardly go against his colleagues.

In the second place, prohibition has been a plank in the political platform of the organized farmers of the province, and Alberta's is a Farmer Government. And, finally, emissaries of the Government sent to study the systems of Government control, now in force in Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia, have been specially instructed to make careful examination of the weaknesses of these systems. Alberta intends to guard against any legislative or administrative defects.

It is not increased revenues through liquor sales that the Government is studying to-day. That is a secondary consideration. It is rather how to really control the consumption of liquor and yet to meet the wishes of the people of Alberta—or at least the wishes of the majority—that liquor be available for beverage purposes.

Several broad principles are emerging from the various Cabinet meetings. First of all, it appears practically certain that hard liquors will be obtainable only at Government liquor shops. And these will not be any too plentiful. Furthermore, anyone buying liquor will be required to carry with him a Government permit, that will limit amounts and times.

It is over beer that the real battle is taking place. The hotels, every one of them, want to sell beer. Restaurant keepers declare that they should also be allowed to sell the beverage with meals if the hotels are to be allowed to do so. Clubs here and clubs there, and clubs that have suddenly been organized, want to sell beer to their members. It is amid the clamor for the right to sell beer that the Government is having its real test of strength.

Members of the Cabinet do not want to "put beer in every home" or anything like it. Most of them regard beer as an alcoholic liquid that needs strict control just as much as the hard stuff does.

So, as a real temperance effort, it is understood that the Legislature will be asked to allow:

1—That beer may be sold by Government vendors;

2—That certain selected hotels and then only one for each so many thousands of population, be permitted to sell beer with meals;

3—That clubs, that have been in existence for a certain specified period before the holding of the referendum, be allowed to sell beer to their members;

Besides these limitations on the sale of beer, the Government will go further in temperance legislation. It is assumed that local option clauses will allow any municipality to vote itself

out of the wet belt. Another important restriction, practically assured, is that all forms of liquor or beer advertising will be prohibited. It is predicted that Mayor D. M. Duggan, of Edmonton, who retires from his civic post at the end of this year, and who is a strong prohibitionist, will be appointed to the Liquor Commission that will be set up to handle the sales and general business connected with the vending of liquor. It is more than probable that Mr. Duggan will get the Chairmanship of this Board. Meanwhile, with an optimism that

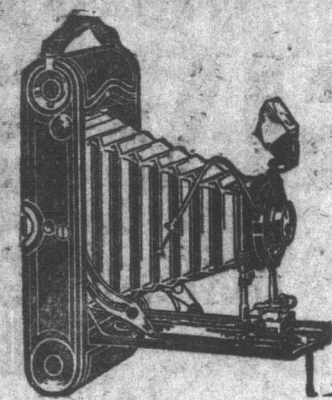
will not be downed by any logic, there is a great rush of those who want to get jobs in the new liquor selling branch of the Government, those who want to be named "vendors" in the smaller centers and those who want to get permits to handle beer. The incorporation of Clubs has commenced—clubs that on the face of it are being formed for the sole purpose of selling beer.

It would appear also that every merchant in the small villages, and towns is hopeful of being named vendor. The secretary of the Alberta Retail Merchants' Association is be-

ing inundated with letters from members suggesting that their names be placed before the Attorney-General as an ideal vendor. The cities of the Province are getting ready to ask that they be given fifty per cent. of the profits from liquor sold within their boundaries. The suggestion first came from Mayor Hardie, of Lethbridge, known in Alberta as "the man with the monocle." He went even further and proposed that the cities ask for absolute control in regard to the licensing of premises within cities where liquor was to be sold.

In the meantime, all Alberta is waiting impatiently for the session to open and the actual text of the new liquor act made public. No matter what the Government lays before the House, it is almost certain that the debate on the bill will be long and acrimonious. The drys may not think the measure dry enough; and it may be considered wet enough.

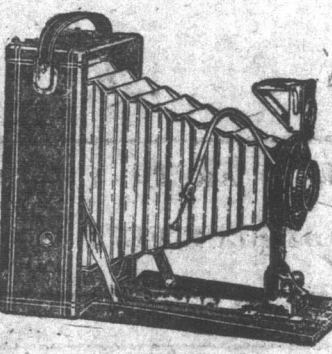

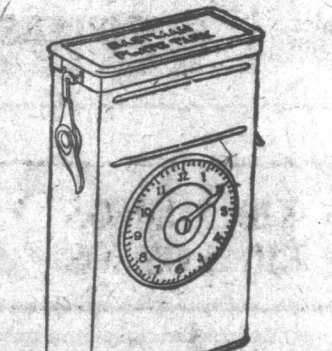

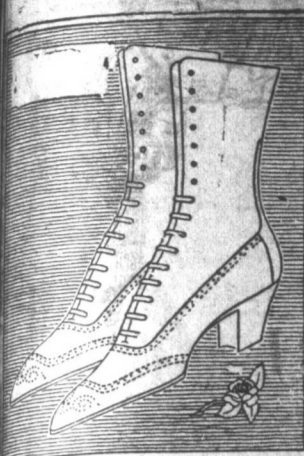

Real Meaning of Judgment Defined

NOTHING IN BIBLE JUSTIFIES CONCEPTION OF THREE WORDS—CHRIST'S MEANING—DAMNATION, HELL AND EVERLASTING ARE MISUNDERSTOOD WORDS.

"There are three words about Judgment that have been grievously misread—Damnation, Hell, Everlasting. Let me make the statement straight out and challenge any scholar to contradict it, that there is nothing in Christ's words in the original language of the Bible that justifies the use of these English words in the meaning that we now attach to them, a meaning that was not in them when our authorized version was printed." This was the assurance of Rev. Dr. Paterson-Smyth in his sermon preached last evening in St. George's Church and broadcast by wireless throughout Canada and the United States.

"When you read of Damnation and of Everlasting Punishment, keep your eyes always on the face of Christ and whisper in your puzzled heart that nothing can happen out of character with Him. His poor servants have felt this and been perplexed by teachings that jar horribly. Scholars have felt this and gone back to read their New Testament. You see some of the results in the present revised bible where Damn now reads condemn, without saying to what or for how long. The word Everlasting means age-long or belonging to the future age."

Lifts Curtain.
Judgment was the most prominent and solemn thought of the Advent, and he directed the thoughts of his congregation to the Great Assize, and to the text taken from the Te Deum "We believe that Thou shalt come to be our judge." All through His teachings Jesus keeps lifting the curtain for glimpses of a farther horizon, for men must see life truly by seeing Eternity around it, and regulate their conduct by constant reference to the final verdict of God.

"No teachings of His got more prompt response in the conscience of His audience. For no sensible man, Christian or non-Christian, doubts the probability at least of a final judgment of some kind, because the conviction has no authority deeper and more fundamental than the Bible. The conviction is worn into the very fibre of our moral being. There is a rough common sense and a rough moral sense in us all which imperatively demands that it shall not be the same in the end, for Herod and John the Baptist, for Jesebel and Mary of Bethany, for Father Damien, who sacrificed his life for the lepers, and Napoleon, who waded through bloodshed to a throne. Conscience insists it ought to be, and Jesus places on this the seal of His confirmation. It shall be."

Judgment Certain.
"The details need not be pressed. Whether, for example, we are to take literally His dramatic picture of the Great White Throne with all humanity gathered before it. All that is important is this, that whether a day or in an age, whether in a flash of a moment or in the slow, gradual growth of character towards the right hand or the left, there shall be, says conscience, there shall be, says Christ, one day a Judgment, a great sorting of human souls."

"Now come to the question, on what principle shall judgment be made? It shall be a judgment according to character. God will judge every man, not according to appearances or professions or beliefs or shibboleths, but according to his likeness or unlikeness to the nature of Christ. I doubt if any man shall be asked in the Judgment 'Do you believe in Christ?' The final test is, 'What has the faith wrought in you? What have you become?' What brings us to the solemn thought that the Judgment is not merely something away in the future. It is going on to-day. Every day acts are growing into habits, and habits growing into character, and character is fixing destiny. We are becoming the people who should go to the right hand or to the left."

"The Bible would suggest not that God comes out of His place to put us at the right hand or the left, but that we sort ourselves. Those who have groped after Christ on earth will be on one side, because of their own choice. They are of one kind. Those who have lived for self and sin will be on the other, because of their own choice. They are of another kind. I do want to impress on you the awful solemnity of this fact. But I want also to guard any poor, timid strugglers against that sense of horror and fearfulness so often associated with the Judgment. Never forget the Fatherhood of God, the tender Brotherhood of Jesus, who could see the good motive behind the mistaken action, who could see the sorrow and remorse deep in men's hearts when others see only their failure and sin. Watch Him, in the Judgment picture, searching out the little deeds which good men have forgotten."

The service was followed by an organ recital by Dr. J. P. Halsey.—Montreal Star.

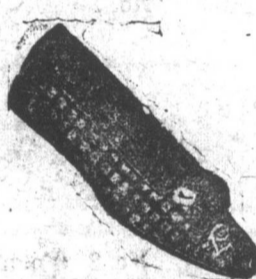

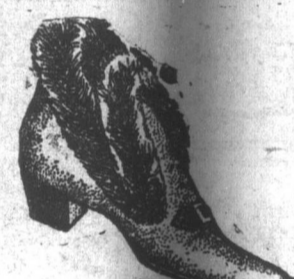

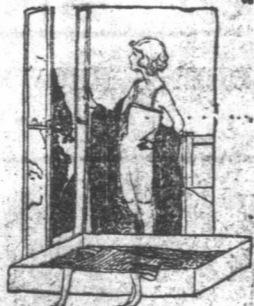

**Ostrich Feather Fan
in Luxor Tomb**

TRINKET SUPPLIES FURTHER EVIDENCE OF TUTENKHAMEN'S POMP.

LUXOR, Egypt, Dec. 5.—(Associated Press).—One of the articles of Tutenkhamen's funerary state in which modern, especially women, will take a sentimental as well as artistic interest, is the Pharaoh's great ostrich feather hat, now awaiting treatment in the tomb of Seti II, which has been fitted up as a laboratory.

Howard Carter, head of the expedition, found the fan more or less by accident, by opening at random one of the very many boxes in the so-called store room, that opens off the sepulchral room, and the contents of which have not yet to be inventoried.

The fan lay atop the other contents of the box, its bushy, curling feathers, apparently once white, discolored with age. Such interest has been excited by the relic of the pomp that once was Tutenkhamen's that a chemist is coming all the way from England especially to examine the best way of preserving the feathers. By making them right Mr. Carter hopes to proceed with the search for the handle, without the feathers falling to bits.

It is understood that Mr. Carter has reconciled himself to the possibility that nothing of very intricate value will be discovered in the store chamber, which, however, is known to contain articles of the highest artistic work. The excavators have satisfied themselves that the ancient tomb robbers made a good haul from the store chamber, for many of the boxes are empty. Others, still sealed, obviously hold articles which the expert eye of the thieves told them were uninteresting from their point of view, as they were in search of jewels or gold.

There was no work in the tomb yesterday, as it was the weekly market day in Luxor when the native staff of the expedition, receiving its pay, descends to the city to purchase its week's supplies.

Howard Carter, chief of the expedition engaged in uncovering the mysteries of Tutenkhamen's tomb, expects to-day to finish demolition of the partition wall between the ante-chamber and the mortuary. The barrier of planks erected to protect the wooden canopy over the sarcophagus in the latter room will then be removed prior to the delicate work of taking down the outer canopy or shrine.

The present aspect of the tomb is that of a workshop, with the men busy on the scaffolding which has been erected to the sepulchral chamber, and the whole scene thrown into bold relief by the brilliant rays of powerful electric lamps affixed to the ceiling.

At the far end of the chamber, facing the shrine, is a photographic screen and on the floor, roughly placed together on a wooden tray, are fragments of plaster from the inside of the demolished wall, garishly painted. These fragments are to be fitted together and preserved.

The manner in which the buffers of the tomb partitioned off the sepulchral chamber after building up the nest of shrines around the sarcophagus now is apparent. In the solid rock on the left, when facing the shrine, they hollowed an irregular niche to carry the plaster which held the wall in place, and the loose stones of the latter were supported at intervals by short wooden beams.

A sort of buttress was thus built up to the right and left, forming a door, which was subsequently filled in and sealed. The beams, which are about the shape and size of small railway ties, are darkened with age and splintering at the sides, but within they are firm and hard, notwithstanding the great lapse of time, since they were put into place.

**Rhodes Scholarship
Propaganda Device**

PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN DENIES HEARING CHARGES BEFORE.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 5.—(United News).—President E. A. Birge, of the University of Wisconsin, will investigate charges that the Cecil Rhodes scholarships are a "British propaganda device," he announced yesterday.

The charges were brought before the State University's board of regents by Senator John E. Cashman, a member of the board, and the regents consent to Birge's offer to investigate in an attempt to determine whether anything "sinister" lies behind the scholarships.

"If what I hear is true," said Cashman, "the Rhodes scholarships are a scheme to make traitors out of American boys. Every year, two men from every state in the Union, selected for their qualities of leadership, are sent to Oxford University.

"If these men are expected to return to the United States to foster sentiment for the extension of the British Empire, I am opposed to the University of Wisconsin taking any part in it. I believe that if American boys know of this purpose, they would disdain to touch a penny of that

The Medical Officer of Health reported 20 new cases of Scarlet Fever in the city during the past week, and 1 Diphtheria.
The City Clerk tabled Financial Statements to November 30th last, which were considered fairly satisfactory, particularly in view of the many calls upon the Council during the past year, most of them being urgent and necessary works, such as the repairs to water conduit from Windsor Lake, replacing of old storm sewers in the city, etc., which considerably increased the expenditure.
The reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, and other departmental heads were tabled.
Accounts presented were ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.

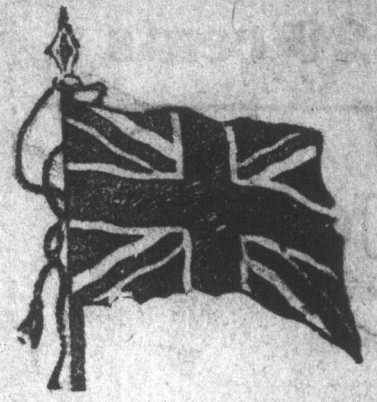

Mexico, the Russia of the New World.

The rebellion which has broken out in Mexico and which threatens to become widespread has received but little notice owing to the fact that the date of the outbreak of hostilities corresponded with an event which evoked world-wide interest to the exclusion of everything else, namely the elections in Great Britain.

There is no doubt, however, that the Mexican revolution will be watched closely by the various Powers, for most of them, and particularly America, have vast interests in the country in the form of lands, railways, oil wells and various other mining concessions.

The outbreak is due directly to the Presidential election campaign, but it is really the culmination of a series of grievances which date back to at least 1913, when President Wilson for ethical reasons refused to recognize Huerta as President, in spite of the earnest solicitations of the American Ambassador, Henry Lane Wilson that he should do so. Huerta, it will be remembered was, not without reason, suspected of the murder of his predecessor, Francisco Madero, and it was on those grounds that President Wilson repudiated his claims and gave his support to Carranza.

Carranza was inclined to be moderate in his views, whereas radical tendencies were general in Mexico, and it was not long before he found himself engulfed in this movement for reforms of a revolutionary nature. Roughly speaking, the movement had for its objects the appropriation of the lands which had in course of time come under the control of a few landlords, and its redistribution among the 12,000,000 Indians, whose condition under the system was desperate in the extreme.

The object was a worthy one, but in the Act under which the lands were to become the property of the State, no provision was made to safeguard the interests of foreign investors whose properties, unless they were sufficiently strong to protect them, were liable to seizure with the rest. Carranza, although inclined to remain conservative, was more or less at the mercy of radical leaders who were actual members of his ministry. Chief among them was General Obregon who in 1920 aspired to the Presidency. He was, however, imprisoned by Carranza, but escaped, assumed the leadership of the opposition, in other words of the revolutionary party, and Carranza, realizing that his chances were hopeless fled to Vera Cruz. Here he met his death in the manner which is more or less customary in such countries where acts of violence are resorted to in political disputes.

The United States refused to recognize Obregon for the same reason that it had refused to accept Huerta, and with the exception of Spain and Germany,

the other powers followed her example. In 1921 the Obregon Administration made a bid for recognition by all the nations, but as he considered that the terms suggested by the late President Harding as the price of recognition were humiliating to Mexico, the negotiations came to an end.

Last spring a conference was finally arranged by an American oil operator in Mexico, and on August 15th an agreement satisfactory to all parties was arranged. It was not long before the extremists in the country saw their opportunity to create a disturbance. Another presidential election was due, and Adolfo de la Huerta announced that he would be a candidate. His rival in the field was General Calles whom he had previously agreed to support. The former had been Finance Minister, the latter Minister of the Interior. Charges had been made against Huerta of gross extravagance while in office, and the charges were supported by President Obregon. Disturbances at first of a minor nature took place between the two factions, but on October 31st five persons were killed and many injured in a demonstration in Mexico City. More serious clashes followed until at last the whole country was aroused.

The chief hotbed of Red radicalism is Vera Cruz, while for some time socialist agitators have been in absolute control of the state of Yucatan. In fact the whole of Mexico, which ever since its independence of Spain was effected, has been torn by civil war and insurrections, is fruitful soil for the revolutionary propagandists.

Portia for Westward

S.S. Portia, Capt. Connors, sailed for the westward at 3 p.m., taking a full cargo and as passengers—J. Wakley, F. Mayo, Fr. Badocek and 10 in steerage. The ship will call at the various ports as far west as Boerne Bay. Later she will proceed to Bay of Islands to load a cargo of herring for Halifax, to be transhipped to New York.

Seeking Relief Works

Daily during the past week a number of men have been assembling near the Board of Works Department seeking relief work. The number has now grown to about 50 and some of the men are anticipating that relief will be given this winter in the form of work breaking. So far as can be learned the Government has not decided on any relief works nor has the unemployment situation been brought officially to its notice.

Other Times Other Methods

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(Canadian Press)—Veterans of Kid Dropper's school of crime, Monk Eastman's clique of desperados and Paul Kelly's brotherhood of murder, laughed in derision when they heard the Diamond brothers and their allies and friends described as a "gang," says the New York Tribune.
 How could it be a gang without a leader? They wanted to know. What code of ethics guided them? Did they ever fight over women? Over a matter of jurisdiction? Did one of them hold life and death sway over his comrades? No, the murder of two bank messengers in cold blood might recall the ways of old time gangsters, but it was folly to speak of a gang.
 The truth is that modern business methods have made the gang spirit passe. Specialization is the cry of the age. One clique goes in for boot-legging, another for dope selling, another for automobile thefts, another for pay-roll hold-ups. Crime requires brains as much as daring nowadays, and a chummy spirit with wise politicians is essential.
 The clique constantly changes in personnel. Some of their members are killed off. Others retire into respectability after making a rich haul. There is a great deal of money floating around, thanks to prohibition. Liquor is bought and paid for strictly in cash. Highrollers accumulate wealth in thousand-dollar bills, and not so long ago a hand-died leaving \$100,000 to his family.
 Bill Lovett in Brooklyn, and Kid Dropper were really the last of the tribe so far as Napoleonic leadership of a group of criminals is concerned. With their violent removal the mantle of a czar of crime falls upon no one in particular. And even they in no wise compared with Monk Eastman, who boasted once that he made half the big politicians of the time.
 Monk Eastman, for example, had his men lined up behind him in battle array. When Paul Kelly tried to make some hauls in a territory which the Monk declared to be neutral, a feud began which, at one time, fifty men participated, standing behind "L" pillars in Allen Street, and banging away at one another. Their marksmanship was accurate and the death toll heavy.
 There were always novitiates ready to step in the ranks and fill the empty places, however. The Monk survived a thousand fights, and when he died, they found him bullet-scarred from head to foot. Kid Dropper in a more recent way pursued a different method. He didn't bother to declare war. Having been aroused, he very promptly shot to kill and asked questions afterwards, "squealing" such as features the present question of the Diamond brothers and their allies, is nothing new in the annals of crime, of course. It is that which has aided the police immeasurably in rounding up the criminals they have now in hand, and is daily bringing them new tips.

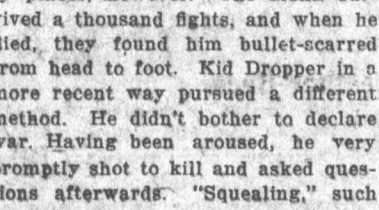

TODAY'S MESSAGES.

TANGIER DISPUTE AMICABLY SETTLED.

LONDON, Dec. 14. From next week onward, Tangier will be understood to be a neutral zone, and the cessation of hostilities in the Morocco dispute is the unanimous agreement on the points which for the last fifty years have caused so much friction between Great Britain, France, Spain, Italy and Germany. The agreement will be signed in Paris on Monday or Wednesday and will be submitted for ratification by the parliamentary bodies of the various governments soon after. The treaty in Morocco will be regarded as an integral part of the League of Nations, and the port in time of war and an open port for trade of all nations, controlled by the British, are recognized. The city will enjoy a special measure of home rule and will be administered by the Sultan assisted by experts representing the Powers having interests there.

POSTAL STRIKE IN AUSTRIA SETTLED.

VIENNA, Dec. 14. The strike of postal workers which has been in progress several days, and which practically isolated Austria from communication with the outside world, has ended. The strikers to-day agreed to accept the Government's plan for the provision of adequate salaries for public employees which will be adopted by parliament without modification. The Government agreed to the creation of a commission for economies effected by employees, and to pay a bonus at Christmas of seven thousand crowns each.

FORCES CLASH IN MEXICO.

JUAREZ, Mexico, Dec. 14. Official despatches received here to-day contain reports of the first clash between the Federal forces and those of General Estrada, the rebel, in Jalisco. A fight occurred to-day in Colatlan, according to reports, and resulted in a victory for the Federal troops.

Steinmetz the Wizard

(By LINDSAY DENISON).

HE NEVER HAD A SALARY.
He Worked To Free Mankind of Toll
He Feared Women And Loved
Children—Socialist, He Ignored
Man-Made Rules.

"I have invented nothing," said
Steinmetz. "I count, measure and
record. What they call inventions
are the signposts of my progress."
Yet in his laboratory a little more
than a year ago he set up a man-made
thunderbolt machine which hurled
destructive at his will into a miniature
village. Picturesque as was the de-
monstration, he regarded it as val-
uable for the amusement it gave him
in the amazed admiration of the
scientists who had come to rever-
him as a master of them all. His real
object in creating the marvel was to
find a way by which the energy wast-
ed in nature could be made to relieve
humanity of toll—a problem which
carried right on with him when the
reproduction of a thunderstorm fell
short of its solution.

The chief of one of the Nation's
most thoroughly organized corpora-
tions he was a sober Socialist. He
believed the Government should main-
tain a monopoly of everything and do
it by electricity. He would not ride
if he could help it in a vehicle driven
by gasoline explosions. Utterly ab-
stemious in gratifying his animal ap-
petites he angrily maintained his
right to gratify them if he pleased,
as he did not.

Steinmetz walked into the Schene-
ctady plant of the General Electric
Company for the first time and found
himself confronted by a "No Smoke
sign" in the solemnly luxurious
offices provided for him. He went to
the desk, twisted a torn piece of pa-
per into a swab-brush and painted a
placard which he pinned under the
no smoking sign. It read: "No
Smoking; no Steinmetz." He went
home and stayed there three days un-
till the company sent an ambassa-
dorial committee to coax him back by
promising that all the no-smoking
signs should come down.

Perhaps in a sympathy born of his
own misshapen figure, his best be-
loved pet was a gila monster; he built
a great conservatory on the side of
his house and filled it with cactus
plants and lighted it with eerie mer-
cury lamps to "bring out the full
glory of their color."

Steinmetz with all his confidence
had a sturdy belief in himself as a
prophet. America as he saw it was a
sleepy giant who rather than make
the most of what God offered him
He foresaw a time when all rivers,
brooks and rills would be dammed
until they became canals with an
electricity generating station at every
change of level concentrating their
product at public centres with which
to furnish every citizen with light,
heat and power to do every task from
washing dishes to erecting a bridge.
He saw the continent grid-dled with
roads of steel which would carry elec-
tric trains at three miles a minute.
His future world was a mechanical
playhouse in which the joy of living
would take the place of the living
wage.

Steinmetz was utterly unconscious
of the abnormal qualities of his re-
sourcefulness. He had a little camp
on the Mohawk river where he went
to be alone by himself. He could
think best when he was fishing, he
said. He came back to the Schene-
ctady plant with the solution of an in-
tricate problem which could only have
been worked out by logarithms.
"I didn't know you had taken your
logarithm tables with you," said his
secretary, when he turned over his
notes to her to be typewritten.
"No," he said, cursing himself ment-
ly for his lack of foresight. "I had to
stop fishing and take a pencil and
make out a table of logarithms before
I could get the thing straight."

He carried his faith in the right of
man to be comfortable, regardless of
conventions, into his dress. He went
about his work in a sleeveless under-
shirt and a sweater, according to the
weather and to the affectionate scan-
dal of his clerks and stenographers
who loved him as much as he feared
them.

When asked why he did not arrange
for a fixed salary for his services, he
answered: "Man wants but little here
below; but he never knows how lit-
tle until he finds he can have every-
thing he wants."
"One great way of conserving life,"
he said, "is to spare the burdens of
memory. I never remember a man
by his name or his face. I remember
him as the man who said this or the
man who did this."

Steinmetz was almost kept out of
the United States when he came in
1889. Ellis Island regarded him as
likely to become a public charge; be-
sides his jaw was all out of shape
with a toothache.
He had been exiled from Germany
because he was rightfully suspected
of being an active Socialist and the
Lusk of his day to whom Socialism
was only another name for anarchy
tried to put him in prison—where
they did put a lot of his friends. He
put his scientific mind of secret licks
and codes and evaded arrest for a
time. At Zurich he attended univer-
sity lectures and studied electricity.

Household Notes.
Roll stuffed eggs first in bread-

Modern astronomy, which is achieving such startling results, is aided by a variety of wonderful new and improved instruments by accumulations of photographic and other records for comparison with new observations, and in no small

degree by work in the clear air of elevated stations. The new 26-inch refractor for the Union Observatory of Johannesburg, to be located at an altitude of 5,925 feet in south latitude 26 deg. 1', will complete a half-dozen astronomical observatories at heights of more than a mile above sea-level. The others are the Arequipa Observatory of Harvard College, with an

elevation of 8,041 feet. Kodakanal, Camaguey, 7,688 feet; Tambora, Mexico, 7,619 feet; Flagstaff, Arizona, 7,280 feet; and Mount Wilson, Cal., 5,900 feet. Gaspesia is Last Ship for Quebec

The last steamer to enter port from down the river and the last one to leave here for Quebec entered the local harbor at 6 p.m. last evening. She is the well-known river steamer Gaspesia of the Clarke Steamship Co. Captain William Tremblay of the Gaspesia reported that he had no trouble whatever in navigating between Quebec and Montreal beyond the fact that he had to proceed by daylight, using the winter spar buoys which gave him all the aid necessary. The ship anchored overnight just above Port Neuf taking twenty-four hours to make the trip.

To-morrow morning the Gaspesia leaves this port at daybreak for points on the Gaspe coast with a general cargo in which flour bulks quite largely. Although the last boat of the year to proceed downstream, the Gaspesia will not have the harrowing experience of the John S. Thom, a river steamer which got ripped last season at the same period in the ice near Sorel. The John S. Thom had a cargo of coal and had to spend the winter in mid-stream, only being released with the greatest difficulty when the breakup took place. Capt. Hayes of Dale & Co. was the hero of this exploit.

Close Gulf Shipping

It was further announced to-day that the mail service to the north shore of the lower gulf has just been discontinued as far as water transport is concerned. The steamers North Shore and Labrador reached Quebec on Tuesday and Monday, respectively, and will winter there.

A look-out was being kept in the local harbor for one small vessel which was expected to be the last to reach here from the Great Lakes, namely the Vigilant. This ship was reported to be leaving Midland for Montreal and would have to pass the narrows at Detroit where all the gas buoys have been picked up. Word received to-day from the Harbor Master at Midland cancelled this arrangement and the Vigilant will spend the winter at Windsor instead.

As far as is known, the river steamer Wisteria which was expected to follow the Gaspesia from Quebec is not coming.—Montreal Star, Dec. 5.

Industrial Gas From Sewage

In the attempt in the Ruhr coal district to utilize the methane, or marsh gas, given off by decaying sewage, a nearly horizontal roof has been built by three feet below water-level in the collecting tank, and over an opening in this of about two by three feet a funnel-shaped gas hood has been placed, with its edge just below the water surface. With this new construction, it is estimated that a city of 100,000 inhabitants will get 11,000,000 cubic feet of combustible gas annually from its sewage. Being free from hydrogen, the gas is said to be especially suitable for welding and cutting, and in the Ruhr seems to find a ready sale.

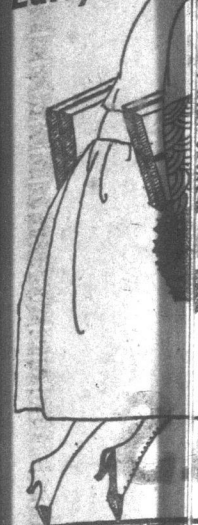
