





Line the poor, the habitual crimhal is always with us. Addressing the grand Jury at Salterd Sessions the Recorder, Mr. A. M. Langdon, oberved that to magistrates and reorders all over the country the haitual criminal was a source of great rouble. He was a man who committed smaller or greater offences— stealing from people who could ill alford to lose anything; sometimes venturing upon premises where the loss would be less felt, but always engaged in crime from the moment he left prison until he returned again to gaol. The habitual criminal was one of a class-not a large class he was happy to say that existed all over the country, and the difficulty that faced those who administered justice was how to deal with these men. "If you give them a long sentence," the Recorder went on, "the country is burdened with the charge of their keep; if you give them a short sentence they leave prison and repeat the same or similar offences against those who can ill afford to suffer by their depredation. Many years ago Sir John Anderson, who was at the head of the Prison Board, and devoted a great deal of attention to this subject. came to the conclusion that a system of preventive detention was the wisest course to adopt in England, and as modification of the system which he proposed has been introduced. What I desire you to think about is whether that system should not be extended as far as possible. If by some system men of that classan incurable, unemployable, and hopeless class could be separated from the rest of the community, two advantages would result." In the first case, he explained, those who suffered they were scattered about and generally poor people who could hardly voice their complaint-would be protected from further inroads upon their property and, in the second place he was inclined to think that the expense in which the various communities were involved would brobably be reduced, for the reason that

For instance, in a test carried out in Rome a concert and a lecture were both transmitted simultaneously from the same aerial and on the same wave length, and were picked up separately on the same receiving aerial, while another station transmitting on exactly the same wave length was unable to cause any interference. The latter point is quoted as an illustration of the second result achieved by the inventionnamely, an escape from jamming. Further, the system is said to afford privacy of communication, for it appears that the waves sent out by Dr. Hammond's transmitter are virtually immune from interception by unauthorized stations. If not actually impossible, Dr. Hammond holds that interception of intelligible signals would e exceedingly difficult, while it would require such elaborate preparation that its detection and suppression

In the course of a conference on aberculosis held a few years ago, it was stated that this disease alone costs Great Britain no less than thirteen and a half million pounds a year Think of it-more than a million a month, or about £40,000 a day! Rheumatism is not usually count-

ed as a serious malady; yet it cripples or partially cripples so many of us that it is reckoned that the labour lost through the affliction in this country is worth between five and six aillions yearly.

Influenza is with us every year, and hen a really bad epidemic strikes the ountry, as happened in 1919, aboutone in five of the whole population suffers. The sick roll from influenza in hat year was nine millions, and there were nearly 150,000 deaths.


