

### Heart Beat by Wireless

HEARD BY DOCTORS MILES AWAY.

The heart beats of three men were sent a mile by telephone to the B.B.G. Studio at Cardiff, recently, and broadcasted from there to doctors, in an experiment to discover whether it might be possible for a doctor to diagnose the illness of a patient by wireless. The experiment was a remarkable success. An appeal was made to doctors in South Wales to the West of England to listen with the object of ascertaining at what distance the heart beats could be detected.

One of the men whose heart beats were broadcast was in perfect health, but the other two suffered from heart disease. A special microphone was strapped over the heart of each patient, and each microphone was connected to a twelve-valve amplifier.

One of the three doctors present remained in the room to superintend the patients while the other two went into another room in the studio and listened at a loud speaker.

Startling Results. The twelve-valve amplifier was connected with the telephone wire, which carried the sounds to the transmitting station a mile away. From there the beats were transmitted by wireless back to the B.B.G. studio, and were heard by the two doctors.

"The sounds were weak at first," said one of the doctors, "but after increased amplification it became possible for us to tell what was wrong with the hearts by the different beats. The heart beats in the case of the young man upon whom we first experimented were not at all times distinguishable, but with the men suffering from heart disease the results were good."

"We hope, before long, that excellent results of scientific value will be obtained through the medium of wireless telephony. We have been much impressed, and hope to experiment again shortly."

who had gathered on the field to watch. The test grew out of a discussion of an article in a newspaper concerning a man who had jumped off the Brooklyn Bridge. The parachute experts contended that a falling person retained his senses, and prevailed on Major William N. Hensley, commandant of the post, to let them prove their contention. Staff Sergeant Randle L. Bose and Corporal Arthur Bergo went aloft in a Martin bombing plane. When the machine had reached the 3,000-foot level they jumped. Down they plunged with their parachutes closed. The crowd gasped as the men shot through the air. After descending a short distance the aviators twisted, twisted and somersaulted. The visitors on the field ran toward the spot where they thought the men would fall in a heap. When the pair reached the 2,000-foot level they pulled the rip cords of the parachutes, which opened, and they sailed to the field like birds.

Before the crowd could question them about the sensations of the 1,000 foot dive, Bose and Bergo went up in the bombing plane again to re-

Major Hensley said that the test showed that a person in normal physical condition, jumping from the Woolworth building tower, would retain his senses until he reached the pavement. ## Germany Must Join the League Before France Supports the Pact

### S. Africa Favours a Reciprocal Preferential Tariff—Canada Lady M.P. Blames Working Conditions for Miners' Destitution—Premier Massey of New Zealand Seriously Ill.

#### THE FRENCH REPLY.

PARIS, Mar. 30. Requirements that Germany join the League of Nations without special favors or exemptions and announce clearly her intentions concerning the frontiers of Poland and Czechoslovakia before the French Government will sign with the Reich a European pact, will be the substance of the French reply to the recent German security offer.

#### FLOODS IN SASKATCHEWAN.

WOODROW, Sask., March 30. Three bridges in this district were carried away by flood waters Saturday and a fourth, the C.P.R. bridge across Wood River, was weakened by a rush of ice and water. While the families in the district have clung to their homes, practically all have made arrangements to leave at a moment's notice. The water was receding slowly this morning.

#### ARMSTRONG STILL SILENT.

OTTAWA, March 30. The Government has not received any communication from Premier Armstrong, of Nova Scotia, and the position of the Dominion Government has not changed in regard to conditions in the Nova Scotia coal fields, Premier King said in the House of Commons this afternoon.

#### ANXIETY OVER EARL OF YPRES.

LONDON, March 30. The Earl of Ypres, formerly Field Marshal French, who underwent an operation on March 19th, has developed symptoms which a bulletin issued to-day described as "disquieting." There is increased anxiety over his condition.

#### NEW ZEALAND'S PREMIER ILL.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., March 29. Premier Massey, of New Zealand, has undergone an operation. He has been indisposed for some time and more serious symptoms have now developed.

#### MURDER AND SUICIDE.

COBURG, Ont., March 30. The bodies of William Beare, aged 60, and his 14 year old son, were this morning found in a vacant house here, with their throats cut from ear to ear. The police are of opinion it is a case of murder and suicide.

#### BAIFOUR AT JERUSALEM.

JERUSALEM, March 30. The Earl of Balfour, accompanied by Sir Gilbert Clayton, Civil Secretary of the Palestine Government, and by a guard of honor, visited Christian and Jewish Holy places Sunday afternoon. The Earl is to open the new Hebrew University on April 1.

#### EIGHT HOUR DAY ON SHIPS.

PARIS, March 30. Eight hours "presence" aboard a ship, whether the sailor does any work or not, will be counted as a full day in the French Merchant Marine, under an order which is to be promulgated Wednesday. The new rule will be effective on April 10.

#### DIAMOND ROBBERY.

NEW YORK, March 30. Four armed men to-day raided the offices of Sobel & Kalcke, Diamond Brokers, in Maiden Lane, and escaped with diamonds valued at between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

#### AMUNDSEN'S EXPEDITION.

OSLO, Norway, March 30. Lincoln Ellsworth, engineer and aviator, who is to participate in Captain Raold Amundsen's flying expedition to the North Pole, arrived here to-day. He expected the entire aerial trip to be accomplished in seven hours, and if it proved possible to land, twenty-four hours will be spent in observation.

#### TO ATTEND RADIO CONFERENCE.

HALIFAX, March 30. Royal Reid, of St. John's, Nfld., and Major W. C. Borrett, Halifax, sailed this afternoon for England to represent Canada and Newfoundland at the International Amateur Radio Conference, in Paris. Mr. and Mrs. C. McK. Harvey and Miss Helen Reid, also of St. John's, were among the Antonia's passengers.

#### "Blue Bird Tea Brings Happiness."

Wife Too Noisy He Slept in Cemetery  
LONDON, March 17.—When Randolph Oakes, a war veteran, was found asleep in the St. Cross churchyard at Clayton, with two coffins forming his bed, he told the police his wife nagged him so much that, to be quiet, he picked out the cemetery as a place of rest.

#### Oakes is accused of having opened a baby's coffin in an unfiled grave to while away the evening hours.

### Proceedings at the Legislative Council

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS.  
MONDAY, March 30.

The Council met at 3.30 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

House resolved into Committee of the Whole on Bill to amend Cap. 53, Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled "Of Egress from Churches, Theatres and other Buildings," Hon. Mr. Alderice in the chair.

HON. MR. BISHOP asked that section one be held over until next sitting. He knew of buildings in the city, the doors of which did not open outwards. They are double doors and are kept open when the buildings are occupied, are well known to the Inspector General, and are considered safe. The inner doors of the main entrance opened outwards, but the outer ones inwards, these being always left open during the times of occupation, no inconvenience was caused. It would not only, he thought, be expensive, but also inconvenient, to have them arranged otherwise, and requested, in order that further enquiry into the matter be made, that the Bill be not taken from its committee stage until to-morrow.

HON. MR. MORINE answered the original act stated that all doors should be so hung as to open freely outwards. That, therefore, was the law to-day, and if doors were not hung in the way mentioned, then the law was being violated.

The Committee rose and reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

HON. PRESIDENT read a message from the House of Assembly, that they had passed the accompanying bills, entitled "An Act relating to St. John's Dry Dock" and an "Act respecting the Encouragement of Shipbuilding," in which they requested the concurrence of the Legislative Council.

On motion, these bills were severally read a first time and ordered to be read a second time on to-morrow.

HON. MR. BISHOP said he would like to ask in relation to the Dry Dock bill if the rumour that a contract had been let for the repair of the dock was correct.

HON. MR. MORINE replied that to the best of his knowledge and belief no such contract had been made.

HON. MR. BISHOP stated that there was a rumour that a contract had been given in excess of a million for repairs to the Dock, and if that was correct, he suggested no time need be wasted over the Bill.

HON. MR. MORINE was sure it could be proved as there had been no meeting of the Executive Council to pass it through. Personally he had heard nothing of it.

HON. DR. CAMPBELL said that as the Dock was to be discussed, and as he understood there were one or more reports by Mr. Hall, the Government Engineer, in reference to its condition, they might be tabled for information of hon. gentlemen, and for comparison with those recently before the Lower House.

HON. MR. MORINE promised to have all reports in the hands of hon. gentlemen as speedily as possible.

In reply to questions asked previously in reference to drawback of duties on pork and beef, Hon. Mr. Morine stated that he had been informed by the Prime Minister that the Government had considered the matter and had decided to give no drawback.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow at 3.30 p.m.

#### "Blue Bird Tea Brings Happiness."

British Postal Service Returns  
After charging interest on capital, the British government owned and operated postal, telegraph and telephone system showed a net revenue in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1924 of £6,391,922, according to an official report just published and communicated to the Bankers Trust Company of New York by its British Information Service. Up to March 31, 1924 the sum of £67,316,000 had been invested by the British government since 1893 in the acquisition and development of the telephone system, which is operated as an adjunct of the post office. The capital invested in the telegraph system is £10,948,000. From the fiscal year 1912-13 to the fiscal year 1923-24, inclusive, the British postal service had been operated at a profit after charging interest on capital, with the exception of the three years 1919-20 to 1921-22, inclusive. The postal service proper has shown a profit for every year. The telegraph system has uniformly shown a loss. The results of operation of the telephone system have varied. In six years out of the twelve the telephone service has shown a profit, and the remaining six years it has shown a loss. The largest loss was in 1920-21 when it amounted to £4,272,000. In 1922-23 there was a profit of £1,587,000. This was the best year in the history of the telephone department and compared with a net loss of £4,721,070 in 1920-21; a loss of £2,559,132 in 1921-22 and a profit of £2,989,009 in 1922-23.

In the trolley opposite me the vulgar jest, their faces entirely changed. A self-conscious smirk spread over them. A sly look came into their eyes. Their mouths were distorted into those peculiarly unlovely lines that go with that sort of thing. They suddenly looked unappealingly cheap and tawdry and unlovely. Their whole manner suggested a vulgar or a buzzard taking joy in something rotten.

Don't you hate that kind of vulgarity?  
The Cardinal Sin of Personality.  
To me it is one of the unpalatable sins of personality.

I can forgive arrogance, selfish vanity, quick temper far more than this kind of vulgarity.  
Young people sometimes have ideas that because their parents are vulgar there is something amusing and fascinating about being vulgar. If they could only see the expression that comes over their own faces when they take matters which should be ignored or which should be beautiful and thrilling, and even holy, and discuss them in a vulgar way, they would realize that they are being warned against something that is disgraceful and unlovely.

And like all habits of thought or speech this habit, if it becomes a habit, gradually deepens the lines of transient expression and carves its unloveliness on the face.  
Because It Is Bad Taste.  
Fastidious people, really well bred people, set great store on cleanliness, on the daily bath and the similar fleeciness of life. But no more than a cleanliness of mind. They don't regard it as a matter of morals, perhaps, so much as a matter of taste.

It's more an instinct than a matter of ethics. They shrink from uncleanness of mind just as quickly and instinctively as from uncleanliness of body.  
I think if parents would try to make the younger generation see vulgarity in that light rather than as a moral bugaboo, they might sometimes make a deeper impression.



### Canon Scott Appeals to Premier King

(By Canadian Press.)  
QUEBEC, March 25.—The following is an open letter dispatched yesterday to the Right Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, by Ven. Archbishop Scott, in connection with the dispute in the Cape Breton coal fields:  
"Dear Sir:—In the name of our country I appeal to you as the head of the Federal Government of Canada to take immediate steps to save the lives and stop the acute suffering of our sixty thousand fellow citizens in Cape Breton.

"If there is no law in the constitution of Canada which gives you the right to avert the hideous calamity now very imminent, the supreme law of common humanity empowers you to intervene.

"The funds of the relief committee we are told by responsible people, include that of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Antigonish and the Anglican Archbishop of Halifax, are almost exhausted, and when they are gone, absolute starvation and death must ensue.

"Ultimately the responsibility of the fate of our fellow Canadians rests not upon one province only, but on the whole Dominion. The ancestor whose name you so proudly bear was once judged a rebel because he stood for the rights of the oppressed in defiance of the law. An oppressed people is crying for a deliverer to-day. Never in the whole course of our history has there been a more wonderful example of patient heroism than is being manifested by the thousands of men and women and little children in Cape Breton at the present time.

"If the agony of human beings does not move your government to immediate action, perhaps the reflection that failure to save the lives of Canadians now will not only shake your government but what is worse it will shake the ordered constitution of our country.

"It is merely playing into the hands of that Bolshevism which we all dread and which is threatening the sovereignty of the world to-day. This should not be the motive to lead us to play fairly with our fellow Canadians, but it ought to have weight with those whose self-interests shut their ears to the cry of the suffering."

House of Assnly Proceedings

MOYAY, March 30.

The House opened at the usual hour.

MR. BROWN presented a petition from the fishermen of the Cove, Cap...

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THE PRIME MINISTER said the policy of the Government was well known, and he did not see any reason for giving the Bill the hoist.

MR. GODDEN said the idea of one man districts throughout Newfoundland is one which meets with nearly everybody's approval, but that was no reason why the first bill calling for redistribution should be passed at this session.

There were many reasons for proceeding cautiously, as rightly or wrongly denominationalism has a distinct bearing on matters political. Representation in both branches of the House as well as appointments to the civil service is made with the idea in view of comparative equality regarding the different religious bodies, and rightly or wrongly each denomination is frankly jealous of the other, and are always on the lookout for evidence of political discrimination. He suggested that a Committee should be formed comprised of officials appointed by the various denominations to go into the question before the matter was discussed further. Another suggestion was that an effort should be made to lessen the number of representatives instead of increasing them by four endeavour to make them four less. Concluding he said let all districts be one man districts, one representative, one man, one vote.

MR. DUFF was satisfied with the one man district idea, but urged that representation should be reduced instead of increased.

MR. HIBBS expressed his entire accord with the principle of the Bill, and said the old system should be obliterated long ago. He did not agree that it was necessary to make Harbor Main a two man district in order to give the denominational proportion. Being a native of Harbor Main he thought he should have something to say in regard to its affairs. In 1920 he was entrusted with a petition asking for a division of the district, and now it appeared to be the irony of fate that it was the only district that is not divided under the Bill. He thought it was unfortunate that denominationalism was being catered to so much, and he deplored the proportional system we are working under. He supported the idea of the Leader of the Opposition for the division of the Bill so that it could be either considered if it were possible to make all one man districts.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE replied said that there had been certain conventions established that could not be wrenched out of sight. The main idea of the Bill was to endeavor to equalize the area of districts. There had been no criticism by the Opposition as to how the seats have been divided, and no better suggestions had been offered, and the principle of the Bill was admitted therefore. There was a justification in asking that the Bill be further delayed.

MR. HICKMAN said that what Mr. Hibbs said was justification for delay. He thought that the time was not ripe when another petition would be presented asking to have Harbor Main divided. The Leader of the Opposition urged that the people of the whole could be consulted as to the dividing line in the district. Were they (Opposite) sure all were satisfied on the dividing lines the Opposition would be content. The Bill itself was a step in the right direction and was bound to bring out a good class of representative. He thought the suggestion of Mr. Halfyard, should be acted upon and strengthen our claim there.

MR. HALFYARD, for the second time, took the floor, asking for delay. He said they favored the principle of the Bill, but not a two man District in Harbor Main.

THE COLONIAL SECRETARY took occasion before the passing of the Humber District, to speak of the bold step the Government took in introducing the Redistribution Bill. It is, he said, peculiarly fitting that in the Redistribution the denominational representation will be practically the same as heretofore. He pointed out that even now there are strictures not represented denominationally. The particular feature of the Bill was the recognition of those areas not represented. In the matter of denominational representation the people themselves could always decide that matter to suit themselves. The speaker reviewed at length the alphabet which existed under the old order of divisions. It was intended to correct under the present Bill. He closed with expressing his belief that under the new scheme the District would get a more representative and better served.

MR. HALFYARD, who apparently occupies the "anxious" in the

Opposition was, for the third time, on his feet, asking the Government to heat time until the Bill was given further consideration.

MR. BROWN followed and requested that more time be given the people to see into the divisions of the districts. As to the principle of the Bill, he reiterated the approval previously given.

MR. SCAMMELL spoke without prejudice and supported the stand taken by his leader that the Bill could be delayed until next session. It was, he said, a part of his platform in 1919 that St. Barbe District should be divided. As it is at present with its scattered population of 12,000 people, it was a difficult district to handle. He had nothing to say against the division that has been made of St. Barbe. On principle he supported the redistribution but he maintained the people of the country should see the maps and become conversant with the divisions before being committed to them. Recess was taken at 6.30 until 8 p.m.

AFTER RECESS.

MR. BROWN (St. John's West) expressed his disapproval of the general apathy with which the measure was received. The lack of opposition to the Bill was a good criterion of its general acceptance. All the members of the Opposition had expressed their accord with the principle of the Bill. A few weeks ago he presented a petition from the people residing near

the Ropewalk re the boundaries of the city. He thought that under the new dividing lines these people may be adversely affected. Mr. Brown touched on the point of disproportionate representation as relating to St. John's and pointed out that under the new Bill there was a considerable difference between the number of people grouped in certain districts. As to the total representation he thought that we should try to reduce the number instead of increasing it. He congratulated the Prime Minister on the big reform he was bringing about.

MR. ASHBOURNE said this was a matter which may be viewed from many places. As the other members of his party who preceded him, he expressed himself as being in accord with the principle of the Bill. He regretted the increase in the number of members in the House and thought that the country would be better represented by twenty members instead of the present number. The feature which he viewed with particular favor was that the Outports were going to get the "square deal."

MR. K. BROWN suggested that the name of Exploits District be changed as it was a misnomer. The Prime Minister agreed and proposed that the name be Exploits Valley.

MR. GRIMES expressed his approval of the principles of the Bill and submitting quite a number of figures showed that numerically there was still a considerable inequality in representation. He urged that the Bill

did not establish the equality it set about to do.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE said the anomalies were apparent to all; the point raised by Mr. Grimes had been thoroughly canvassed by the Government. The ideal condition of inviting value was a principle hard to attain owing to the scattered condition of the people in some places and the opposite condition existing in other places.

Before Committee rose MR. HICKMAN made a motion to have the Bill deferred.

The amendment being put was defeated.

The report of the Committee being received, before its adoption MR. HICKMAN made an amendment that the Bill be referred to a Commission to take evidence out of session. The amendment was defeated 20 to 3 and the adoption of the report was carried by the same division.

The Bill to amend Chapter 172 of Consolidated Statutes, entitled "Of Survey of Foreign Going and Labrador Vessels," passed Committee stage.

The House then went into Committee on the Amendment to the Terra Nova Sulphite Bill.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE explained the purpose of the Bill.

MR. BROWN suggested that the Bill should be given the gravest consideration particularly if Mr. Harris had the drafting of it. Mr. Harris, he claimed, was one of the best men that ever crossed the herring pond. He did not think it was a square deal to the people of Bonavista Bay to allow the mill to be abandoned. He expressed his disapproval of giving the A.N.D. Co. any more concessions. In referring to logging conditions up country, the speaker said that the commission sent last fall should have been larger, although he agreed that the Commissioner did all possible under the circumstances. The speaker made some very harsh references to Mr. Harris, from whom, he said, the workmen got no show. Newfoundlanders, he continued, would curse the day he came to our shores.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE replied stated that if Mr. Brown had valid objections to the Bill he would like to hear them, and it could be amended or the bill could be thrown out.

MR. WARREN reviewed the logging operations as they were revealed to him when conducting his enquiry.

HON. M. S. SULLIVAN followed and gave a very lucid explanation of the objects of the Bill. He said the A.N.D. Co. are not asking any great concessions, and then he went on to show that wood manufactured into paper at Grand Falls would give more employment than if it were converted into sulphite pulp. The concessions the A.N.D. Co. ask is the right to use the power of Grand Falls for the next ten years, and they say they are prepared to complete the Sulphite mills at Glovertown as soon as they can sell Sulphite Pulp in competition with the Scandinavian countries. Major Sullivan expressed regret that a very uncalculated attack had been made on Mr. Harris by Mr. Brown.

MR. SCAMMELL followed and claimed that Mr. Brown's attitude was not taken on personal grounds, but rather because he was fighting for and on behalf of the labouring men. Mr. Scammell expressed his opposition to the bill on the grounds that the A.N.D. Co. had enough concessions from the country. He thought that a square deal should be given the people of Bonavista Bay.

THE PRIME MINISTER joined in the debate, and said that he was perfectly satisfied that the best interests of Bonavista Bay had his consideration. He was as much interested in its welfare as the Member for St. Barbe ever would be, and had arrived at the conclusion that the Bill was as good as could be done for the men of Bonavista Bay, indeed that more labour would be given under this measure than would be given at the original mills.


MR. HALFYARD agreed with the position taken by Messrs. Brown and Scammell.

SIR JOHN CROSSIE followed and spoke in defence of Mr. Harris, whom he claimed, had been unwarrantedly attacked by Mr. Brown in place where he could not defend himself.

MR. GRIMES concluded the debate, and the Bill passed Committee without amendment.

THE COLONIAL SECRETARY proposed the second reading of the Travel on Highways Bill, and after explaining some of the amendments he moved that the matter be deferred.





THE PRIME MINISTER said the policy of the Government was well known, and he did not see any reason for giving the Bill the hoist.

MR. GODDEN said the idea of one man districts throughout Newfoundland is one which meets with nearly everybody's approval, but that was no reason why the first bill calling for redistribution should be passed at this session.

There were many reasons for proceeding cautiously, as rightly or wrongly denominationalism has a distinct bearing on matters political. Representation in both branches of the House as well as appointments to the civil service is made with the idea in view of comparative equality regarding the different religious bodies, and rightly or wrongly each denomination is frankly jealous of the other, and are always on the lookout for evidence of political discrimination. He suggested that a Committee should be formed comprised of officials appointed by the various denominations to go into the question before the matter was discussed further. Another suggestion was that an effort should be made to lessen the number of representatives instead of increasing them by four endeavour to make them four less. Concluding he said let all districts be one man districts, one representative, one man, one vote.

MR. DUFF was satisfied with the one man district idea, but urged that representation should be reduced instead of increased.

MR. HIBBS expressed his entire accord with the principle of the Bill, and said the old system should be obliterated long ago. He did not agree that it was necessary to make Harbor Main a two man district in order to give the denominational proportion. Being a native of Harbor Main he thought he should have something to say in regard to its affairs. In 1920 he was entrusted with a petition asking for a division of the district, and now it appeared to be the irony of fate that it was the only district that is not divided under the Bill. He thought it was unfortunate that denominationalism was being catered to so much, and he deplored the proportional system we are working under. He supported the idea of the Leader of the Opposition for the division of the Bill so that it could be either considered if it were possible to make all one man districts.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE replied said that there had been certain conventions established that could not be wrenched out of sight. The main idea of the Bill was to endeavor to equalize the area of districts. There had been no criticism by the Opposition as to how the seats have been divided, and no better suggestions had been offered, and the principle of the Bill was admitted therefore. There was a justification in asking that the Bill be further delayed.

MR. HICKMAN said that what Mr. Hibbs said was justification for delay. He thought that the time was not ripe when another petition would be presented asking to have Harbor Main divided. The Leader of the Opposition urged that the people of the whole could be consulted as to the dividing line in the district. Were they (Opposite) sure all were satisfied on the dividing lines the Opposition would be content. The Bill itself was a step in the right direction and was bound to bring out a good class of representative. He thought the suggestion of Mr. Halfyard, should be acted upon and strengthen our claim there.

**To Test Scientific Theory**

An experimental dam, to be built at a cost of \$60,000, only to be destroyed, to test the latest engineering theories in relation to the constant angle arch type, will be constructed soon on Stevenson Creek, a tributary of the San Joaquin River, north of Los Angeles. Funds for the work have been provided jointly by Los Angeles County and private interests.

The object of the experiment is to obtain data expected to prove of great value in the construction of dams in the Los Angeles County flood control programme, in which approximately \$85,000,000 will be spent. On several of these projects the use of the constant angle arch type is anticipated.


It is the theory of many engineers that the constant angle arch type will permit the use of thinner construction than has been tried heretofore. If true, this would reduce materially the cost cost of dams.

The experimental dam will be 140 feet long and 60 feet high when the first tests are made. Special instruments will be inserted in the concrete to test stresses, deflections and temperature changes as the load of water is increased. After this information is obtained, the height of the arch will be run up to 100 feet. The water will then be allowed to rise to the point at which the dam may be pushed out of position, thus establishing the ultimate resistance of this type of construction.

**British Pension Expenditure**

The original budget for British pensions for the current fiscal year ending March 31st was £66,947,810. This amount by subsequent appropriations made from time to time during the year has been increased by £2,096,000, bringing the total expected expenditure for pensions for the year, according to advices received by Bankers Trust Company of New York from the British Information Service, up to £69,043,810. The largest part of this sum, £27,228,000 is for pensions, gratuities, and allowances to disabled seamen and disabled warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of the marines, army and air force. The next largest amount £18,810,000, is for pensions and gratuities to the widows and children of men included in the former class. A sum of £3,225,000 is allotted for pensions and gratuities to disabled officers of the navy, marines, army and air force, £2,580,000 is allotted for treatment and training allowances for disabled men and £2,740,000 for medical treatment of disabled officers, nurses and men.

We have coal in millions of tons, the finest grade of bituminous coal in our reach to-day. Why, then, may I ask the question, are we, who are spending the best years of our lives, trying to promote a valuable industry, libeled by false and misleading statements in the press of every land? It is about time to call a halt.

**HOW WE GOT THE ROYAL GEOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY.**

When a man joins the Royal Geographical Society and becomes an "F. R. G. S.," he enters a magic circle that circles the earth.

The Society has within the past hundred years added more to our knowledge of the world than had been gained previously in many centuries.

Established to promote geographical knowledge by means of travel and exploration, and accurate teaching in schools, the Society had its origin in what was known as the Raleigh Dining Club.

This club, which came into existence ninety-seven years ago, consisted of men who had visited all known parts of the globe, every division marked on the club's map of the world being represented by at least one member.

The Geographical Society, or Geographical Club, as it was first known, was founded in 1830, absorbing the Raleigh Dining Club some thirty years later, when the Society was granted its royal charter. The first list of Fellows contained four hundred and thirty names. To-day it extends to more than five thousand names.

Exploration and research are encouraged by the Society by grants of money and scientific instruments. Livingstone's ever memorable expedition to Africa was largely organized by the Society. Captain Scott's second Arctic expedition was aided by a grant of one thousand five hundred pounds, while Amundsen's and Shackleton's journeys into the Polar regions were helped in similar way.

At its headquarters near the Albert Hall, the Society has one of the most interesting Museums in London. There you may see Stanley's canvas-patched boots, a relic of his epic journey into Africa, Scott's travel diary, Darwin's assistant, Gordon's pocket barometer, and many other souvenirs of the great travellers and explorers of the past.


