TOWN ITEMS.

STILL THEY COME.—Guelph is receiving its full complement of emigrants this season, two more families having arrived on Saturday. Each of the families consists of father, mother and one child.

WHO OWNS THE COLT?—If any person in this neighborhood suspects that a thief has made free to take away a three year old colt, bay, with white hind foot, and star on the forehead, belonging to him, he would do well to put himself as soon as possible in communication with the Chief Constable.

ALLAN'S BRIDGE.—This bridge is again impassible for teams. The recent rains raising the water in the river the walls which supported it were washed away, and a man was stationed on it all night to prevent accidents. It is still safe for foot passengers, as it is held in its place by being chained and bolted to timbers at the end, where the wall has been taken away. Barriades have been constructed, so that teams may take warning.

NEW BOOKS.—J. B. NEW SINGING CLASS.—Dr. French, by particular request of a number of parents, has re-organized his former juvenile singing class, and will commence this (Monday) afternoon. His success has been so apparent that the class has received a very large accession to its numbers. Those who have had children under the Doctor's tuition during the last term are very enthusiastic in his praise as a teacher, and are co-operating with him in increasing the number of his pupils. The terms are low, only 25 cents for fifteen lessons, and a new singing book into the bargain. Let the children go—they will receive value for the money.

NEWS ITEMS.

The population of the City of Ottawa is 20,681, an increase during the year of 376.

The Brampton assessment roll shows an increase of 86 ratepayers this year over last.

The amount of deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank on the 31st April was \$729,308, an increase during the month of \$52,924.

A letter from San Francisco was received at Brampton at the end of last week which had come by the Pacific Railroad in nine days.

A daughter of Mr. William Potts, of Woodstock, was accidentally shot, while at play, by a boy named Douglass, and seriously injured.

The bill introduced into the British House of Commons for disqualifying the mayor of Cork has been postponed, in consequence of the resignation of that functionary.

The Hussars.—An intimation has been received here to the effect that the 13th Hussars will not go to India as at one time proposed but will replace the 13th Hussars at York.

An Indian, at Owen Sound, bolted from the constable and galloper who were taking him to prison, and made for the river which he attempted to swim. But his strength gave out, and he was rescued by his former captors.

The body of a man has been found lying in a field in Pickering, a quarter of a mile from the road. Who he is, or from what causes he died, nobody knows. In his pocket was found a fragment of an envelope, on which was written "Baggage Master, Grimby, G. W. R. Co."

Fire at Flaminds'.—On Tuesday last, about noon, the large two story frame building belonging to Mr. Wm. Mordey, and situated on the Dundas and Waterloo Road, between Bullock's Corners and Flamind's village, took fire from the chimney and was speedily consumed, as also the two-story frame building belonging to Mr. Anson Raymond, of Ancaster.

YMOOSKEE THE BANCHE.—The Dundas Banner says: A wealthy buyer named J. H. Pettit, left Hamilton for the land of the free and the home of the brave! this week, carrying with him \$5000 belonging to his partner, and leaving behind several bills for liquidation after he returns from the term of his voluntary exile—the time for which he has not as yet definitely fixed.

The prisoner Brown, who was convicted at the last Assizes in Brantford, when taken in Toronto on his way to the Penitentiary to serve a term for robbing Mr. Whitlaw of Paris, communicated to Mr. Keachie the whereabouts of a lot of silver plate which was stolen from Mr. Leys, Toronto and secreted in the sand of a vacant lot near the residence of H. Howland, Sherburne Street. The plate was recovered.

Leary, the fellow who figured so conspicuously in the recent Osgeooche Hill robbery investigations, has since been arrested for other depredations, and made his escape from gaol on Saturday morning. He was out in the yard with his fellow-prisoners before breakfast, and when they sat down to their morning meal Mr. Leary was not present. A strict search proved that he was not in the building.

DEATH OF THE MAYOR OF OTTAWA.—Henry J. Friel, Mayor of Ottawa, died on Saturday morning the 15th instant, at 3 o'clock. On the previous Sunday he entertained the Archbishop of Halifax, the Bishop of Ottawa, and Sir G. E. Cartier at dinner. On the following Monday night Mrs. Friel gave birth to a son, and it is probable that in going out at that time he caught the cold which caused his death.

The Eramosa Accident.

Mr. Spivey, the gentleman who we mentioned on Saturday had been kicked in the face by a horse, expired at St. Joseph's Hospital, about 12 o'clock on Saturday night. This termination of the accident had been looked for, as when the medical men weighed the chances none were found in his favour. He continued sensible for some time after being brought to the Hospital, then delirium succeeded which was followed by coma, and at the time stated the lamp of life went out without a flicker. It is only a few days since Mr. Spivey first visited Guelph, but although a stranger he soon found many warm friends, in consequence of his connection with the Masonic fraternity, the members of which in town, particularly the W. M., Mr. Sharpe, the Secretary, Mr. Cutbert, and Mr. J. Jackson, have since the accident proved themselves brothers indeed. They have been unremitting in their attentions to him, and had Mr. Spivey been expiring surrounded by his relatives he could not have witnessed more tenderness than was shown to him by those whom the mystic tie had made his brethren. By the Superior of the Hospital he was treated with the most motherly attention, and we hear that from the time the wounded gentleman was brought to the institution until after the time he had expired, the members of the order ceased their ministrations. The body was conveyed to the Masonic Hall on Sunday evening, where the Brethren will assemble at 2 p. m., to-morrow, and proceed thence to the Congregational Church, to which denomination the deceased belonged, where the Rev. W. F. Clarke will perform the occasion. The procession will then reform and proceed to the cemetery, and the ceremony be brought to a close by the sublime service peculiar to Masonry. A large plot of ground has been purchased by the Brethren, in a good situation, and in it the stranger Brother who, like Mr. Spivey, dies far from home and relatives may find a quiet resting-place.

The Distillery Seizure at Fergus.

We have already given the particulars of the seizure of Mr. Geo. Wyllie's distillery at Fergus for violation of the act respecting Inland Revenue. Other matters have since come to light which lead to the supposition that frauds of a more serious character than those already mentioned, have been attempted or actually perpetrated. On Friday in searching a desk in the distillery was found a small neat saw frame, and five of the smallest kind of steel saws, finely finished, and with teeth so small as hardly to be noticed, which are usually only found in the possession of those who make it their trade to get into lock-fast places. Along with these were found three or four keys of about the same size as those employed by the excise officers in fastening the regulation padlocks on vessels in distilleries. These keys, however, were in the rough, the wards being blank and the supposition is that the fine saws found with them were used for cutting out the wards and fitting these keys to the excise locks so that the liquor could be put into or abstracted from the vessels without the knowledge of the excise officers. It is true a label is put over the key hole of each lock by the excise man, but the string of the clasp which covers this label may, by skillful manipulation, be rendered ineffective, and with a false key secured, he had to the vessel at any time without the knowledge of the excise man.

FIRE IN PAISLEY.—The Advocate says that last week a fire broke out in the store of W. C. Bruce, in Paisley, and the whole building was rapidly enveloped in flames. The wind was blowing from the north, and the Advocate office, which is next building to the south, was in danger from the great heat and the fire falling thickly around. At this time there seemed no possibility of saving the Advocate premises, but by the strenuous exertions of neighbours and others, we were saved from the disaster of being burned out. Close to Mr. Bruce's store to the north was the Dominion Hotel, which was kept by Mr. Mitchell, which with the stabling, and another stable adjoining, belonging to Mr. George Briggs were burned down. Mr. Briggs' house had a narrow escape. Opposite the Dominion Hotel is the store of Robert Dick, which was somewhat scorched, but by keeping wet blankets on the roof it was saved from catching fire. Mr. Gilliland's house, and Dr. Campbell's, as well as Mr. Mathers' premises, were in some danger. Fortunately the wind seemed to abate as the fire progressed. How the fire originated in Mr. Bruce's store is not known but it is supposed from stove pipes.

OUTRAGES IN IRELAND.

Earl Russell evidently has little faith in the potency of the Church Bill to prevent outrages in Ireland. Perhaps he is right, for although disestablishment may do something towards silencing the murmurs of one portion of the population it will go but a short way in quenching the animosity which has subsisted for ages between the two great parties into which the country is divided. Indeed it is not improbable that this feeling may be augmented and intensified, for there are those who look with no small degree of disfavor on the concessions which the Government are now almost sure to yield. But if this be an evil there can be no doubt it is the less of two, between which it was necessary to choose. No legislation can extinguish party spirit, although it may prevent party demonstrations and punish those who engage in party fights. While there are such men as the Mayor of Cork there will be such combinations as the 'Prentice Boys, and vice versa, and the settlement of the Church and Land Questions even on the most equitable basis will do little towards inducing them to dwell in amity. That will be the work of the millennium alone. What can the Government do to stop outrages? Nothing at all to stop them permanently, that is, so that they will not occur again. What have they always done? Nothing but what they have had to repeat, and so far as we learn they have no new magic agency at command. The terrible riots which occurred not long since in Belfast were quelled by the military, like all others, and it was thought that the damage, suffering and loss of life inflicted then would produce a salutary effect much more lasting than it appears to have been. Again the same agency was employed in Tipperary and Derry, but all will not deter from fresh outbreaks of party passion. To do so is one of the impossibilities, nor can it be accomplished until there come a revolution in that divided of human nature which makes its home in Ireland. Even intellectual education, powerful as it is for good, will never eradicate the evil; it is the old man with his deeds that does the mischief, and though he may be frightened for a moment by enquiries in Parliament about his doings, and by the clinking sabres of cavalry even those will not keep him long quiescent.

RELIGIOUS EXCITEMENT IN PERSIA.—Religious excitement appears to be greatly on the increase in the Mohammedan world. The greatest trouble the British in India at present meet is from the Mohammedan sect of the Wahabees. The same sect last year obtained complete control of Muscat, the greatest Mohammedan State in Arabia. A few days ago a cable despatch informed us of a desperate riot between two religious sects in the streets of Teheran, the capital of Persia. Three hundred men were killed before the troops came out and suppressed the riot. The name of the sects concerned in the riot is not stated; but as Persia several years ago was greatly disturbed by a sect of Reformers called Babis, or followers of Bab, and as this sect, notwithstanding its cruel persecution by the Persian Government, is reported to have now numerous adherents in every town and village of Persia, and to number in all some three millions of adherents, it is probable that it was not foreign to the riot.

THE LAW OF INTEREST.—Mr. Rose has introduced certain resolutions, with a view to change the present law respecting the rates of interest chargeable on loans, etc. As the law now stands, banks are not permitted to charge over seven per cent interest for moneys loaned, while some other corporations, such as building societies, may charge a higher rate than that, but individuals may arrange to pay any rate that they may deem proper. Mr. Rose proposes that the law, in so far as it effects Banks and other corporations, shall remain as it is at present, while individuals shall in no case be permitted to charge a higher rate than eight per cent. Should a higher rate be charged, payment cannot be enforced, but as a penalty, the rate will be reduced to six per cent, and by amount above that rate which may have been paid may be recovered by an action at law. When no rate of interest has been agreed upon, the legal rate is to be as it is now—six per cent.

NEW LAW OF EVIDENCE.—It is being sought, in England, to amend the somewhat anomalous state of the law of evidence, which, on technical grounds, often excludes testimony of great importance and value, and which ought, in justice, to be laid before the jury. It is wished to be allowed to do this in cases where divorce is sought, arising out of adultery, in breach of promise and seduction cases, wherein the principal guilty parties would often testify, if allowed, and cut the case short, by presenting it beyond all doubt to the jury. It is also sought to permit any parties to give evidence on affirmation, who may make a declaration that they conscientiously object to taking an oath.

THE BANKING SCHEME.—The Globe's Ottawa correspondent says:—Mr. Rose's banking policy has caused a great commotion in political circles; it is the general theme among members. The bankers held a meeting on Saturday to oppose it. The Bank of Montreal supported the scheme. So it is said do the Nova Scotians. The New Brunswick and Ontario Banks are unanimously against it, with but one exception. The bankers hold another meeting on Monday. Mr. Hugh Allan, of the Merchant's Bank is expected then to take part in the opposition to the new scheme. Mr. Galt has announced his determination to oppose it.

A California paper calls White Pine a "stupendous perhaps." There is less mining than selling out. As soon as ore is struck in a claim, work is stopped, for fear it may "peter out," and the mine is for sale.

From the slow way in which matters are getting on here, it is expected Parliament will not prorogue before July.
