The Ballot Bill.

We are in receipt of the Ballot Bill, introduced by Mr. Clarke, member for Centre Wellington, the principal features of which we hasten to lay before our readers.

The Act provides that when a poll is demanded, ballot papers, containing a list of the candidates, with their occupations and residences, and arranged alphabetically in the order of their surnames, shall be prepared by the returning officer, and delivered by him to each deputy returning officer, together with poll books and the list of voters. As many ballot boxes as there are polling subdivi-sions shall be furnished at the exto be provided with proper locks

pense of each municipality, said boxes and keys; and before any vote is taker the deputy returning officer shall place his seal upon the lock. The returning officer shall mark the ballot paper with his own initials, and with a running number represent the number of ballot papers then issued, which number shall be placed opposite the name of the voter. opposite the name of the voter.
Upon receipt of this paper the voter will place a cross on the right hand side, opposite the name of the candidate for whom he desires to vote, and return the ticket to the deputy returning officer who will verify his own initials and the number on the back of the paper before dropping it into the ballot box, after doing which he shall forthwith leave the polling place. Any voter physically unable to mark a ballot will make a declaration to that effect, when the deputy returning officer, in the presence of the agents of the candidates, will mark it for him, according to direction. Every ballot paper which shall contain a greater number of ballot marks than the voter is entitled to make, or which is so marked as to render it uncertain for which candidate the voter intended to vote, shall be rejected at the close of the poll. make, or which is so marked at to render it uncertain for which candidate the voter intended to vote, shall be rejected at the close of the poll. At the close of the election, the deputy returning officer will count the ballots in presence of the clerk and agents of the candidates, and make a written statement of the result, which will be transmitted, together with the ballots, to the returning officer. ## Traffic at the Guelph Station of the G. W. R.

me time ago we mentioned that th traffic at the Gue'p's Station on this road the months ending November, 187 showing an increase of over 30 per cent as compared with the same period in 1871. We have seen a statement for three months ending December, 1872, compared with the same period in 1869 when this was the terminus of the linewhich shows an increase of 80 per cent. in "received" traffic, and a decrease of only 15 per cent, in the "forwarded 's traffic. These figures shew that not-withstanding the evil forebodings of net a few, Guelph has not suffered by the exension of the line beyond this point, in tension of the line beyond this point, in fact the slight decrease in "forwarded" business is owing entirely to the drougt which caused a poor harvest, and a lack of water in the mills, as the great bulk of this trafle in 1869 was in flour, of which, of course, but very little was manufactured last fall.

The Great Western Railway people are agreeably disappointed, as they, with many others, supposed that the business of Guelph Station would shew a great falling off.


