GOLDWIN SMITH ON CANADA.-In a speech lately delivered by Goldwin Smith at the Workingmen's College in London, he said:—"As they were aware, he was now a Canadian, alugh a Professor in Cornell University, and he was much gratified to be able to tell them that he had found the people of Canada a fine, high-spirited, active population. He spoke well of the results of Conderation; but with respect to the French Canadians, he described them as entirely priest-ridden, and so stilted in their ideas that they might be said to be living under the regime of Louis IV. As a general rule, mechanics who could mix trades would do well; but he who was skilled only in a portion of his trade, would not turn his hand to another, had little chance in Canada. Mr. Smith gave a glowing description of Canadian scenery, and of the beauty of small Canadian towns. Politically, he said, they had nothing to wish for, and all religious sects agreed in promoting education in the public schools. He described the Colonists generally as the most contented people on the face of the earth."

THE HURON BILL.—The Canadian "Lords" have thrown out Mr. Cameron's Bill to re-adjust the Rid ings in Huron. When the question for the third reading came up on Friday, the Hon. Mr. Campbell moved the three months' hoist, which was carried by a vote of 30 to 17. The question was one which did not in the slightest degree affect these venerable legislators, and which, had they acted in good taste, they should have left to the decision of the Commons. But they have reversed that decision, and refused to right a that decision, and refused to right a wrong which was perpetrated by a weak partizan Government, We suppose they will deal the same way with Mr. Higinbotham's Bill to readjust the Wellingtons. The sooner Mr. Mills succeeds in infusing a little more of the popular element into this antiquated body the better, for as now constituted it rarely does auything, and when galvanized into life, seems only bent on doing mis-chief.

BANK OF MONTREAL.—The profits of this institution for the year ended 30th April were \$2,072,540, out of which two dividends of 8 per cent. have been declared, and the balance, about \$184,600, carried to the credit of profit and loss, increasing the amount of that credit from \$400,000 to \$584,000. Keeping in view the stagnation in money for some months, this result is very satisfactory. The profits of the previous year were \$1,820,813, the increase being about a quarter of a million dollars. The Monetary Times says that never in the history of Canadian banking has it been so difficult to make prolits as in the last few months.
