Held Prisoner by a Raving Madman

A Sensational Tragedy is Reported From the Far Northland.

Edmonton, Jan. 24.—Crowded in a small shack that served as a store near the grand eddy on the Mackenzie river by an insane rancher named Hornback who riddled the walls with bullets, the men whom he had chased to their shelter were at last incited to a mad attack and two bullets laid him dead as he stood in the distance with a rifle in his shoulder and a head on the ground. The man who would have rescued him.

Such is the substance of the story first brought to the city from Lac Ste Anne by Constable Tyler of the R.N.W.M.P.

The tragedy occurred on the 17th of December last. Hornback who had become a madman from exposure to the cold and loss of his stock, pursued his partner and an employee from his ranch over the snow for two miles while the bullets from his rifle buzzed around their heads. Cover was reached in the small store in the distance and there Hornback held at bay his men for a time.

From a distance of a hundred yards Hornback told them how straight he could shoot and nearer and nearer the bullets came to the building.

Death from the hands of a madman stared the imprisoned men in the face and after consultation it was decided to disable him if possible. The aim proved fatal, however,

WITH POPE AND SPLENDOR THE ALBERTA SESSION BEGINS

The Opening of the Second Alberta Legislature in Edmonton Yesterday Was Truly a Most Gorgeous Affair

THE SPEECH FROM THRONE AN IMPORTANT ONE

Railway Legislation, Education Legislation, Judicial Changes and Commercial Legislation Foreshadowed.

Edmonton, Jan. 24.—The second session of the first legislative assembly was opened today by His Honor Lieut. Gov. Bulger. There was scarcely anything in the ceremony that distinguished it from similar occasions in other provinces and probably not such novel interest was manifested as at the opening last year. The day was fine and the sun was shining out in sparkling splendor in the clear frosty air. It was a gala day for the legislature and the ladies turned out in their rich attire. The members of the assembly had packed long before the arrival of His Honor, the governor. At 2:30 a squadron A of the C.M.B. under Adj. Harbottle, paraded to the government house. As His Honor, attended by his aide de camp, Capt. Walker, inspected the R.N.W.M.P. band, the steps, a royal salute was given. Entering the carriage attended by a mounted escort of twelve men, sergeant and a trumpeter under the command of Capt. Walker, accompanied the party proceeded along the route already announced. On arrival at the house His Honor received a royal salute from the guard of honor in waiting. At the entrance of the building His Honor was met by the officers of B and C squadrons and other officers of the militia in full military uniform.

The staff composed of Col. E. B. Edwards, 7th Infantry brigade; Major Jameson B. Squadron, C.M.R.; Major Irwin, D.S.O.; Capt. Gillespie, 45th Regt. Lt. A. Gillespie and Lt. B. C. Deasum, C. Squadron, C.M.R.

His Majesty's representative then proceeded to the legislative chamber preceded by the sergeant at arms, bearing the mace and attended by his aide de camp. Behind him, the members of the assembly followed. The officers who received His Honor at the entrance. City Will Ask Many Concessions

Meeting Between Power Company and Aldermen to be Held Tonight

A conference between the committee appointed by the city council and Messrs. Alexander & Budd will take place at the city hall tonight. A meeting of the civic committee alone was held on Wednesday night when the matter of the proposed agreement was taken up. The meeting was a private one.

The committee arrived at no decision in the matter, but a number of safeguards were suggested. For instance it was proposed that a clause be placed in any agreement that might be made prohibiting any transfer of stock in the proposed company which might not be sanctioned by the city.

It was suggested that the minimum clause should be eliminated and that the city should pay for what power it might get and nothing more.

It was suggested that the city should be permitted to appoint auditors for the company and elect a director upon the company.

It was also urged that the power purchased should be measured at the different sub stations.

It was urged too that the penalty clause should be very severe, and that permission would not be given the company to install a street railway and not put through the power scheme.

There were a number of other suggestions but nothing definite was decided upon. The question will be thoroughly discussed tonight.

YAUQUI INDIANS DEFEATED AGAIN

The Mexicans Lost 20 Men in the Encounter

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 24.—Reports were received tonight of a desperate fight between the Yaqui and Mexican troops yesterday in the mountainous region southeast of Guaymas, Sonora, the section in which is the station of Lencho, which was destroyed by the Yaquis in December.

The Mexican troops have been hunting the Yaquis since the Lencho incident, and have frequent skirmishes with them. Not until yesterday were they able to force an engagement with any considerable force. In this fight twenty Mexicans were killed and a number wounded. The Yaquis were defeated with considerable loss, but as they took both their dead and wounded with them retreating. It is not known how many were killed.

Owing to the remoteness of the scene of the conflict from communication, particulars cannot be expected tonight.

Representatives of the Mexican government are without official advice of the battle.

FREIGHT RATES CANNOT COME DOWN

St. Paul, Jan. 24.—Judge Lochron of the U.S. circuit court granted a temporary injunction today restraining the state railroad and warehouse commission from putting into effect the reduction in freight rates ordered by it in December 24. Ten railroads doing business in the state allege that the order is confiscatory.

TRAGIC DEATH OF LONDON MERCHANT

William Whiteley was Killed by Man Claiming to be Son

London, Eng., Jan. 24.—A dramatic tragedy started London today, the most unique and at the same time one of the most prominent figures in the business world, was shot dead in his store by a youth claiming to be his son. The assassin then attempted to blow out his brains.

The name of Whiteley has become a household word in England owing to the enormous department stores in London, and by a company of which Mr. Whiteley was president, and which was the pioneer of such enterprises.

The crime occurred shortly after mid-day. The unknown young man was accorded a private interview with Mr. Whiteley in the latter's private office, where the two men remained closeted for a few moments. As Mr. Whiteley emerged from his office it was observed that the young man was following and impeding him, while Mr. Whiteley was waving him off and threatening to call the police. Suddenly the young man whipped out a revolver and fired two shots point blank at Mr. Whiteley. The bullets lodged in the merchant's head and he fell dead. Before the assassin could be seized he turned the weapon upon himself and inflicted what is believed to be a mortal wound. At a late hour tonight he was lying between life and death, with little hope of surviving.

The personality of the assassin and the motive for his crime are enveloped in much mystery. He gave the name of Cecil Whiteley, but the relatives of Mr. Whiteley disclaim any knowledge of him. The police found no papers or other written matter on his person to lead to the establishment of his identity. He discovered his place of residence, and learned that he never called himself Whiteley there. The clothing of the young man bore the initials "H.E." The police are of the opinion that the motive for the crime when discovered will show that there were present none of the elements of revenge for personal injury, but rather the attack upon Mr. Whiteley was the result of a fancied grievance. The following pencilled statement was found upon Mr. Whiteley's assailant:

"To whom it may concern: William Whiteley is my father. This twofold tragedy is due to his refusal of a request which is perfectly reasonable. R.I.P.

There was only a small sum of money in the man's pocket, and other indications that he had come to the end of his resources. This suggests that the crime may have been the outcome of the man's poverty.

GERMANY IS VOTING TODAY

The Socialists Making a Great Fight for Success

The issues of unusual interest

The Leading Question is the Colonial Policy

Berlin, Jan. 21.—The electoral campaign is ending today and the last written and spoken appeals to the voters. The hotels of Berlin are extraordinary because the out of town people have mostly gone home to vote tomorrow.

The operators on the Bourse have made up completed books among themselves on the probable results. Beta of ten to one are being made that the Socialists will not succeed in winning the down town districts, the only one in Berlin which they have not got. There is intense interest in this particular canvass. There is little or no betting, however on the general question whether the parties that hold for the government will increase the number of their seats or not. Public attention is fixed on the probable Socialist gains, on the necessity of the clericals and the government working together whatever the result, and on Chancellor Von Buelow's position at the election.

Although the result of the election does not constitute a definite determination of the retention of office or the retirement of the chancellor, Prince Von Buelow and his secretary of State, yet the issues are of unusual interest.

Prince Von Buelow asks the country to approve of the government's colonial policy and to give him a majority in the Reichstag that shall make the government independent of the Catholic party organized under the name of the Centre Party.

The members of the Centre party desire the question to be one between the intelligent control of appropriations by parliament or a passive acceptance of government proposals, whether economical or not. The Centre has also aroused the great Catholic constituencies by implying that the government, in accepting war with the Catholic party on political grounds, takes an attitude hostile to the interests of the church. The Centre leader asks that Prince Von Buelow shall retire if the country does not return a majority favorable to him.

The Socialists who voted with the Centre party in refusing the government's military budget, in order to embarrass the government thrive on agitation and violence. The dis-solution of the Reichstag, as another opportunity to urge the discontented to sweep all the parties left remains the Protestants aristocrats, right, Catholic centre, and middle class capitalists.

The Socialist faction has fixed the attention of all parties by what may be called a semi-miraculous feat. The Socialists are also the most numerous and most powerfully led of all the parties.

TRAINS FROM EAST COMING TODAY

No Mail Received in Calgary for Last Two Days

No trains from the east have arrived in this city for two whole days. This has caused quite a lot of inconvenience to business men, as no eastern mail has been received during that time and the post office is five mails behind.

No mail will arrive till this evening at six o'clock.

The delay was owing to a bridge giving way just east of Winnipeg, which has blocked the line for nearly three days. Severe weather also helped to make matters worse, as the rebuilding suffered in consequence.

C. S. Lott, of the Calgary Car Company, received cable yesterday that the first of the consignment of auto buses to be used in Calgary will be shipped from Glasgow on Feb. 2. Another consignment of two will follow on Feb. 16. These cars will be run through at a rapid rate and should be running on the streets in Calgary before March 1.

Red Deer, Jan. 24.—The weather has been much milder during the last few days, so that the outside work is starting up again.

Already 500 Bodies Have Been Buried in Jamaica

Twelve months to clear up city

Important Message Received From the Governor

London, Jan. 24.—Sir Alexander Swettenham, governor of Jamaica, reports that 500 bodies of victims of the earthquake have been buried, and he estimates that 200 are still in the ruins. It will probably take 12 months to remove all the debris. The main thoroughfares of Kingston have been cleared, the street car lines are in operation and the people today are living in outhouses and the less damaged buildings. There are 3,000 homeless persons in temporary shelters erected in the gardens, on the public squares and at the race course. The number of homeless ones is being decreased, as work is plentiful and many persons have been given free passage out of the city. There are still 300 patients in the hospitals and many of the injured are being treated in their homes by relatives and friends.

Slight earthquake shocks continue but the weather is fine.

JUDGE SAID MAN WAS GUILTY

But the Jury Acquitted Him of Charge of Murder

Toronto, Jan. 24.—After a little more than an hour's discussion of the evidence, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty last night in favor of Edward Brident, charged with the murder of his wife by furnishing her with noxious drugs.

In discharging Brident, Chief Justice Meredith remarked that he did not agree with the verdict, in view of the evidence given.

"Is it between you and the Almighty whether you are guilty or not. You are discharged," were his parting words to Brident. After reviewing the evidence his lordship asked: "Would a woman, knowing she was about to pass into eternity, ask her mother to kneel and repeat the words of the Lord's prayer and repeat the words till her strength failed, swear falsely?"

JIM HILL WILL APPEAL CASE

Decision Preventing Him Increasing Great Northern Capitalization Objected to

St. Paul, Jan. 24.—The order of Judge Hallam enjoining the officers of the Great Northern Railway Co. from issuing the \$60,000,000 worth of new stock has been taken on appeal to the Minnesota supreme court. A decision may be expected about March 1.

COULDN'T MARRY SO COULDN'T LIVE

Tragic Ending of a Love Affair in New York

New York, Jan. 24.—Sarah Kling, aged 18 years, was shot and instantly killed by her cousin, Meyer Schwartz, aged 24, at his home on Broome street. Schwartz then shot and killed himself. Notes left by Schwartz indicate that the pair entered into a pact to die together because their parents objected to their mutual fondness.

Metcalfe Learns that Davis Was Right

Washington, Jan. 24.—Secretary Metcalfe has received a cable from Britain containing copies of letters passing between Governor Swettenham and Rear Admiral Davis, in which it is shown that the American naval forces were not landed until after the request of the colonial secretary and the inspector of police.

Property Valued at Million Dollars

Real Estate in Calgary is Very Active at the Present Time and Big Deals Are Being Made

GENERAL ALGER DIED YESTERDAY

A prominent figure during the Spanish American War

Washington, Jan. 24.—Russell A. Alger, U.S. Senator for Michigan, died here today.

General Alger was secretary of War during the administration of President McKinley, from March 5, 1897, to August 1, 1899, a period during which the administration of the war department was brought to great prominence through its activities in connection with the war with Spain, and the military operations in the Philippines that succeeded it.

Milwaukee, Jan. 24.—The Journal today prints an interview with General Russell A. Alger obtained March 4, 1890, and not to be used until his death, in which he said he three times offered to resign as secretary of war in President McKinley's cabinet because of criticisms, but that President McKinley replied each time that he would quit the presidency first. General Alger said that the resignation was later accepted because the president was embarrassed and annoyed because of Alger's alleged alliance with Governor Pingree in a plan to elect Alger to the senate. McMillan having promised to give way to Alger after his (McMillan's) term was up. Alger said that McKinley looked back on him as a traitor.

After telling the arrangement with Governor Pingree and other Michigan politicians by which he ran for the senate to succeed Jas. McMillan, who agreed to withdraw in General Alger's favor at the end of his term, General Alger continued that upon his return to Washington he was informed by a newspaper man that McKinley was annoyed because he (Alger) had formed a combination with a man hostile to the president (Gov. Pingree) against a firm supporter of the administration (Senator McMillan).

THAW TRIAL VERY SLOW

Two Days Gone and Only Five Jurors Selected

ENTIRE DAY PASSED WITH NOTHING DONE

A Great Deal of Delay in the Celebrated Case

New York, Jan. 24.—After more than four hours of today's morning and afternoon sessions of the court, had been spent in vain efforts to obtain a single juror for the trial of Harry S. Thaw, for having killed Stanford White, and when counsel and spectators and the defendant himself were drowsy from the tedium of the proceedings, there was a sudden change in them.

Within the last three quarters of an hour, three new jurors were accepted and sworn in, thus making the court adjourned for the day, five jurors had been accepted.

Twenty three talesmen had been examined without success when the unexpected happened and two talesmen in succession proved acceptable to both District Attorney Jerome, representing the people, and the defendant's attorney. Then the names of five more talesmen were drawn, but they were all quickly excused for one reason or another. Henry C. Harney, piano dealer, about 50 years of age, was the thirty-first talesman to be called, and he was quickly accepted.

The other jurors chosen today were Geo. Pfaff, probably 34 years of age, a dealer in machinists supplies, and Arthur S. Campbell, 42 years of age, a superintendent of telegraph and telephone construction. The two jurors selected at the first day of the trial were D. B. Smith, a retired manufacturer who will serve as foreman, and Charles H. Blocke, a shipping agent. Each of the jurors is married and has a family.

The tedium with which the selection of jurors proceeded today makes it difficult to predict when the trial panel of twelve will be chosen. The order of the court that the jury must be kept together under the care of bailiffs, has had the effect apparently of making many of the talesmen reluctant to serve.

Mrs. Wm. Thaw, mother of the defendant, was not in court today. She was greatly fatigued by long sessions of yesterday. She remained in her apartments today, where she was attended by her daughter, the Countess of Yarmouth. The other members of the family were in their accustomed seats in court behind the defendant. Howard Nesbit, a brother of Mr. Harry Thaw, was also in court sitting well in the rear. Neither he nor his sister glanced at each other.

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THIS IS BURNS' DAY

Robert Burns, the great lyric poet of Scotland, was born at Alloway, near Ayr, on Jan. 25, 1799, his father being a market gardener and later a small farmer.



In 1781 he went to learn the business of a flax dresser at Irvine, but the premises were devastated by fire, and he was thus led to give up the scheme.

His father dying in 1784, he took a small farm (Mossgyle) in conjunction with his brother Gilbert.

He decided to emigrate to Jamaica shortly after. In order to obtain funds for this purpose he published a book of poems by subscription.

He now married, or rather formally completed his marriage with Jean Armour. His farming was not successful and he derived his income from his duties as exciseman.

Three years later he moved to Dumfries and continued to write copiously. The goddess of Dumfries and in 1795 he fell into a premature decline and died on July 21, 1796, of rheumatic fever at the early age of 37, leaving a wife and four children.

His works were published in four volumes to provide for the support of his family.

Innisfail Presbyterians Will Urge the Provincial Government to Pass Legislation

GROWTH OF PRESBY- TERIANISM IN INNISFAIL

Recent Year Was Most Successful in History. Congregation Became Self-Sustaining

Innisfail, Jan. 23.—At a meeting of the board of managers of the Presbyterian church it was decided to request the provincial government to pass a humane society act for Alberta during the coming session of the legislature.

The annual business meeting of the congregation was held on Monday, 21st inst. Excellent reports were read, showing that the congregation was in a very prosperous condition. The managers reported that the mortgage debt had been completely wiped out during the year. The congregation resolved to be self-supporting from Jan. 1, 1907. It was also decided to increase the pastor's salary by a substantial sum.

BARS MAY BE CLOSED AT 7 P. M.

Big Deputation of Temperance People Waited on Alberta Government

A number of members representing the temperance and moral reform committee of the different churches of Alberta passed through the city yesterday on their way north to join other members who will wait upon the Alberta government today asking for a number of changes in the license law, particularly that the bars be closed every week day at seven o'clock at night.

Among those on the deputation were Rev. Messrs. Buchanan and Patterson of Calgary and a number from the north.

The delegation will be a large one and a strong effort will be made to influence the government to take this action.

The delegation will take with it a large petition signed by people throughout the province.

THE FATE OF THE MORALIST

Messrs. Crossley and Hunter held their usual service in the Methodist church last night. The attendance was large.

Mr. Hunter announced that the evangelists would leave for Fort Arthur on Wednesday next.

In his sermon he said that christianity was a question of investment. You put in so much and you took the same amount out. No more, no less. It was the same way with a curling match. At this point Mr. Hunter dealt with christianity from the kindergarten aspect. A church which had no nursery was faulty. Personally he loved babies and was glad to meet them in the streets. A home without a child was only a boarding house. Christians required food of the right kind. People who look their reading from the newspapers were not eating proper food and could not grow in grace. Producing a minute comb from his pocket he said that many children had played with it. Card playing men were babies and the devil laughed at them in the streets. The exponents of the higher criticism had never saved a soul.

Members of the church were shouting themselves hoarse at the risk as he spoke, but if a preacher howled what an uproar was made. The cemetery was quiet enough.

All the churches were apostolic, including the Salvation Army. Convert children young and do not give the devil a start in the race. Becoming humorous, Mr. Hunter told a tale of a man who said he had been saved for 25 years and it had cost him 25 cents.

People must look at the preacher. He would make people look at him or else they would have to get under the seat like any other dog. Put five dollar bill in the hands of a preacher once in a while. It would not hurt him. Hell was too good for a certain class of society women who led young men to the devil.

Mr. Crossley said that moralists who were not christians would be bankrupt in the next world. Moralists said, what's the harm of doing loose things?

Christians said, what's the good?

Mr. Hunter described the pearly gates as he saw them and said that some sinners were in the habit of spitting in the face of God.

Mr. Crossley put in a word of encouragement and Mr. Hunter went on to say that he could not always speak as he was speaking tonight, but he had a message and the song of Brother Crossley had touched him to the heart.

The meeting was an interesting one and there were 30 converts.

(Continued from page 1) ing the past year by the Federal Government demonstrated that this province was entitled to a larger share in the councils of the Dominion, and that at the present session of Parliament a bill has been introduced to provide for the increased representation of Alberta in

the House of Commons.

"The province has been honored since the last meeting of the legislature by a visit from His Excellency Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada, accompanied by Her Excellency, the Countess Grey and the members of their family. It is a source of great satisfaction to the people of the province to observe the keen interest taken by His Excellency in everything that pertains to its history and development, and more especially as to the extensive experience gained by His Excellency in the numerous responsible public offices he has held makes his views upon any matter of public importance of the greatest value.

"Your attention will early direct towards measures for the establishment within the province of courts of justice. Too much importance cannot be attached to this matter, as it is the essence of good government in any province that the machinery through or by means of which the laws are enforced should be on a sound basis. I am therefore very much interested in your most careful attention will be directed towards these measures.

"The increased activity in railway construction has recently taken place throughout the west, and the certainty of a very much larger development in this direction in the future has been very rapid, and with increased growth comes new responsibilities. It has long been felt by the commercial community that the law governing consignment of insolvent persons was in a condition far from satisfactory. In order to ameliorate this condition of affairs, a measure providing for a complete system of administration of insolvent estates upon the most improved lines will be submitted for your consideration.

"The protection of game and game birds in the province has occupied the attention of my government during recess, and as a result of very thorough investigations a measure having this object in view will receive consideration at your hands.

"Provision for the further encouragement of secondary education in the province is another matter you will be asked to closely consider. And in this regard also a measure having for its object the taxation of lands in the province outside of organized school districts for the support of education generally will be brought before you.

"An act for the protection of the public health will be among the important measures to receive consideration at your hands, and provision for increasing the revenues of the province by a fair and equitable assessment of corporations therein will be brought before you.

"The public accounts and the estimates will be laid before you at an early date.

"Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly, I feel sure that your deliberations upon the matters to be brought to your notice will conduce to the prosperity and well being of the province."

The future growth of Calgary as a manufacturing and distributing centre depends largely on our ability to furnish cheap power, and it therefore becomes the duty of the council to use every effort to provide the same, and as quickly as possible, to the end that we may more firmly establish the supremacy which so justly belongs to Calgary, by virtue of her geographical position and natural resources as being the great industrial centre in Western Canada.

There are many questions of public interest that might be touched upon at this time, yet all I desire to say is that if honored with your confidence you can at all times depend on finding me a supporter of honest and consistent government, and a staunch advocate of anything which in my opinion tends to build up a greater Calgary, and confirm her position as the commercial centre of the great west.
