

THE CONSUMERS' LEAGUE

The following constitution has been adopted by the Consumers' League of Calgary:

Name The name of this organization shall be The Consumers' League of

The Object. (a) To investigate the increasing cost of living and to counteract the same by any legitimate means within their power.

(b) To study and teach the principles of co-operation in connection with home economics. (c) To watch, influence, and promote civic legislation in connection with either of the foregoing clauses.

Any resident of Calgary may become a member of the league on payment of an annual fee of twenty-five cents.

Officers. (1) The officers shall be President, Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall attend to the general current work of the association. (2) There shall be four ward divisions, with officers, consisting of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall have power to appoint such committees as they see fit .

(3) No person interested in the sale of household necessities shall be privileged to held office. The executive shall consist of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the central organization, together with the officers of the ward

The league will be governed by an annual meeting to be held in April

(a) The business of the annual meeting would be to receive reports from executive officers.

(b) To elect officers for the ensuing year by ballot from the members (c) To transact such other business as may arise in connection with

the league.






