The Septennate Again Introduced Into the German Reichstag. Emperor William Hopes the New House Will Approve the Bill.

He Hopes all Rebellious Frontiers Between Russia and the Yakuks will be Peacefully Settled—Second Reading of the Septennate Bill in the Reichstag To-day.

Emperor William on the Septennate. Berlin, March 7.—The Emperor William yesterday received Herr Wedel Preuss, president of the Reichstag. In a conversation which took place the emperor said he was reluctantly compelled to dissolve the Reichstag. Despite his explanation the Reichstag's superiority over the German neighbors over her military matters, the opposition majority refused to sanction the military bill to the necessary extent, and the reasonable hope that the septennate term would be adopted after the example given by the Emperor's father, was abandoned.
