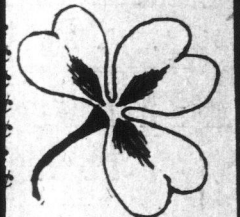

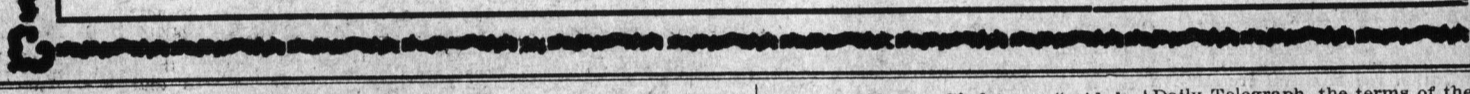

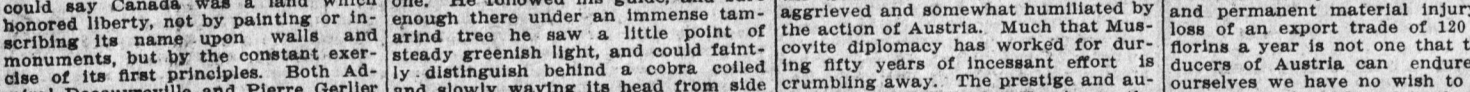

This was strongly protested against by counsel for the express companies, who pointed out that so sweeping a judgment would utterly disorganize their business, since the old schedules had been destroyed, while the new ones would be rendered nugatory, and that express agents throughout the country would not know how to charge while they would have to accept business.
