Neuralgia and rheuma-tism seem to pass from week to week throuh the summer with a weary and un-

changing monotony - to those affected. Much the same may be said of anœ nia. Amongst the fevers we are happy to know that no increase is apparent. Refearing to tho whole class of diseases of which diarr- canal. the whole class of the lass of which takes the whole class of the last we have them, as was likewise remarked last week, greatly on the increase. Diarrhœea, which last week represented 10 per cent of all the diseases reported, amounts this week to 13 per cent - cholera infantum, which last week cent ; cholera infantum, which last week amounted to 3 per cent, has increased to over 4 per cent; but cholera morbus has rather decreased. Thus we see that actual rather decreased. Tons we see that actual statistics abundantly support the general call of the public upon municipal authori-tics to take active measures against the filth which, in many forms, appears to sup-ply the conditions for the prevalence of these diseases. When it is remembered that these diseases most largely affect chil-dren, and that, for the 5901 births recorded

dren, and that, for the 3501 or the feedback in the ten cities of Ontario in 1881, there occurred 1485 deaths—ie, a little over 25 per cent of all the children born in the ten cities died within the year—we have an idea of the terribly fatal effects of this class for increase the content of sum summer of diseases. 


