

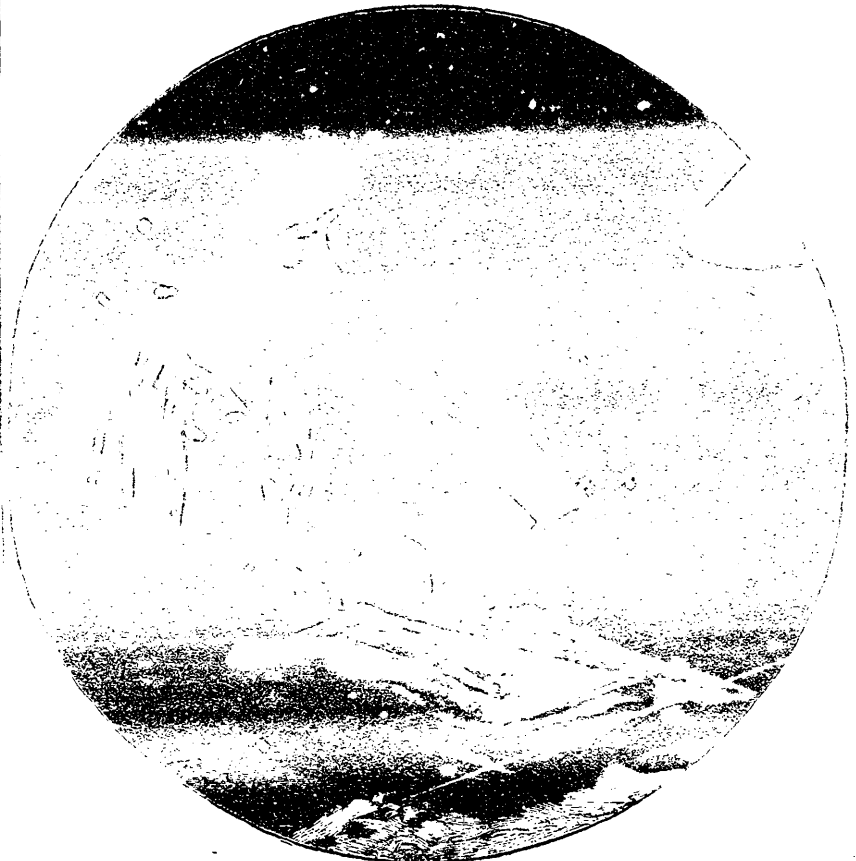

2. Timothy 1. 1-7; 3. 14-17.

**GOLDEN TEXT.**—From a child thou hast known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation.—2 Tim. 3. 15.
