## INNOCENT (?) GAMES.



NUMBER of years a mo a lady told me a sad story of the fate of a young man whose mother was an acquaintance of hers. It was in this wise.

The young man was an only child. His parents, being anxious that their child should grow up rightly, studied to know the best course to pursue. His associates were of a worldly character, and if they allowed him to mingle with them they feared he would soon be beyund their reach. To avoid this, and to keep him at home, they concluded to bring intu their home the same amusements that would be enjoyed outside, and join with him in them. His mmd inclimed more especially to various games, including card-playing; and finally anything he suggested they would assent to. Card-playing seemed to be his choice among all his amusements, and so almust every evening was spent in this way.

The boy became quite expert, at all games, and soon had a reputation for great skill. When he was about fifteen years old his father died, leaving a considerable property to his wife and child. The family ties were now broken, and home did not secm as before; but the poor boy had learned an art that afterward led to ruin and death.

He grew up into manhood, and spent his leisure hours in gambling saloons. And in one of these dens, in a moment of anger, he struck a blow at one of his companions, which resulted in death.
He was arrested, taken to gaol, tried, and condemned to death. The day before his execution a number of friends were gathered in his cell, when, in their presence he turned to his mother and said-
"Parden me, my mother, I would bring no reproach upon you. You thought it -was right, you meant it for my good; but, my dear mother, it was the games and card-playing that led
me into that gambling saloon. Had I never known how to play cards, I should not have been found in this place."

It is 3 quarter of a century since $I$ sat by her fireside, and heard that woman, with tearful eyee, relate this mournful tale. I have never forgotten it, and I record it here as an admonition to other parents, that they may be wise before it is toolate.-Harriet B. Hxstings.

But while he lay in our rooms a member of the Association dropped in, after his lunch, to read. He saw the sick one and recognized in him one who had been attending the same church. Next day he informed us that he had spoken to the minister and that the church would defray his hospital account. The young sufferer has been visited sevoral times, and we hope may recover. But now for the lesson: That young man had been ordered by a doctor to procure medicine. He came to a druggist on Queen street and was on his way to his residence when he fell at our door. Now why did he not go to some other druggist on some other street? Why should he fall at our door? Why should one of our members be entering at the time and suggest his being carried up stairs? Why should a fellow church member drop in just as he was lying there ill? Chance, says the worldling. Gód's Hand we say. He led the sufferer to the only spot in

Toronto where could be found several who knew him and would be likely to care for him. "He doeth all things well," even in the apparently small matter of directing a sick and feeble child of His. Are you, dear reader, able to say "He leadeth me." If not, you may become one of His flock now "this moment." He is the "GOOD shepherd," and will lead to "quiet waters." "Only trust Him."
