(A) INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATIONS AND AGREEMENTS.

Agreements concluded:

1. Protocol between Canada, Australia, Denmark, France, Mexico, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, the Union of South Africa, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America, governing pelagic whaling for the season 1946-47, signed at London, November 26, 1945.
2. Agreement between Canada and other Powers on Reparation from Germany, on the Establishment of an Inter-Allied Reparation Agency and on the Restitution of Monetary Gold, signed at Paris, January 30, 1946.

(D) VISITS OF COMMONWEALTH AND FOREIGN
DIGNITARIES AND OFFICIALS.

1. The Rt. Hon. Herbert Morrison, visited Canada from January 2 to January 11. On January 5 he addressed the Ottawa Canadian Club at luncheon and was the guest at a dinner given by the Prime Minister of Canada. On January 6 Mr. Morrison visited Quebec City. On January 7 he addressed the Canadian Club of Montreal, and on January 8 in Toronto he was the guest at luncheon of the Government of Ontario. On January 10 he addressed the Annual Meeting of the Toronto Board of Trade.
2. General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff, United States Army, and Mrs. Eisenhower, visited Canada from January 9 to 12. They were guests on arrival at Government House and later stayed at the United States Embassy. General and Mrs. Eisenhower were guests of the Prime Minister of Canada at dinner

at the Country Club on January 9. On January 10 General Eisenhower met the Canadian Press at the Parliament Buildings, spoke to the Canadian Club of Ottawa, had tea at Laurier House, and was the guest of the United States Ambassador and Mrs. Atherton in the evening. On January 11 General Eisenhower laid a wreath at the National War Memorial and was the guest of the Minister of National Defence at luncheon. The United States Ambassador and Mrs. Atherton held a reception in the afternoon and General and Mrs. Eisenhower left for Toronto in the evening. On Saturday January 12, General Eisenhower met the Press at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, laid a wreath at the Cenotaph and was welcomed at the City Hall by the Mayor of Toronto. That afternoon the University of Toronto conferred an Honorary Degree on General Eisenhower at a special Convocation. After a reception held by the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario and Mrs. Matthews, General and Mrs. Eisenhower left Toronto by train for Washington.

The Rt. Hon. E.J. Williams, M.P., Minister of Information of the United Kingdom, visited Ottawa during January.

(E) APPOINTMENTS AND CHANGES IN THE CANADIAN EXTERNAL SERVICE.

1. Mr. M.M. Mahoney has arrived in Dublin to take up his duties as Canadian High Commissioner to Ireland.

(a) Press Releases.

1. Text of message sent by the Prime Minister to Mr. Henri Spaak on his election as President of the General Assembly of the United Nations. January 11.
2. Text of joint statement made by the President of the United States and the Prime Minister of Canada in announcing the dissolution of the Joint War Production Committee, Canada and the United States. January 12.
3. Announcement made in connection with the publication of the Reparations Agreement embodying the recommendations made at the Conference of officials which was convened in Paris on November 9, 1945. January 14.
4. Announcement by the Prime Minister that the Governments of Canada and Denmark had agreed to exchange diplomatic representatives and that Mr. John D. Kearney, recently appointed Canadian Minister to Norway, would also be accredited as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of Canada to the King of Denmark. Mr. J.B. Holler, Consul-General of Denmark in Montreal since 1930, has been nominated as Minister of Denmark in Canada. January 15.
5. Text of message addressed to the Prime Minister and people of Canada from the Federation of Frisian Students' Clubs in the Netherlands, expressing appreciation of the Canadian war effort. January 16.

6. Announcement by the Prime Minister that the Hon. E. Stuart McDougall, Judge of the Court of the King's Bench in the Province of Quebec, and Brigadier H.G. Nolan, C.B.E., M.C., Vice Judge Advocate General at N.D.H.Q., had been nominated to represent Canada as judge and associate prosecutor, respectively, at the trial of major Far Eastern war criminals by an International Military Tribunal in Japan. January 19.
7. Announcement by the Prime Minister that General A.G.L. McNaughton had been appointed as Special Ambassador to represent Canada at the inauguration of the newly elected President of Brazil, His Excellency, General Eurico Gaspar Dutra. January 21.
8. Announcement by the Prime Minister that the Canadian Government had agreed to receive an Italian representative in Ottawa. The Italian Government has appointed Count Carlo Fecia di Cossato, who will have the personal rank of Consul-General. His assistant will be Count Roberto Riccardi.
9. Announcement that an agreement had been reached between the Governments of the United Kingdom and Canada to transfer all German prisoners of war from Canada to the United Kingdom. January 29.
10. Announcement by the Prime Minister that Canada would be represented at a North American Regional Broadcast Engineering Conference to be held in Washington on February 4. The Chairman of the Canadian delegation will be Mr. F.H. Soward, Department of External Affairs. January 29.
11. Announcement by the Prime Minister that the Government of Canada had observed with satisfaction the steps recently taken in Austria resulting in the re-establishment of an autonomous Austrian state and of an independent Austrian Government. January 30.

(b) Other Announcements.

On January 2 the Minister of Finance announced the formation of an informal committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Hector B. McKinnon, Chairman of the Tariff Board and President of the Commodity Prices Stabilization Corporation. The committee is composed of the following officials:

Dr. C.A. Annis will act as secretary, and Mr. R. Cousineau as associate secretary.

This committee was formed to afford to those wishing to do so an opportunity to make representations to the Government on matters affecting trade and tariffs. During recent years it has been impossible for Ministers to hear extended representations with regard to such matters. In the present circumstances interest extends beyond the question of tariffs as such and touches the tariff and trade-regulation treatment of Canadian exports by other countries. In these matters several Ministers are concerned and it would be impossible to arrange opportunities for those desiring to make representations to do so in the presence of all the Ministers responsible for these matters. It was for this reason that it was felt desirable to appoint the committee.
