ECLIPSES.

In the year 1883 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, April 21-22, 1883; invisible in Canada.

II.—A total Eclipse of the Sun, May 6, 1883; invisible in Canada.

III.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, October 15, 1883; invisible in Canada.

IV.—An annular Eclipse of the Sun, October 30, 1883; visible in the eastern portion of the Continent of North America.

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PHASES OF THE MOON.

In the calculation of the Phases of the Moon, 4 hours 45 minutes have been deducted from the Greenwich calculations, for Quebec, 5 hours 17 minutes for Toronto, and 4 hours 54 minutes for Montreal.

When the Moon is on the Meridian at the hours marked P.M., before Sunset, there will be no Moonlight; but when she is on the Meridian at the hours marked A.M., before Sunrise, there will be Moonlight.

HERSCHELL'S WEATHER TABLE.

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



CITY POSTAL DELIVERY.

The following are the arrangements in connection with Free Postal Delivery in the City of Montreal.

There are no fees chargeable on the delivery of Letters or Papers.

There are five deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, in the central portions of the city, served from the General Post Office, commencing respectively at 8.00 a.m., 9.30 a.m., 11.30 a.m., 2.00 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., and four deliveries in the other portions of the city, served from the postal receiving offices, commencing at 8.00 a.m., 11.00 a.m., 12.30 p.m., and 3.00 p.m., excepting however, in the more distant divisions, in the northern and eastern portions of the city, in which there are only two deliveries, also served from the postal receiving offices, commencing at 8.00 a.m., and 12.30 p.m., with an additional delivery at 3.00 p.m., on Saturdays.

There are three postal receiving offices: one in the east, at No. 640 St. Catherine street; one in the north, at No. 337½ St. Lawrence Main street; and one in the West at 444 St. Joseph street.

Point St. Charles.—Two deliveries daily: 9 am. and 2.30 p.m.

Persons receiving their letters by letter carriers should, in the event of their removal, advise their correspondents, and at once send their new address, in writing, to the Postmaster.

The receiving houses are also open for the sale of postage stamps and the reception of registered and other mailable matter from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Street Letter Boxes are visited at 9.15 am., 12.30 p.m., 5.30 p.m.

and 7.30 p.m. On Sundays at 7.45 p.m.

Every effort is made to secure the satisfactory working of these arangements. If, however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

RATES AND REGULATIONS.

POSTAGE RATES, LETTERS.

The above rates must in every case be prepaid by postage stamp. Letters wholly unpaid cannot be forwarded, they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. Insufficiently paid letters on which one full rate of postage is paid will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage, except letters to the United States, which must be fully prepaid.

POST CARDS.

Canadian Postal Cards of one cent each circulate within the Dominion and are transmissible, without further charge, to the United States.

Postal Union Cards at 2 cents each, are issued for transmission to Newfoundand and the United Kingdom, and may be used for correspondence with all Postal Union Countries.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters intended to be registered, when addressed to places in Canada, must be prepaid by Registered Letter Stamp, 2 cents each; to the United States, 5 cents each, in addition to the postage rate. The Registration Fees on letters to the United Kingdom, &c., will be found under the heading, "Rates of Postage on Letters, &c."

PARCEL POST.

The Postage on Parcels addressed to places in Canada, and which must be prepaid by postage stamp, is as follows:

Not exceeding 4 os., 6 cents. 8 oz., 12 cents.

and for each additional 4 oz., or portion thereof 6 cents.

Parcels intended to pass through the Mail, should not exceed 5 pounds in weight, or 24 inches in length. or 12 inches in breadth or thicknes, and should be marked "by Parcel Post." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registered Letter Stamp thereto in addition to the Postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted to any place beyond the limits of Canada, nor can any parcel be forwarded to British Columbia or Manitoba, via the United States, which exceeds in weight the limit of 2 lbs. 3 oz.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland, Great Britain (by Canadian Steamers), or the U.S., printed and published in Canada, and posted from the office of publication or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents (including exchanges) are subject to a rate of one cent per pound, gross weight, which must be prepaid by Publisher at the time of posting. Such periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals, addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States: On all newspapers and Periodicals other than those from the office of publication, including all newspapers and Periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly; if prepaid by postage stamp, one half cent each.

Newspapers from Offices of Publications posted for City Delivery are not delivered by Letter Carrier unless prepaid 1 cent each by stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and reposted by News Agents to regular subscribers are not liable to any additional postage.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.

Pamphlets, Occasional Publications, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, Book and Newspaper Manuscripts, Printer's Proofs, whether corrected or not, Maps and Prints, Engravings, Sheet Music, Photographs, Documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as Deeds, Insurance Policies, Militia and School Returns, or other documents of like nature, wholly or partly printed or written.

When posted, addressed to any place in Canada or the United States and not exceeding 4 pounds in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth or depth must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns, etc., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions. Bank notices, advices of goods in transit, and personal notices, are liable to letter rate because intended for the information of a particular person.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs and Roots within the Dominion is one cent per 4 ounces, the weight of a package not to exceed 4 lbs.

BOOK PACKETS.

Passing between places in the Dominion of Canada, or to and from Newfoundland, and not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in breadth or depth, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 oz. Book Packets posted for delivery in the Dominion cannot be registered.

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The limit of weight of Book Packets to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs. Book Packets for France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Netherlands, Portugal, the Azores, Madeira, Denmark, and Switzerland, must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 oz. in weight, and 24 inches in length or 12 in breadth or depth.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

Canada...Patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of One Cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an Order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible. Registration fee 5 cents.

United States...Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, posted for places in the United States, will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

Samples and Patterns 2c. for the first 2 oz., and 1c. for every additional 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

Aden (Arabia), Argentine Confederation, Brazil, British Guinea, Ceylon, China, India (British), Java, Mauritius, Mexico. Peru, Sierra Leone and Strait Settlements, Letters 10 cents, Postal Cards, 2 cents, Papers 4 cents per 4 ounces. Registration fee 5 cents. Books and printed matter generally, Newspapers excepted, 20. per 2 cz. Commercial Papers 5 cents for the first 2 cz., and 2 cents for every additional 2 cz. Samples and Patterns, the postage is 2 cents per 2 cz. or fraction thereof.

It will be observed that all classes of matter can be registered to the United States and all Postal Union Countries. Partial prepayment is required upon all classes of matter, with the exception of letters, which may be forwarded wholly unpaid, subject to double postage on delivery. Correspondence, however, addressed to the United States (and Newfoundland) must, as at present, be fully prepaid.

Money orders are also drawn by all the Money Order Offices in Canada on the United States, but the offices of payment in that country are determined by the Postmasters at

No money order exceeding \$100 in amount can be granted in any office in Canada; but postmasters are at liberty to grant two or more orders for \$100, or for any lesser sum. They cannot, however, grant two or more orders for sums of or under \$10 in the same day to the same applicant, in favor of the same payee.

UNITED KINGDOM AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Deputy Postmaster-General of Malta and Gibraltar are authorised to issue money orders on the several money order offices in Canada. Money order offices in Canada, do not however, grant money orders on Malta and Gibraltar.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

The Post Office Savings Banks are open daily for the receipt and re-payment of deposits, during the same hours as for the transaction of money order business.

The direct security of the Dominion is given by the statute for all deposits made.

Deposits of one dollar, or of any number of dollars, will be received from any depositor at the Post Office Savings Banks provided the deposits made by such depositor in any year ending the 30th June, do not exceed three hundred dollars (except in special cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General,) and provided the total amount standing in such depositor's name in his ordinary deposit account in the books of the Postmaster-General do not exceed \$1000 exclusive of interest.

No interest will be allowed on any sum over and above one thousand dollars in any ordinary deposit account.

Interest calculated yearly at the rate of Four Dollars per cent per annum, is allowed on deposits, and is computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which the deposit is made, up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are withdrawn. The interest is calculated on the thirtieth day of June in every year, and is then added to and becomes part of the principal money.

Deposits may be made by a Trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint name of such Trustee and the person on whose account such money is so deposited; but the prepayment of the same, or any part thereof, cannot be made without the receipt and receipts of both the said parties, or the survivor or the survivor or the survivor or survivors, or Executors or Administrators of such survivors,

whose receipt and receipts either personally or by agent appointed by Power of Attorney, which Power of Attorney in the case of Minors may be executed by such Minor if of or exceeding the age of fourteen years, is alone a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster General may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow re-payment to be made to the Trustee alone. Deposits may be made by or for the benefit of any person under twenty-one years of age.

In case of minors under the age of ten years, ne declaration must be made by one of the parents or by a friend on behalf of the minor.

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Repayment to a minor over ten years of age shall be made in the same manner as if he were of full age. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will he repaid to any such women.

Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

The Postmaster-General will always be ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

A Letter or Packet once posted becomes the property of the person to whom addressed, and must be forwarded to its destination. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer. Business men are requested not to ask for the return of Letters posted by mistake or otherwise.

Letters addressed to initials or to fictitious names cannot be delivered, but will be returned to the writers through the Dead Letter Office, unless the address contains a designated place of delivery: thus, a letter addressed to A.B., Post Office, Montreal, would be returned to the writer. but a letter addressed A.B., care of John Jones, box No. 781, or No. 1500 St. Catherine Street, would be delivered at the address designated.

Tax on circuses, menageries, &c., of \$250 entry, and \$100 besides for every day of performance, and compels owners of the same to obtain license, with a proviso giving to the mayor authority to reduce such tax when exhibitions or performances are of minor character and importance.

Tax of \$200 on pawnbrokers, and to obtain a license at the

City Hall.

Tax on pedlers at the rate of \$20 with a cart or other vehicle. and \$8 without such cart or vehicle.

Tax on Junk Dealers \$5 00. may Pickers 25c. for License.

Statute labor money \$1.00.

Tax of \$200 on ferry steamboats plying to the city from any place within nine miles distant therefrom.

Tax on Billiard Tables as follows:

Public billiards—for the first table. \$100; for the second. \$50; for every additional table, \$20. Billiards kept and used by Clubs-for each table, \$20.

For a two-wheeled cart or truck, one horse, \$0.75; for a four wheeled waggon, one horse, \$13.75; for a four-wheeled waggon, load under 4600 lbs., two horses, \$17.25; for a four-wheeled waggon, load above 4000 lbs., two horses, \$19.25; for a two-wheeled cart, for farmers, one horse, \$9.75; tor a four-wheeled cart, for farmers, one horse, \$13.75.

Special — Scavengers, \$4.75; milk vendors, two-wheeled vehicle, one horse, \$5.75; milk vendors four-wheeled vehicle, one horse. \$9.75; milk vendors, no vehicle, \$1.00; chimney sweepers, \$7.; wood corder, \$1.; stamped measures for corders, 25 cts.; pocket numbers for drivers, 25 cts.: owners of dogs, male, \$2; female, \$3; hearses, four-wheeled, one horse, \$10;

hearses, four-wheeled, two horses, \$14.50.

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CORPORATION.

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TARIFF FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES.

One-Horse Vehicles.—From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed twenty minutes; for one or two persons, 25 cents: three or four persons, 50 cents.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed half an hour; for one or two persons, 40 cents; three or four persons, 60 cents.

When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rates to be charged.

By the Hour.—For the first hour: one or two persons, 75 cents; three or four persons, \$1.

For every subsequent hour; one or two persons, 60 cents; three or four persons, 75 cents.

Two-Horse Vehicles.—From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed twenty minutes; one or two persons, 50 cents, three or four persons, 65 cents.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed half an hour; one or two persons, 65 cents; three or four persons, 75 cents.

When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rates to be charged.

By the Hour.—One or two persons, \$1.00.; three or four parsons, \$1.25.

Fractions of hours to be charged at pro rata hour rate, but not less than one-quarter of an hour shall be charged when the time exceeds the hour.

Fifty per cent. to be added to the tariff rates for rides from 12 midnight to 4 a.m.

The tariff by the hour shall apply to all rides extending beyond the city limits when the engagement is made within the city.

Baggage.--For each trunk or box carried in any vehicle, ten cents; but no charge shall be made for travelling bags, valises, boxes or parcels, which passengers can carry by the hand.

For every additional half mile, 10 cents.

From any place in the Western Section of the First Division, and vice-versa, for one load: To the stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 20 cts.; the stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts.; the basins above Wellington bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts; the basins above Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, and the stores, stations, factories, &c., at Point St. Charles, 35 cts.; the stores, factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 20 cents, St. Bonaventure street Railway Station, 20 cts.; St. Bonaventure street Railway Station, from the lower wharves of the Harbour, 15 cts.

From any place in the Eastern Section of the First Division, and vice-versa, for one load, 5 cts. additional.

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For any excess over the quantity or weight fixed for a load additional pro rata rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter by the employer, beyond the time usually required for loading, the carter shall be paid extra for such delay, at the rate of five cents for every quarter of an hour. If a carter is called and there be no load ready for him, or if he be unable to load the goods or articles for want of assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

Divisions of the City.—The First Division comprises the East, Centre and West Wards, (including the south-west side of McGill street and the north-west side of Craig street) and shall be subdivided into two sections, (Eastern and Western), the line of demarcation between them being the centre of St. Lambert and St. John Baptiste streets.

The Second Division comprises the St. Ann, St. Antoine and St. Lawrence Wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig streets.)

The third Division comprises the St. Louis Ward (exclusive of Craig street), the St. James and St. Mary's Wards.

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MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

Extracts from By-Laws No. 65, 66, 82, enacted April 20, 1873.

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said water works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply of water agreed for, or to waste it or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipe within their premises in good repair and protected from frost, at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7.—No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern or apparatus connected therewith, or to ov into which the water from the said water works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this by-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this by-law, the super-intendent, or his deputy, may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause or complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water-closet or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or con trived as the water supplied to han is, or is likely to be wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agent or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said water works by meter, shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorized by the water committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover off, or draw water from the same.

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- Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the water committee, or of the said superintendent.
- Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the reservoirs of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said reservoirs, or upon the said bank or ground or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after 10 c'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said reservoir.
- Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use-water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere for the purpose of selling the same to any part of the city.
- Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the water works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the superintendent of the said works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of waterin such cases; and in no case shall the said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.
- Sec. 17. No person shall use a hand hose of a larger size or nozzle than one fourth of an inch orifice or use any hand-hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses or other vehicles.
- Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of vater supplied by the said works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said superintendent.
- Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the water works of the said city.
- Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the city treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water, or to use the same.
- Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is lct on.

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Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office or suite of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a water closet tax.

Sec. 23. A discount of 5 per cent. shall be allowed to all water tenants who shall pay the said rates on or before the fifteenth day of August in each year.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present by-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of the said works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one iu default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law or of the said tariff, shall for each and every such infraction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, and costs of prosecution, and in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

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Charitable institutions, wholly supported by means of public subscriptions, shall be charged at the rate of one and a half cents per hundred gallons.

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
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WATER TARIFF.

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METERS.

The meters shall be furnished by the city and placed within the premises of the consumers, whose duty it shall be to see that the same are protected from frost or injury, the whole under the direction of the Water Department; such meters shall at all times be acceptable to the Corporation Meter Inspector.

An annual rent shall be paid by the consumers for the cost and care of such meters, as follows:—

The rent to be paid semi-annually, that is to say: One-half on the 1st day of May, and the other half on the 1st of November in each year.

If the meter gets out of order and ails to register, the consumer will be charged at the average daily consumption previously registered by such meter and for the purpose of average the year shall be deemed to be 300 days.

Persons desiring to supply their own meter may do so with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of the Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

The Water Committee shall have power to ascertain by meter, the quantity of Water used in any of the above cases and charge accordingly.

• Chap. 45, 37 Vic., 1874.—The inspector shall charge the sum of 10 cents for every hundred pounds of pot or pearl ashes inspected by him; 25 cents for each new head furnished; 18 cents for repairs and cooperage on each barrel—said cooperage to include nails and end hoops of barrel; 25 cents for putting in a barrel, partly filled, the additional quantity thereof necessary to fill the same, whenever duly required to do so; 25 cents per barrel in all cases where lime, raw ashes, damaged ashes, or other trash have been packed or mixed with pot or pearl ashes, for extracting or separating the same.

Flour.—L. A. Boyer, inspector, 83 Common street. Fees 2 cents per barrel for inspecting and branding (exclusive of cooperage), "when any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour are offered for inspection, the inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on 100 barrels. When the inspector in his judgment deems it necessary to strip or empty out the flour to find out if there is the proper weight of flour in any cask, he shall be entitled to 2 cents for each barrel so stripped or emptied (if it prove to be short weight), in addition to the 2 cents per barrel for inspection and branding."

Beef and Pork.—J. Doheny, Government inspector, 26 and 28 Grey Nun street "For such inspection and branding, the inspector shall be entitled to receive, of and from the person submitting the same for inspection, for each and every barrel and half-barrel, tierce or half-tierce of beef or pork so inspected, salted, packed, pickled and branded, 25 cents for each barrel, 15 cents for each half-barrel, 35 cents for each tierce, and 15 cents for each half-tierce, exclusive of cooperage and repairs—the charge for which cooperage and repairs shall not exceed 15 cents per barrel,

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tierce or half-tierce; in consideration of which charges all barrels or half-barrels, tierces or half-tierces shall be delivered in good shipping order."

Fish and Fish Oil.—L. E. Morin, corner St. Sacrament and St. Nicholas streets. "Every inspector or deputy inspector who shall inspect or brand or mark any cask or package of pickled fish, or in bulk, or any fish oil, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, shall be entitled to fees at the following rates, which shall be paid by the original owner or the person who employed him in the first instance :-- for each tierce of salmon, salmon trout or sea trout. 15 cents; each half-tierce, 10 cents; each barrel, 15 cents, each half-barrel, 10 cents. For each barrel of mackerel, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 5 cents. For each barrel of herring, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of shad, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of whitefish, 10 cents; for each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of pickled cod-fish, hake, haddock, or catfish, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of dry-salted codfish, hake, haddock, catfish, ling or pollock, 5 cents; for each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of bass, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of codtongues, cod-sounds, halibut or eels, 10 cents; for each half-barrel, For inspecting, gauging and branding each puncheon of oil, 20 cents; each hogshead. 15 cents; each tierce, 20 cents; each barrel, 15 cents. In reckoning packages of oil, a barrel is from 20 to 34 gallons; a tierce from 35 to 51 gallons; a hogshead from 52 to 89 gallons; a puncheon from 90 gallons upwards—all Imperial measure. The foregoing rates shall be reckoned exclusive of salt, pickle, cooperage, storage, and labour employed in washing, rinsing, cleaning, nailing, screwing or repacking any fish, branding or marking Newfoundland fish, which have been inspected in Newfoundland, 2 cents per barrel. For inspecting empty packages, 1 cent." The owner may employ his own cooper to act under inspector.

Leather and Hides. T. Hawkins, inspector. "Every inspector shall be entitled, for the inspection of such hides, to a fee of 5 cents for each hide in lots under 100 in number, and 4 cents for each hide in lots over 100 in number. The inspector may inspect and measure all kinds of leather which are sold by superficial measure or by weight, and shall be entitled to charge 2 cents for each side or piece of such leather inspected and measured by him."

FISH AND GAME LAWS.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

1. None of the animals or birds hereinafter mentioned shall be hunted, taken or killed within the periods hereinafter limited.

1. Deer, elk, moose, reindeer or cariboo, between the first day of December and the first day of September in the following year.

2. Wild turkeys, grouse, pheasants or partridges, between the first day of January and the first day of September.

3. Quail, between the first day of January and the first day of October.

4. Woodcock, between the first day of January and the first day of July.

5. Snipe, between the first day of May and the fifteenth day of August.

6. Waterfowl, which are known as mallard, grey duck, black duck, wood or summer duck, and all the kinds of duck known as teal, between the first day of January and the fifteenth day of August.

7. Other ducks, wild swans or geese, between the first day of May and the fifteenth day of August.

8. Hares or rabbits, between the first day of March and the first day of September.

2. The said animals or birds may be exposed for sale for one month, and no longer, after the beginning of the periods above respectively limited for their protection, and may be had in possession for the private use of the owner and his family at any time; but in all cases the proof of the time of killing or taking shall be upon the person so in possession.

2. Except as aforesaid, no person shall have in his possession any of the said animals or birds, or any part or portion of any of such, during the periods in which they are so protected.

3. No eggs of any of the above-mentioned birds shall be taken, destroyed or had in possession by any person, at any time.

4. None of the animals or birds mentioned in this act, except the animals mentioned in the seventh section, shall be trapped or taken by means of traps, nets, snares, gins, baited lines, or other similar contrivances; nor shall such traps, nets, snares, gins, baited lines or contrivances be set for them, or any of them, at any time; and such traps, nets, snares, gins, baited lines and contrivances may be destroyed by any person, without such person thereby incurring any liability therefor.

FISH AND GAME LAWS.

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- 5. None of the contrivances for taking or killing the wild fowl known as swans, geese or ducks, which are described as batteries, sunken punts or night lights, shall be used at any time.
- 6. It shall not be lawful for any person to kill or take any animal by the use of poison or poisonous substances, nor to expose poison, poisoned bait, or other poisonous substances, in any place or locality where dogs or cattle may have access to the same.
- 7. And whereas fur-bearing animals should be protected during the seasons when their skins are of little value, it is enacted that no beaver, musk-rat, mink, sable, marten, racoon, otter or fisher, shall be hunted, taken, killed or had in the possession of any person between the first day of May and the first day of November, nor shall any traps, snares, gins or other contrivances be set for them during such period; nor shall any musk-rat house be destroyed at any time; and any such traps, snares, gins or other contrivances so set may be destroyed by any person, without such person thereby incurring any imbility therefor; but this section shall not apply to any person troying any of the said animals in defence or preservation of his property.
- S. Offences against this act shall be punished, upon summary conviction on information or complaint before a justice of the peace, as follows, with costs:—
- 1. In the case of deer, elk, moose, reindeer or cariboo, by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars nor less than ten dollars for each animal.
- 2. In the case of birds or eggs, by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars nor less than five dollars for each bird or egg.
- 3. In the case of the fur-bearing animals mentioned in the seventh section of this act, by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars nor less than five dollars for each animal.
- 4. In the case of other breaches of this act, by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars nor less than five dollars.
- 9. The whole of such fine shall be paid to the prosecutor, unless the convicting justice has reason to believe that the prosecution is in collusion with and for the purpose of benefitting the accused, in which case the said justice may order the disposal of the fine, as in ordinary cases.
- 19. In all cases confiscation of the game shall follow conviction; and the game so confiscated shall be given to some charitable institution or purpose, at the discretion of the convicting justice.
- 11. In order to encourage persons who have heretofore imported or hereafter import different kinds of game with a desire to breed and preserve the same on their own lands, it is enacted that it shall not be lawful to hunt, shoot, kill or destroy any such game without the consent of the owner of the property, wherever the same may have been bred.




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PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

- 1. The hunting or taking of moose before the first of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three is forbidden, and after the expiration of that period, between the first day of February and the first day of September in every subsequent year; the hunting, taking or killing of elk, cariboo, deer or their fawn, is also prohibited between the first day of February and the first day of September in each year.
 - 2. It is forbidden to hunt or trap:
- 1. Any beaver, mink, otter, marten, pekan or wild cat, between the fifteenth day of March and the first day of November in each year;
- 2. Any hare, between the first day of March and the first day of November in each year;
- 3. Any musk-rat, between the first day of June in each year and the first of April following, in the districts of Quebec, Saguenay, Chicoutimi, Montmagny, Kamouraska, Rimouski and Gaspé, and between the first day of May in each year and the first day of April following in the remainder of the Province.
 - 3. It is also forbidden :-

1. To hunt or take:—

a. Any partridge, between the first day of January and the

fifteenth of September in each year;

b. Any grouse, ptarmigan, woodcock, snipe or sand-lark, between the first day of February and the first day of September in each year;

c. Any wild swan, wild goose, Canada goose, or wild duck of any kind, widgeon or teal, between the fifteenth day of April and

the first day of September in each year;

d. Any of the birds mentioned in paragraphs b and c of this section, at any time between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.

2. To disturb, injure or gather or take, at any time, the eggs of any species of wild fowl mentioned in this section; and all vessels or boats employed in disturbing, gathering or taking the eggs of any species of wild fowl, may, as well as the eggs, be confiscated and sold.

Nevertheless, in that portion of the Province to the east and north of the Counties of Montmorency and Montmagny, the inhabitants may at any time, and only for the purpose of procuring food, shoot or take the birds mentioned in paragraph c of this section.

4. It is forbidden to take, at any time, by means of ropes, snares, springs, cages, nets, pits or traps of any kind, any of the animals or birds mentioned in sections 1 and 3, except partridges; and to place, construct, erect or set, either wholly or in part, any engine for such purpose, and any person finding any engine so placed, constructed, erected or set, may take possession of or destroy the same.

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This section does not, however; apply to the birds commonly

known as poultry.

6. It is forbidden to take or kill migratory quail up to the thirty-first of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

- 7. It is forbidden at all times to use or employ strychnine or other deleterious poison, either mineral or vegetable, or any spring gun, to hunt, take or destroy any animal whatever.
- S. Every game-keeper under the control of the commissioner of crown lands shall forthwith seize all animals or birds mentioned in the preceding sections (except section 5), or any portion of such animals or birds, found by him in the possession or custody of any person during any forbidden period, and which appear to him to have been taken or killed during such period or by any of the illegal means set forth in sections 4 and 7 of this act, and bring them before any justice of the peace, who shall declare them confiscated either in whole or in part.

All animals or birds, or portions of animals or birds, so confisca-

ted belong to the game-keeper.

- 9. It is forbidden to have in one's possession, custody or care, any animal or bird already mentioned (except those with respect to which provision is otherwise made in section 5 of this act), or any part of such animal or bird, with the exception of the skin, during the period in which the act of killing the same is prohibited by this act, or which appears to have been taken or killed by any of the means forbidden by this act; but every such animal or bird, or any portion or portions thereof, may be bought or sold, when lawfully taken, during five days to be computed from the expiration of the various periods respectively fixed by this act for the taking or killing thereof.
- 10. Every game-keeper under the control of the commissioner of crown lands may cause to be opened or may himself open, in case of refusal, any bag, parcel, chest, box, trunk or other receptacle (outside the limits mentioned in the following section), in which he has reason to believe that game killed or taken during the close season, or peltries out of season, are hidden.

- 11. Every game-keeper appointed by the commissioner of crown lands, if he has reason to suspect and if he suspects that game taken or killed during the close season, or peltries out of season, are contained or kept in any private house, store, shed or other building, shall make a deposition before a justice of the peace in the form A annexed to this act, and demand a search-warrant to search such store, private house, shed or other building, and thereupon such justice of the peace is bound to issue a warrant according to form B.
- 12. Every infringement of any of the provisions of this act is punishable by fine, to be recovered summarily on information or only on a writ of summons issued by a justice of the peace.

 The fines are as follows:—

Such justice of the peace shall, if he finds the proof sufficient, impose the fine with costs, which fine wholly belongs to the prosecutor if he be a game-keeper, and one-half only if he does not act in an official capacity; in the latter case the other half is paid over to the game-keeper appointed for the division by the commissioner of crown lands, to be by him forwarded to the crown lands department.

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In default of immediate payment the offender is imprisoned in the common gaol of the district within the limits of which the offence was committed, for any period of time not exceeding three months; and in cases of infringement of section seven, for a period not exceeding six months.

Every justice of the peace has power to convict on view. Prosecutions are at the risk and costs of the complainant.

13. Suits brought in virtue of this act need not be begun by deposition or information or oath of the plaintiff or complainant, provided that the purport of the complaint or demand is sufficiently set forth in the writ, or in a declaration annexed thereto.

The evidence of the complainant alone, or of any one witness, is

sufficient to justify a conviction.

Section 19....

14. No proceeding under this act shall be quashed, annulled or set aside by certiorari; but an appeal may be brought before the circuit court of the district in which the offence took place, in the same manner as appeals under the municipal code.

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

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FISH AND GAME LAWS.

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15. No prosecution shall be brought after six calendar months from the day of the committing of the offence charged.

- 16. The commissioner of crown lands has the power of appointing officers to see to the observance of this act and of any other act which may hereafter be passed relating to game in this Province.
- 17. In future no person who has no domicile in the Province of Quebec can at any time hunt within the meaning of this act without being authorized thereto by a license to that effect.
- 18. Such permit may, upon payment of a fee of twenty dollars, be granted by the commissioner of crown lands to any person not domiciled in the Province who applies to him therefor, and shall be valid for the whole of one season's shooting. It must be countersigned by the game superintendent.
- 19. The commissioner of crown lands may grant written permits according to form D to any person or persons who may be desirous of obtaining birds, eggs or fur-bearing animals, for bona fide scientific purposes, to procure them during the close season, and such permits shall be countersigned by the game superintendent; and the person who shall have obtained such permit shall not be liable to any penalty under this act, provided he sends in, within two months from the date at which he acted under such permit, a statement showing the species and number of the game or fur-bearing animals he so procured for scientific purposes.
- 20. Every wood-ranger appointed by the commissioner of crown lands is, while in office as such, ex-officio game-keeper for the division under his superintendence, and he is not entitled to any additional salary for such services.
- 21. The commissioner of crown lands may also appoint as game-keepers any other persons besides the wood-rangers, and assign to them such territory or division as he may think proper under the circumstances.
- 22. Every game-keeper shall, during the last days of the month, forward to the crown lands department a report of his proceedings during the month, and of the infringements of the law which have come to his knowledge during the same period.
- 23. The lieutenant-governor in council may, in his discretion, prohibit the hunting or killing of any game or fur-bearing animal for a period not exceeding five years.
- 24. All acts or parts of acts relating to game in this Province, and especially the Act 27-28 Victoria, chap. 52, the Act 40 Victoria, chap. 21, and the Act 43-44 Victoria, chap. 29, are repealed.
