Lacombe, the French Anarchist, Arrested After Frantic Efforts to Escape and Saved by Police From Lynching-Will Be Guillotined For One of Many Murders.

Special Cable to The World. PARIS, March 12.-Lacombe, called "Dog Nose," an international anarchist and murderer, recognized as the most desperate and brutal criminal in Kurope, was arrested here late today in a deperate fight with four police arents in La Villette section, in the suburbs. He was attending a street fair when recognized by two plainclothesmen. As they grabbed him he made frantic efforts to escape. Two uniformed policemen ran up in time to prevent Lacombe getting two revolvers out of his pocket and emptying em into the great crowd watching the encounter. A bomb and 18 cartridges were also found in his pockets. The man was rushed to the nearest olice station to prevent his being lynched by the excited people, long infamed by the horror of his many

Will Be Guillotined. Lacombe will be guillotined, as he has already been convicted under the French law. His first known murder was the killing of a government official named Cartier, when robbing the postoffice in Bezons, France. He fled to Paris and hid for days in a house in the Montmartre district, where a man named Ducret published an anarchist newspaper. On Nov. 9 Guichard of the Paris detective force, at several weeks later returned and kill-Ducret, after torturing him all night, shooting the editor in bed as lay beside his wife.

Emmerson Recalls Revolt of American Colonies and Dr. Neeley Says Borden's Naval Bill Means Danger of Revolution in Canada-Government Supporters Show Good-Humored Indulgence.

OTTAWA, March 11. Somewhat groggy, but still in the ring, the opposition continues its stubborn fight against the naval bill, and the probabiities still point to the present sitting of the house continuing without interruption until Saturday midnight.

Naturally, the Liberals have been iscussing Right Hon. Winston Churchill and his memorandum with ever-increasing exasperation and resentment. All day the egort has been to portray the British minister as interfering in the domestic concerns of Canada. This was the keynote struck last night by Mr. Turriff of Assinibola, who followed the primem inister, and it was sustained today by Hon. William Pugsley, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Agreement to Demobilize and Judge McKenzie, Dr. Neeley of Hum-Acceptance by Balkan boldt and others who participated in the one-sided debate.

Veiled Threats. The speeches as a rule were antiimperialistic, with cryptic references newed Effort to Line Up to George III. and the successful revolt of the thirteen colonies in 1776. 

### NO NEED NOW TO DEVIATE THE METROPOLITAN TRACKS

Officials of the Metropolitan Railway had a conference yesterday afternoon with the board of control, Corporation Counsel Geary and Works Commissioner Harris in the mayor's office. Harry J. Wright, C. A. Moss, Manager Wilson and F. H. Richardson represented the company's interests.

After the conference, Mayor Hocken stated that Corporation Counsel Geary and Commissioner Harris were instructed to negotiate an agreement with the Metropolitan Company for the city to doubletrack Yonge street from the C. P. R. tracks to York Mills, the Metropolitan to use the tracks, and the city to have the right to do local business on the tracks, thus having the use of them in common with the company. Cost of maintenance of the road is to be proportioned between the joint users.

It is expected that the agreement will be made in time to be validated at this session of the legislature. It will permit the company to retain all its present rights on that portion of Yonge street, but will make unnecessary the deviation of the tracks at Farnham avenue.

expenditures to increase the efficiency of the public service of the province, and to improve the conditions of both rural and urban life, views with apprehension the growing deficits in the provincial finances, as disclosed in the financial statements presented to the assembly in 1911, 1912 and 1913, without any adequate provision being made for securing the necessary revenue to meet the increasing expenditures.

"That this assembly condemns the extravagant and wasteful expenditures of the government, as illustrated by the actual and prospective expenditure of over \$700,000 in the site, erection and furnishing of the new Government House; and this assembly further condemns the unbusinesslike and improvident action of the government in placing the new Government House on a site which is entirely unsuitable for the purpose, by reason of its inaccessibility and its immediate proximity to the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Grand Trunk Railway (Belt Line), the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway and the Don Valley Brick Works."







If the cook has learned that rhubarb must never be cooked in tin, as it corrodes the metal, and that it needs a great quantity of sugar to neutralize its acid, the family will keep on asking for it. The wine sap variety does not require so much sugar as the old style

The wine sap variety does not require so much sugar as the old style pie-plant and it retains its brilliant color after it is cooked.

It is usually stewed. You may do as you like about peeling it, but use a sharp knife when cutting into sections, so there will be no hanging shreds and each piece will be separate.

Make a simple syrup of sugar and water; when it is boiling briskly drop in the rhubarb. Cook until each piece is transparent and just on the point of falling apart. Add a small pinch of soda always when cooking this article Members Are Jubilant Over



ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.


