

IS NOT KILLING... BUT...

Great Britain's Reply to the Dutch Communication Doubts the Ability of the Boer Delegates to Control Their Fellow-Countrymen in the Field.

London, Jan. 31.—The British reply to the Dutch note in regard to bringing about peace in South Africa was despatched yesterday to the Hague. Consequently, the meeting of the British cabinet to-day had nothing to do with the terms of the note, the contents of which are kept strictly secret, as the first publication of the text is intended to be made in parliament, Monday, Feb. 3.

AN APPEAL TO ROOSEVELT. Boer's in Amsterdam Want Him to Intervene With Britain.

Amsterdam, Jan. 31.—Boer Delegates Fischer, Wolvenraan and Wessels called this morning to President Roosevelt in Washington imploring his influence in saving the life of Boer Commandant Krutzinger, who was sentenced to death by court-martial after his capture by the British under Lord Kitchener.

Columbus, O., Jan. 31.—William Hastings, formerly of Toronto, known locally as "a homelier man than Lincoln," died yesterday. He kept to the day of his death a pocket knife which he said was given him by Lincoln for being a homelier man than he. Hastings was a chaplain in the civil war, and became well acquainted with the President, who finally handed him the knife one day, saying it had been given him by a man who asked him to give it to a homelier man than he was if he ever met such a man.

Anderson, Ind., Jan. 31.—Mrs. Victoria Mary Wild, 64 years old, was stricken with paralysis to-day and is reported dying to-night. Early in the week she received a letter from the Queen of England thanking her for a letter, a photograph and a record of genealogy. Mrs. Wild claimed to be of royal blood. She reviewed her ancestry from Earl of Anjou and King of Jerusalem down thru the Corwen family. By the Queen's letter Mrs. Wild assumed her views were recognized by royalty and was exceedingly happy. It is thought this excitement superinduced paralysis. Her brother says Mrs. Wild's husband is a preacher now living in Toronto. Many years ago Rev. Mr. Wild, it is said, preached for a long time in Toronto and later in Brookline. Mrs. Wild has been several months. She worked as a dressmaker. She was born in Canada. STEAMSHIP LINES COMBINE

ALL THE MAIN SYSTEMS RUNNING OUT From New York Enter Into a Rate Compact.

FREIGHT SCHEDULE INCREASED

Minimum Passenger Tariff for Winter Travel Will Be Put at Sixty Dollars.

Pittsburg, Jan. 31.—A telegram from Butler, at 9:30 p.m., says: Edward Biddle in jail dying. John Biddle riddled with buckshot and in a precarious condition and Mrs. Peter K. Soffel lying in the hospital with a self-inflicted bullet wound in the breast is the sequel of the sensational escape of the Biddle brothers from the Allegheny County Jail, aided by Mrs. Soffel, the wife of the jail warden, on Thursday morning.

EDWARD MORTALLY AND JOHN BADLY WOUNDED

The story of the close of the Biddle tragedy, which came at 5:45 this afternoon, is a thrilling one. The scene was a snow-covered road two miles east of Prospect, Butler County, near Mount Chastnut, and the exact place was at McClure's barn, where two double-deck sleighs, filled with eight of the various steamship lines interested. The freight rates are increased on all grain and provisions leaving this country for Liverpool and London. 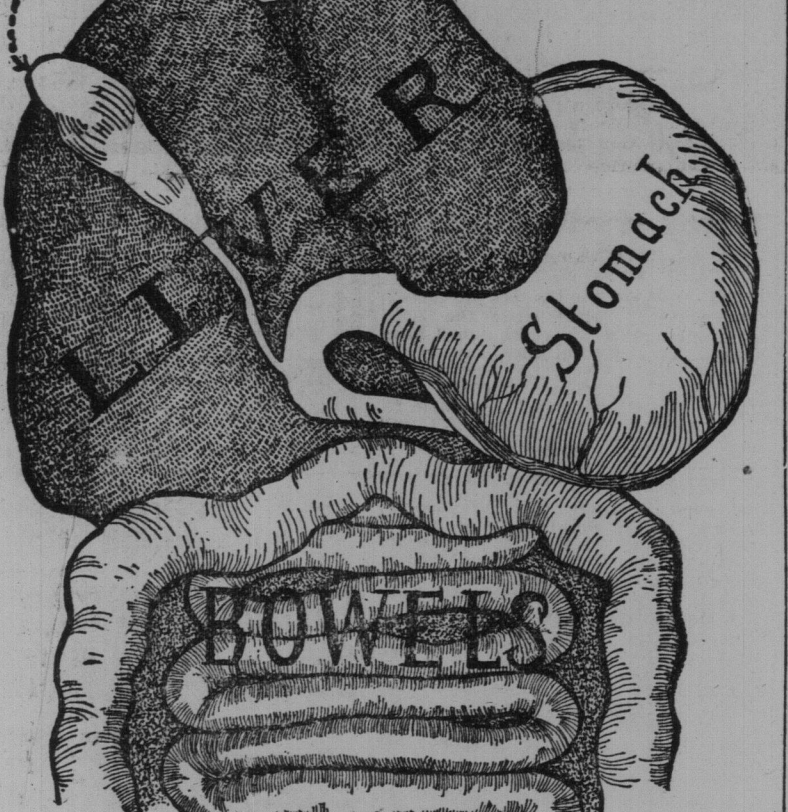

We live in a civilization where democracy is supreme, and where it is intended that the people should rule. Ancient Peru was interesting, because of the high standard of civilization reached under the rule of the Incas, the emperors of that country. Liberty was denied the citizens in many ways under the republicanism of the United States, and Canadians have more freedom under monarchy. The point and press may try and stifle the Socialist agitation for greater liberty, but they will fail. In many ways the citizens of ancient Peru had greater freedom than we possess.

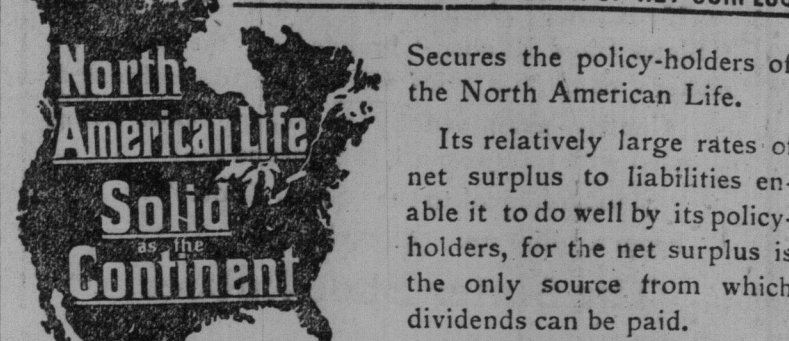

PRESENTATION
Speech by Vice-President of the Hon. Sir William Meredith, K.C., at Twenty-Fifth Annual Meeting of the North American Life Assurance Company, held at Toronto, January 24th, 1902.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: There is a pleasing feature connected with this annual meeting, and I esteem it not only a pleasure but a privilege to be called upon to perform this very agreeable task by my fellow-directors. He is one of the old-fashioned kind of commercial men (if it may be permitted to use the term), and "word is as good as his bond," and is the kind of man who recognizes that what he would not do for himself it would be improper for him to do as a member of the board. I think the unexcelled position attained by the Company is partly due to the high standing which our President occupies in the Province of Ontario.

TUNNEL INSTEAD OF BRIDGE

Ald. Crane Thinks It Would Be the Best Way to Get to Yonge Street-Wharf.

ENGINEER SUBMITS ESTIMATES

Enormous Sum Asked for the Works Department for 1902—Very Many Extras.

A plan of the proposed bridge over the railway tracks at the foot of Yonge street, at a cost of \$450,000 for the bridge and \$100,000 for land damages, was submitted by the City Engineer to the Committee on Works yesterday afternoon.

Ald. Crane thought it would be preposterous to go on with a bridge that would cost so much money. He told how much more convenient a tunnel under the tracks would be, and explained how such tunnels are built and how useful they are, as well as being inexpensive.

The Engineer was asked to submit a plan with the estimated cost of a tunnel such as suggested, to be submitted with the other plan to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council at Ottawa.

Bay-Street Pavement.
The asphalt surface on Bay-street, south of King-street, is worn out, and the Engineer recommended the reconstruction of the 42-foot pavement as a local improvement on the initiative principle. The reconstruction of this pavement being necessary in the public interest, Ald. Hubbard asked if the property owners had petitioned for that, and was told that they had not.

Extras in General Works.
Among the "extras" in the general works estimates for 1902, is the reconstruction of Jarvis-street, extending Berkeley-street to the water front, a distance of 100 feet, to be paved with granite setts and laid on a concrete base, estimated cost, \$20,000.

Don Improvements.
Mr. Rust reported to the Committee on the Don Improvements stating that the lands required had been obtained, and the city was empowered to assess them. He submitted a plan prepared by Surveyor Sankay as to the manner in which the land should be laid out for a public esplanade or highway. He recommended that the plan be adopted by by-law, and the committee concurred.

Manufacturers Pleaded.
The Toronto branch of the Manufacturers' Association has sent the following to the Mayor: "I have been instructed by the Executive Committee of the association to convey to you their appreciation of the efforts now being made by the City to secure authority to transmit cheap electric power to this city from outside sources. So far the committee have not had the opportunity of examining into the details of the various schemes proposed, but would be pleased to receive whatever information may be available, with a view to determining the merits of the different manufacturing schemes of these schemes in their estimation appear cheapest and best for the city."

The committee will see the government this afternoon at 3 o'clock and discuss the matter.

AIM TO REDUCE REPRESENTATION

Irish Members Will Oppose the Measure With All Their Might.

Dublin, Jan. 31.—Mr. Balfour's intention in the House of Commons that a bill for the redistribution of seats in Ireland for the session is to see one of the hardest fights ever fought in Westminster since the days of Isaac Butt and Parnell.

The object of the bill is to reduce Irish representation. As this representation is guaranteed by the Act of Union, the Irish members will hold that it cannot be reduced without violating that act, and that, thus, by the very act of cutting down the number of Irish seats in parliament, Great Britain will have broken the bond between the two countries, placing Ireland in the same political position which she held in the time of Grattan.

This new move of Mr. Balfour's is regarded as the highest possible tribute to the activity of the eight Irish Nationalists, for it is to lessen the obstruction they cause that this measure is proposed.

Mr. Redmond and his colleagues will fight the bill with all their might. Anomalous as such action may at first appear, in view of the effect which they say its passage will have on the Act of Union, the fight will be made to bring home to Englishmen the wrong of keeping up a costly share of the United Kingdom's taxation on the proportion agreed upon at the time of the original union, and which, but absurdly unjust now in view of low England has prospered and Ireland has declined.

England and Wales have now a population of 32,525,000, and 480 members of parliament. Scotland, 4,472,000, and 12 members, while Ireland has 10,600,000 and only 10 members, representing 4.56 per cent of the population.

If the Conservatives should make the new representation in exact proportion to population, England and Wales would get 29 of the 105 seats, Scotland 12, and Ireland 4. The Conservatives would be better treated than that.

It is understood to be the intention of the government to reduce the Irish representation by about thirty.

King's Clemency.

Berlin, Jan. 31.—A gracious act of clemency on the part of King Edward has just come to light.

A German named Wilhelm Jahr, living at Johannsburg, was a considerable time ago sentenced to be shot. His family at Wilmshausen in the Harz Mountains, thru the German Foreign Office, endeavored in vain to obtain a respite. The British authorities refused to interfere.

The mother, in her despair, wrote to the King of England, asking for her son's pardon. She has now been informed from London that the sentence has been annulled by the King's orders and the man will be treated as a prisoner of war.

Shrine Night at Shea's.

The Shrine's theatre party at Shea's on the 7th of March will be the most social event of the year. Applications for seats are being daily received by Noble M. T. Lester, 30 Bay-street, and as the jurisdiction of Ramesses Temple extends over the province, many parties from outside points have already made application. Special features will be added to the bill presented by Shea's that week, and the committee will visit New York in search of the most up-to-date shrine attractions.

PREMIER TO SHOW HIS HAND

Says Bill in Connection With Prohibition Will Probably Be Presented Next Week.

THE DAY AT THE LEGISLATURE

Many Public Bills Receive Their Second Reading—Attendance at Dairy Schools.

The Ontario government will bring down its promised bill in connection with the prohibition question probably during the latter part of next week. Premier Ross made this brief announcement in the House yesterday afternoon in answer to an enquiry by Mr. Whitney.

In moving the second reading of his bill to amend the Municipal Act, Mr. Hoyle explained that at present trifling cases arise between municipalities and school boards by reason of members holding positions on both bodies, and the object of his bill was to provide that no person could hold the dual position.

The Attorney General agreed that the membership of the bodies in question should be separated. He, however, was not altogether satisfied as to whether the bill should be passed or not. It was finally given its second reading, and sent on to the Municipal Committee.

A Rare and Valuable Book.

The Library of the Education Department has just been made the recipient of one of the most valuable and unique volumes ever issued in America, a fac-simile of an ancient Mexican Codex, or historical calendar, made up of 80 pages in panorama form on fine but heavy canvas, each page plate containing from six to twelve richly colored pictures, illustrative of important events in ancient Mexico.

The book had been in the hands of the late curators of the Peabody Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology, Cambridge, and a copy has been presented to the department library thru the courtesy of Prof. W. P. Woodhouse, who also officiated at the funeral of Henry S. Howland.

The annual meeting of the Merchant Tailors' Section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada was held in their board room, corner Bloor and Richmond-sts., last night. Mr. T. A. Bilson presiding. A large number of resolutions were received opposing the proposed increase in the duty on woollens, and a resolution was ordered to be prepared and submitted to the Minister of Customs as soon as other cities and towns throughout the Dominion have taken a similar course. The following officers were elected for the coming year: Chairman, Mr. T. Bilson; Vice-Chairman, Mr. S. Corbridge; Treasurer, Alexander Lochore; Secretary, B. Saunders; Representatives on the Credit Reporting and Collecting Board, Messrs S. Corbridge and A. H. Langford. A resolution was forwarded to the General Executive Committee, requesting that the fees be reduced and the system of collecting small debts in the lower courts.

January Weather Report.

The monthly report, prepared by the Ontario Meteorological Department, was made public last night. The mean temperature for January was 23.2, which was 4 degrees warmer than the average, and 5 degrees colder than January, 1901. The highest temperature recorded was 41, on the 18th, and the lowest one above zero, on the 28th. Rain registered .06 inches, which was 1.14 inches below the average rainfall for January. The snowfall for the month aggregated 25 inches, seven inches above the average. Old Sol was visible 95 hours. The average sunshine was 18 hours. The sun was above the horizon 28 1/2 hours. Thirteen days during the month were completely clouded.

Back From Halifax.

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—Col. Macdonald, Deputy Minister of Militia, and Col. MacDonald, Superintendent of Military Stores, returned this morning from Halifax. Col. Pinault states that the Mounted Rifles who left for South Africa, Tuesday, were a fine body of men, and the transport Victoria, which is taking them to Cape Town, is a fine modern combatant. Wonder that Boers numbering a thousand or more can get within striking distance of an effective force of our patrols is natural enough to those who do not know what Boer methods of scouting are.

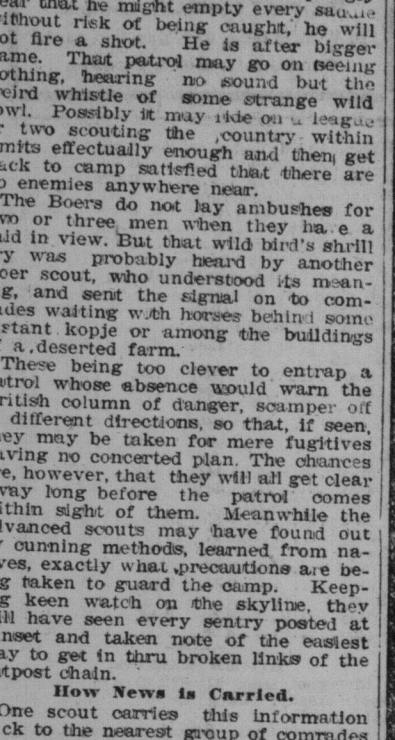

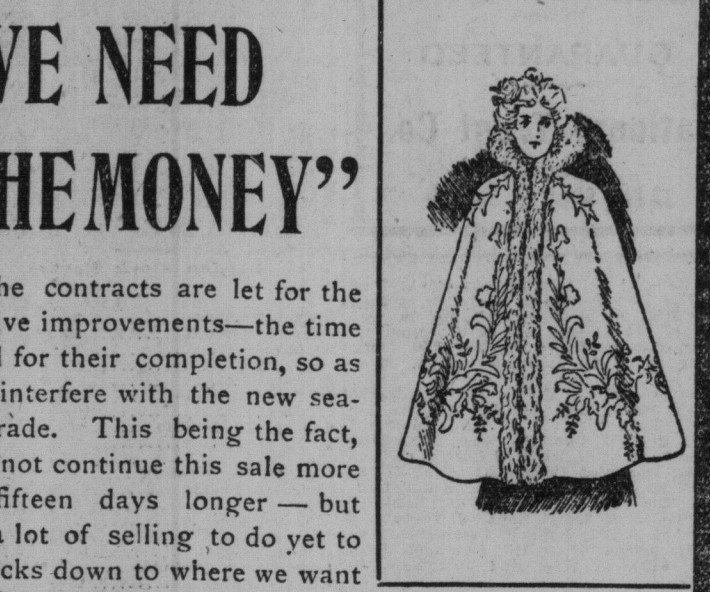

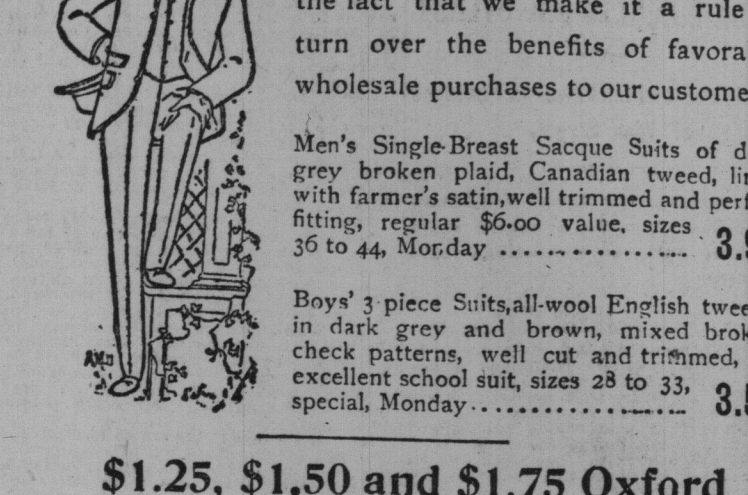
