Cataclysm Devastated Valley

No Bodies Can Be Removed and Giant Pile Becomes Victims' Tomb.

Burying Sections Beneath Tons of Rock

Graphic Story of the Upheaval of Turtle Mountain on Town of Frank.

Frank, N.W.T., May 1.—(Special.)—The utter desolation reigns on the site of the once busy little town of Frank. The stupendous avalanche from the summit of Turtle Mountain did its work with awful celerity. Millions of tons of rock fell into the valley of the Old Man River to a height of in many places one hundred feet, presenting a scene of indescribable chaos.

OFFICIAL REPORT ON VICTIMS.

Ottawa, May 1.—(Special.)—This is the substance of official telegram of extent of loss at Frank, read by Sir Wilfrid to-day in two commons: The following is probably more nearly a correct estimate of the loss than any yet. 34 men, 8 women, 20 children killed; 11 injured, probably one die, two or three dangerously, have good attendance. Only two killed in or near mine. Ten dead recovered, remainder nearly all buried under many feet of rock, possibly a few near edge of slide may be recovered.

Extent of Cataclysm.

To the stranger approaching the scene of the disaster from Cowley (the only means of approach as yet open to the outside world), the extent of the cataclysm becomes apparent. Millions of tons of rock piled into vast irregular mounds covered the whole space at the foot of the mountain, and boulders thrown clear across the valley, lie scattered in thousands upon the eastern slope behind the town. Only a few buildings can be seen standing forth amid the wilderness of limestone, trees and gravel covering a space of one and one-half miles wide and two miles long.

HE IS AN OPPORTUNIST SAYS TARTE OF LAURIER

Peppery Politician and Editor Takes a Turn at His Old Friends.

Montreal, May 1.—(Special.)—One of the most interesting letters from Mr. Tarte has been written since he left the government appears in *La Patrie* this evening, giving his reasons for voting with the opposition. He says that having left the Ministry on the fiscal question, it goes without saying that he will use all legitimate means to secure the triumph of his policy. He adds that most of the Liberal members who took part in the debate pronounced themselves in favor of protecting industries in their own particular districts, and Mr. Tarte believes that if it were not for party discipline that a majority of the Liberal members would vote for an immediate revision of the tariff. He adds that the lessons of the past do not appear to have been any advantage to Mr. Fielding and Mr. Blair, and declares that political prejudice is worse than religious prejudice.

Winnipeg, Man., May 1.—(Special.)—A special despatch received here tonight from Saskatchewan says: Doughboys near Redberry and Salt Lake in the north branch of Saskatchewan are reported by William R. Wood, a settler, to be on another spring pilgrimage. The word came in from Elbow-of-the-River tonight. He says the men are dressed in their usual rough clothing, but they are on the march for Saskatchewan. The first of the doughboys was seen at the mouth of the village, twenty-two miles from home last night when the head man, "Fred" was trying to make a head to go home. They say they are searching for "Jesus," and will not stop until they find him. Wood says that there are no women in the party, that the men have discarded their trousers and are marching in their shirts, shouting and singing. These villages did not take part in the Yorkton pilgrimage, but were very active in the search for instructions, and has ordered Doug Lake constables to hold their Doughboys at their village, twenty miles out, were quiet to-day.

PUSHED OFF THE EARTH AT 18.

This Was the Pitiful Plight of Little Ethel Dingle.

Rochester, May 1.—The case of the prosecution against Dr. Leland Kent, charged with the murder of Ethel Dingle, was closed this afternoon. Attorney Haines opened the case for the defence by moving the dismissal of the indictment. Judge Sutherland assured him that counts two and four, charging respectively, urging the girl to take poison and administering it to her, would not be given to the jury. The case would be tried on the razor evidence only.

EX-SENATOR CARMICHAEL DEAD.

Expired Suddenly at His Home—Resigned Seat Last Week.

Ottawa, May 1.—(Special.)—A despatch from New Glasgow, N.S., states that ex-Senator Carmichael died there at 9 o'clock this morning. He had been well and was out yesterday morning. He got up this morning, apparently in his usual good health, but before 9 o'clock complained of feeling weak, and suddenly expired. Mr. Carmichael, who was 53 years of age, resigned his seat in the Senate last week and was succeeded by J. D. McGeorge of New Glasgow.

SAFETY OF WATER FOR STREETS.

Commissioner Jones Refers to the Past Success Campaign.

Street Commissioner Jones was seen in regard to the proposed campaign against the dirt nuisance. He says he had more water carts and sprinklers on duty Thursday than any day all last summer, and the reason of the extraordinary dust was the high wind blowing.

SAFE ROBBERY OF \$42,000.

By Wells-Fargo Courier, Who Called in Friends to Help Him.

Mexico City, May 1.—The fact that the Wells-Fargo Express Company was robbed \$42,000 at Sinaloa last Thursday has just come to light. The small safe usually is carried from the Mexico City central train to the office and thence to the Guanajuato train by courier. On the morning of the robbery the express messenger warned the man to be careful of the safe, telling him it contained a large sum of money. Instead of taking the safe to the office the courier is said to have taken it to his home, called in a number of his friends and opened it. The money was extracted and distributed. All but \$11,000 was recovered.

Loose Talk of Ministers Subject of Keen Comment

WILL TRACKMEN STRIKE? GRAND TRUNK?

Wages and Recognition of the Union Two Questions at Issue.

Montreal, May 1.—(Special.)—There is a spirit of unrest among the trackmen of the Grand Trunk Railway that may develop into a strike before long. For two months now the trackmen have had delegates in Montreal trying to effect some satisfactory arrangement for the recognition of their union, and J. A. Wilson, president of the Trackmen's Union, has also been in consultation with the Grand Trunk authorities regarding some time.

Opposition Orators Keep Up Steady Fire of Embarrassing Questions at Ottawa.

Ottawa, May 1.—(World Staff Correspondence.)—The loudly proclaimed rumor circulated at the time of Hon. Mr. Tarte's resignation that the Department of Public Works was to be divided so as to give a share of it to the Minister of Public Works, was punctured this afternoon, when, in answer to a question from Andrew Ingram, M.P., Hon. Mr. Sutherland said that there had been no division made in the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works for the benefit of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. But it is public knowledge that Mr. Prefontaine, whose canvass for the position of Public Works was unsuccessful, had appeared the Quebec just for office by declaring during the Malsonneuve campaign, that he was to take over part of the work of the Public Works Department.

STREET CAR UNION DELEGATES

On for International Convention With Big Business in Sight.

A delegation from the Toronto Street Railway Employees' Benevolent Union left to-day for Pittsburg to attend the annual convention of the International Union. The International Union has a membership of 100,000, and it is expected that the Pittsburg convention will be attended by five hundred delegates from all parts of America. The Canadian contingent will be composed of the following: Toronto, J. Hamilton; Ottawa, J. G. St. Thomas; 2; Halifax, 2; Winnipeg, 3; Victoria and Vancouver, 4; St. John, 2; Montreal, 2; and a number of delegates from other cities. The Toronto men say that the strong effort will be made to bring the convention here next year. The delegates will be carrying on strikes as the subject of greatest importance under discussion.

BOY FUGITIVE INTERCEPTED.

Toronto Youngster Steals \$600 and Leaves the City.

With six hundred dollars of stolen money in his pocket, fifteen-year-old Charles Offord started for the States yesterday to see a bit of real life. He is in the hands of the Ontario Police, and will be brought back to-day. He was employed by McEwen & Co., and was given a check for \$600 to the express office. That was 4.30 in the afternoon. The youngster made a dash for the depot and caught the 5.10 train. His absence was discovered when the express company failed to receive the money expected, and the police were notified. The boy lives at 73 University avenue.

REPUTABLES UNION LABEL.

Municipality Has No Authority to Give Preference in Contracts.

Corporation Counsel Fullerton wrote the board that he had appeared upon the issue of the City of Toronto's refusal to award the contract for firemen's clothing to anyone else. Mr. Fullerton had the matter adjourned for a week, but he has no authority to apply to a clause in the specification applying to the use of one particular brand of material.

TO BEAT LUMBER COMBINE ARE PLANS LAID AT OTTAWA?

Ottawa, May 1.—(Special.)—O. B. Fish of Moose Jaw is a deputation of the Toronto lumber combine recently complained about in the House by the western members. He saw all the Ministers to-day, accompanied by Nat. Boyd, M.P., and left with each one a resolution embodying the views of the west on the nefarious combine. The government was told that: (1) A combine existed among western lumber dealers, and an investigation at once was needed. (2) That a commission investigate the compact existing between the C.P.R. and elevators to relieve the conditions complained of by farmers. (3) Coal is monopolized. The government should induce the company to sell direct to farmers in car loads. (4) That artesian wells be sunk by the government, so that the surface water in the west be drained off and the water under the rock strata be pierced. (5) That the farmers in the eastern provinces be encouraged to go west by the government. (6) That something be done to increase the transportation facilities of the west.

The shipments from this port during April were: Coal, 344,037 tons; salt, 30,183 barrels; cement, 354,459 barrels; sugar, 96,000 barrels.

Jettings.

The S.S. Hecla of Finske, Lloyd's Steam Navigation Company, France, arrived at Quebec on Wednesday night and is landing her cargo at the breakwater. This is the first steamer of a new line organized to run between the St. Lawrence and French ports.

The steamer Bothnia is tied up at Fair Haven, the amount of claim against the boat is \$7500.

The big four-masted schooner Minnesota is at Booth & Co's unloading probably the largest cargo of coal that ever came into Kingston on a single vessel. It is said there were 2000 tons in the cargo. It came from Oswego.

Lachine Canal Opening.

Montreal, May 1.—In reference to the letter to the Board of Trade from Hon. Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways and Canals, concerning the early opening of the St. Lawrence canal, which has already been published, it was decided to reply to the effect that as the early opening of the canal was such an important matter to the shipping trade and allied interests, and as the manufacturers using the water in the canal for power purposes would be satisfied if the necessary repairs were made to the canal at an earlier date than usual, the general length of time for this work being about a month, the Council could see no reason why the water should not be let out between March 1 and 15 and the repairs completed not later than April 15.

Inspector Appointed.

Royal Peck, chief engineer of the propeller Manitou, has been provisionally appointed inspector of marine boilers, to succeed Stewart H. Moore at Chicago. The appointment will become permanent if Mr. Peck passes the civil-service examination after 60 days' trial.

waterworks and lighting plant. Why, then, should they not own their own heating plant? If the Attorney-General limits the operation of the bill to the construction of concrete sidewalks, it would be practically useless. If we are going to have a bill at all, we ought to leave it to the municipalities to say when there is a case of necessity.

DISCUSSED POWER QUESTION

Committee Dealing With Matter Adjourn for Want of Necessary Information.

PROPOSED BILL IS OBJECTIONABLE

Board of Control Decide to Fight Firemen's Clothing Injunction Suit.

The special committee appointed to deal with the Niagara electric power question met yesterday afternoon after waiting for nearly three-quarters of an hour for a quorum. Chairman Spence has approved of the proposed government bill, which provides that in the event of more than one municipality desiring to go into the power business they shall appoint a commission to consist of not less than three, nor more than five members, and which shall embrace an electrical and hydraulic engineer and a business man of good repute.

The Chief Justice of Ontario shall then appoint a commission of not less than three men, who shall have entire control of the enterprise, and the municipalities have nothing more to do with it except to pass the bill.

Objectionable Parts. This last clause seems to be the objectionable feature of the bill. The Mayor thought that perhaps the Chief Justice might be a man who had severed himself from active business circles, for a number of years, and thus would not be the best man to appoint such a commission.

Another objection taken by the Mayor was that the government was not taking away from the municipalities, power that is given to private corporations, without any question. "The shareholders of a company appoint their own directors and they should not have the same power?" The citizens, or taxpayers, are the shareholders in a municipality.

Engineer's Report. A report from Engineer Rust was read, in which the Engineer states that the cost of generating sufficient power at Niagara would be between \$4,000,000 and \$6,000,000. To transmit the power from Niagara to Toronto would cost \$1,000,000, and to install a plant and distribute the energy to manufacturers would entail an expenditure of \$1,785,000.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

Pork Packing and Meat Canning Industry to Locate at Toronto Junction.

UNLIMITED ENGLISH CAPITAL IN IT

Bylaw Passed by the Town Council Last Night Giving General Exemptions and Cheap Water.

Toronto Junction, May 1.—The Town Council met at 10 o'clock to-night and held a short session which meant a great deal to the future of Toronto Junction. The meeting was called to pass a bylaw giving certain concessions to a large enterprise in which Arthur E. Whyte and other British capitalists are interested. The concern is to be known as the Canadian Packing and Provision Company. Its capital is not limited, and it is not chartered. The bylaw passed to-night gives the company exemption from general tax for 30 years, and fixes the assessment for school rates at \$50,000 for eight years, \$75,000 for 10 years and \$100,000 for the following 10 years. The company will also be furnished with water for five years at \$500 a year. The plans for the buildings are about completed, and operations are to commence early in June. The buildings will be erected upon four acres of land given to the company by the Union Stock Yards. About 200 men will be engaged, and as the trade develops more will be added. By dividing the beast into its commercial parts at Chicago and shipping only the meat to the seaboard, the freight which live weight would cost between Chicago and the seaboard is saved. It is for this reason that Chicago has its large meat canneries, and is the seat of the live stock trade of America, controlling the west and east of Canada. Toronto Junction is in a somewhat similar position in Canada, and it is for this reason that industries of this description look to Toronto Junction and its stock yards as a means of developing the Canadian cattle trade, by manufacturing the by-products in Canada and saving freight by shipping the concentrated commodity in the form of canned meat, hides, sausage casings and the various articles manufactured from animals to foreign countries and to the east and west of Canada.

Nearly two hundred men went out on strike this morning. Most of these were carpenters and brickmakers; but some were laborers, helpers and hod carriers. The carpenters are now getting 50 cents per hour, and they want 55 cents. The master builders are determined not to give the increase. Just now the men are being paid in a graded scale. Each man is being paid what his services are worth, and whilst it is agreed that some men are worth 35 cents per hour, all the men are not worth 30 cents. In anticipation of a strike the local builders refused to take contracts early in the year, and most of them are working themselves and their sons and a few hand out. It is not until the strike is settled that positive figures will be given in response to tenders asked for. Where contracts have been taken, a clause has been inserted to the effect that the price is subject to the existing rate of wages. The brickworkers are earning 25 cents per hour. They are offered 27 cents and demand 30 cents.

One of the largest and most pleasantly situated houses in Toronto Junction, situated at the corner of Lakeview and Colborne streets, owned by Mr. Rice, has been sold to Mr. Snell of Galt, who is interested in the Union Stock Yards here. The house contains 16 rooms, and was built at a cost of about \$12,000. The price paid was considerably less than this amount. Mrs. Annie Wynne, wife of Samuel Wynne, York Township, died quite suddenly in her 47th year. She was suffering about a few hours before her death, which was due to an apoplectic seizure. A husband and five children are left to mourn her loss. Interment takes place on Saturday at 2:30 p.m. in Prospect Cemetery, Rev. F. H. Du Vernet officiating.

The customs duties collected at Toronto in the month of April were \$8010.25, an increase of \$4932.94 over the corresponding month of last year.

W. D. Reesor left on Tuesday with a large shipment of cattle for Graham, Man.

The special commissioners appointed by the County Council to confer with the Village Council with reference to the erection of a bridge over the Rouge River at the south end of the village met on Friday afternoon. An informal discussion took place regarding the best means to be adopted, but no definite decision was arrived at. The new Sovereign Bank building will be completed within a fortnight.

Hagersman. Quarterly services will be held in Hagersman Methodist Church on Sunday, May 3, beginning at 10 a.m. At the conclusion of the morning service the sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be administered. Rev. Mr. Lee, assisted by Rev. Mr. Stanley will conduct the services.

Henry Hardin of Milliken, one of Scarborough's most successful farmers succeeded in sowing some acres of land in six days. The soil was in excellent condition. The same conditions generally prevail throughout Scarborough and Markham.

A meeting of the Milliken Football Club will be held on Tuesday evening, May 5, for the purpose of reorganizing for the coming season. A full attendance is requested.

Major Archibald, known as the friend of the prisoner, will conduct three special services in the Station Army Temple to-morrow. In the afternoon he will speak on some of his experiences in connection with prison work. The Temple connection will appear in new uniform.


