TRADE HAS BEEN UNPRECEDENTED
Bradstreet's To-Morrow Reports That Canada's 1903 Business Prosperity Has Been Most Successful Yet.

Canada has completed the most successful year in her history. Trade from the first day of 1903 to the last day of the year has been steady and uninterrupted as it has been unprecedented. The increase in the foreign commerce of the country and the expansion in the internal trade are equally striking. Sales of domestic and imported goods of all descriptions have increased enormously. Not only has the value of business increased, but profits have been generally better than in previous years. The insolvency record has been comparatively light, considering the increased volume of business, and the smaller number of bankrupt stocks offering in the markets helped to keep manufacturing and mercantile trade in a sound, healthy condition, while the fact that the consumption in many staple lines of manufacture has overtaken productive capacity has, by preventing overproduction, contributed handsomely to the same end. The material wealth of the country has been largely added to, as shown by the increase in the public deposits in the banks and other financial institutions, by the extension in old lines of business and the establishment of new concerns, the large investments made in industries connected with the development of the vast natural resources of the Dominion, and, lastly, by the addition to the population of the country of 125,000 to 150,000 first-class citizens.

Expansion in Banking.
The year 1903 has been the most profitable one in the history of Canada's chartered banks. The net earnings, in many cases, on increased capital, show substantial gains and enabled a number of the banks to increase dividend disbursements, make handsome additions to cash reserves, write off bank loans, liberalize conditions of new premises, provide for doubtful debts, make liberal contributions to various benevolent funds, etc. There are now thirty-three chartered banks in Canada; a year ago there were only twenty-two. Two new banks were established last year, and several of the smaller banks were absorbed by larger ones. There were no failures among the chartered banks in 1903, nor have there been any since for the only two of the banks pay no dividends, being those that were started during the boom in the real estate market, ranging from 5 to 12 per cent. per annum. Four of the banks now have cash reserves in excess of their paid-up capital.

The figures of the monthly government statement of the Canadian chartered banks not only reflect the trade expansion of the Dominion, but show the increase in the banking business of the country. The latest returns published by the Finance Department at Ottawa compare as follows with those of Jan. 1, 1903:

The Manitoba wheat crop this year was nearly 15,000,000 bushels less than that of 1902, the total this year being 40,116,578 bushels; the quantity was also lower than in 1901, the grain grading over No. 1 Northern, 16.42 bushels against 25 in 1902 and 25.1 in 1901. The total area under wheat in Manitoba in 1902 and 1903 was 2,030,040 in 1902, and 2,011,825 in 1901. The total area prepared for the crop of 1904 is 2,285,500 acres.

Retail Stocks Greatly Reduced.
The wind-up of the year's retail business has been very satisfactory. Merchants are now busy stock-taking, a task which some do comparatively owing to the fact that they have in many cases been pretty well cleaned out. The holiday business was very small when compared to the vast amount of time that should be placed in nature study and elementary science.

COMMODITY PRICES.
Values of commodities in the Dominion have been generally well maintained through the year. The only conspicuous exception was in iron and steel products, particularly those lines in which there was competition from United States manufacturers. The comparative steadiness in the values of staple manufactures has been due to the difficulty the factories and mills in the Dominion have had in keeping up with the demand, largely owing to a scarcity of skilled labor and scarcity of raw material.

In the stock markets the depression in the United States securities was reflected more than in any other department of business in the Dominion, and declines in the internationally listed stocks, such as Canadian Pacific Railway, Dominion Coal and Iron, and Dominion Steel, followed the decline in the United States for those stocks, and other Canadian securities followed suit in the face of steadily improving conditions, partly in sympathy with the fall in the above mentioned stocks and partly because of liquidation to re-arrange Wall-street speculative holdings on which Canadians lost heavily. Canadian stocks are now 10 to 20 points lower than at the first of the year.

ONE MAN SAVED HUNDREDS TOOK KINGS OFF A DOOR

Carried a Number of Small Tools in Pockets and Used Them to Good Effect.

Chicago, Dec. 31.—One of the heroes of the Iroquois fire was Peter Quinn, chief safety agent of the Atchafon, Tropic and Santa Fe Railroad, who assisted in saving the lives of 100 or more of the performers from a fate as horrible as the other victims. Wedged so tightly in a crowd at the door of the stage entrance that they could not stand, Quinn, with a few tools in his pockets, used them to good effect.

The massive stage door of the Iroquois, said Mr. Quinn today, is like a trap door. It is made of iron and steel, and is held closed by a heavy bolt. When the door is to be opened, the bolt is turned, and the door swings open. In this case, the door was slightly open, and Quinn, seeing the danger, used his tools to force it open.

The women screamed and begged to be rescued, and the cries of the children could be heard above the hoarse shouts of the men. Quinn, seeing the danger, used his tools to force the door open. He used a screwdriver to turn the bolt, and a hammer to force the door open. He then used a saw to cut through the door, and the performers were saved.
