WELCOME WOMEN DELEGATES.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 6.—Four Liberal premiers of the four western provinces of Canada tonight addressed in the Royal Alexandra Hotel on the occasion of upwards of 800 men and women delegates to the convention of western Liberals, which opens its sessions Tuesday morning.

There was little mention of politics in the speeches, which were jocular and reminiscent. Speakers pointed out that never before had the west met together under such circumstances. Ladies present as delegates, and visitors, were complimented on their interest in their new duties of citizenship.

Hon. T. C. Norris, premier of Manitoba, declared the present was the first time the four western provinces had gathered for a common purpose. "We have," he said, "common ground on which to stand."

Premier Stitt, of Saskatchewan, predicted that the result of the coming convention will result in a sweeping victory for the Liberal party at the forthcoming elections.

In secret session, Premier Stitt, of Alberta, and Premier Brewster of British Columbia, followed with remarks that were very brief and of a general nature.

Hun Force Which Penetrates Into Village in Fog, Suffers Terrible Punishment—German Bodies Found Cumbering Route of Retreat.

London, Aug. 6.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters telegraphs today: "The Hun is very mechanical in his methods, and his desire for certain places seems irresistible, and, as far as one can see, not always governed by purely tactical reasons. The Germans on Saturday night heavily counter-attacked Hollebeke. Owing to the dense weather, our gunners did not see the signals, and the enemy obtained a footing in the village. Runners were sent back with messages and our artillery, with wonderful promptitude, put down a barrage upon the Germans. When this had lasted a while, the range was lengthened, and our troops attacked and drove back the enemy upon the curtain of fire. The result was that when daylight came, the ground was seen to be strewn with German dead."

WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

TWO Canadian battalions yesterday followed up Sunday's advance toward Lens by another advance right up to the main line of the enemy's defence on the railway embankment west of Lens. The advance captured two craters, the one on a cross road east of Cite du Moulin and the other on the Lens-Lievain road, to the north of the first. The loss of these positions deprives the enemy of two vantage points from which he could keep up a galling fire with rifle grenades. The Canadian storming troops consisted almost entirely of bombers and they had to pass through a maze of partly wrecked houses. When they began to throw their bombs the enemy retired towards his main positions and the Canadians then incorporated the captured craters in their own lines. A Canadian party afterwards advanced into a tunnel occupied by Germans and bombed it.

The chief event on the Flanders battlefield yesterday was the repelling by the British troops of fresh German attempts to recapture Hollebeke and Westhoek. The barrage fire thrown up by the defending artillery crumpled up the oncoming grey-coated masses and none apparently reached the British wire entanglements. The air has cleared again after the rain and the British airmen went out, destroyed five German machines and forced three others down out of hand. It will require two or three days of aerial work to enable the British to obtain full photographs of the new German positions on the Flanders front. As ample time has elapsed, owing to the bad weather, to permit the Germans to regroup their forces and artillery for the countering of the British advance in Belgium, Sir Douglas Haig may deem it advisable to strike a heavy blow at some other point than east of Ypres to compel a regrouping of the German forces.

Altho the customary lull has settled over the battlefield, except where the Germans are counter-attacking, the British and the Canadians are advancing. It is certain that more heavy fighting will develop in the near future. Sir Douglas Haig has the men, the shells and the guns; all that he now requires are the reinforcements asked for. General Petain has had time to draw up his new plans, made necessary by the superabundance of German positions on the Flanders front. The French are now attacking the Vosges and they have beaten off no fewer than four German attacks at as many different points, including the line of the Meuse and the Vosges.

The Russian forces established northwest of Cernowitz turned on the enemy and gave him a hard beating, driving him back on several villages, as well as over a series of heights, and took a four-gun battery and some machine guns. When a large body of Germans came up the Russians retreated on their main positions. The German official report announces that the Russians are going to give battle in the region between the Dniester and the Pruth Rivers. The Russians are apparently holding the enemy firmly in check north of the Dniester, but in Bukovina, south of Cernowitz, they are still retreating. The instability of certain units in the Carpathians is also compelling the Russians to move back slightly. The enemy has crossed the Bystritsa River and he has also occupied Radautz and several villages. Kerensky has succeeded in the forming of a cabinet of all parties, except the extremists and the reactionaries. The conditions, it is said, are politically more favorable to success than since the revolution. The firmness of Korniloff will receive support from the new government and a genuine attempt will follow to instill fighting spirit into the Russian army.

The chief interest of the allied peoples in the new German Government exists in the personality of the new foreign minister as determining German foreign policy in the future. It is significant that Dr. Michaelis, the German imperial chancellor, has appointed to this office Dr. Richard von Kuehlmann, who is an Anglophile and an opponent of ruthless submarine warfare, in contrast with Alfred Zimmerman, who supported the German policy at sea to its utmost limits. Zimmerman, it is said, played a prominent part in orientating German policy towards the unrestricted use of the U-boats. His policy has failed, the German general staff perceives that it cannot strike Great Britain down, and now the Kaiser and his government show an inclination to present their hand gloved in velvet across the North Sea. A good sign is the opposition of the so-called German Liberal party. That faction, according to Karl von Ackermann, comprises the munition manufacturers of the Rhine Valley. The opposition of these implies fear of a speedy peace, for these persons have ardently supported the waging of war to the limit and before the open breach with the United States many of them had sent their profits to New York for safe investment. Germany, in fact, is preparing to sue for peace.





RAILWAY ISSUE IN HOUSE TODAY

Canadian Northern Resolution to Be Taken Up, Is Announcement.

DEFENCE OF PUGSLEY

Laurier Reviews Old Accusations—Good Progress on Estimates.

By a Staff Reporter.
Ottawa, Aug. 6.—The announcement made at adjournment of the house of commons tonight that the Canadian Northern Railway resolution would be taken up tomorrow afternoon was the most important item on the parliamentary program for the day. Although Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the opening of the sitting brought up the affair of the New Brunswick royal commission, which in 1909 referred in strong terms to Hon. Wm. Pugsley's handling of railway subsidies while a minister of the crown in that province, there was no reply to the speech of the opposition leader, and the incident fell somewhat flat. Sir Wilfrid placed on hand some letters written to Hon. J. D. Hazen, at the time attorney-general of New Brunswick, aiming to show that the Conservative party at Ottawa in 1909 precipitated discussion of the commission's report in parliament before the government of that day should have opportunity of comparing the report with the evidence. He claimed that by means of the letters Mr. Pugsley was "indicated thru the mouths of his enemies."
Pats a Moral.
One letter from George W. Fowler, now senator, intimated that the time had come to "put the general William out of business if the matter was handled properly." Another from Sir George Foster urged haste, so that

the matter could be aired in the house before "Pugsley could get a copy of the evidence."
The lesson drawn from all this by Sir Wilfrid was that the mere report of a commission, unless backed by the evidence, was not a proper foundation for censure of a public man.
The house got thru an amazing list of estimates, including those of the naval service. Defends Pugsley.
On the motion to go into supply Sir Wilfrid Laurier rose to defend his colleague, the Hon. William Pugsley. When Sir Robert Borden on June 4 was moving the appointment of the McLeod-Tellier commission to investigate the report of Mr. Justice Gauthier, as it related to the Hon. Robert Rogers, the prime minister referred to the report of the late Chief Justice Landry, of New Brunswick, in connection with the affairs of the New Brunswick Central Railway at the time Mr. Pugsley was a provincial minister in that province. Two weeks ago Mr. Pugsley tried to reply to this on a question of privilege, but was headed off by the Speaker.
In coming to the rescue of Mr. Pugsley, Sir Wilfrid recalled that in 1909 Hon. T. W. Crothers, then a private member, had brought the Landry report up in the house virtually as a motion of censure. At that time Mr. Crothers had admitted that he was relying on the terms of the report itself, and not on the evidence. The reason for this action, Sir Wilfrid alleged, was now evident. To prove his point he produced three letters, all addressed to the Hon. J. D. Hazen as attorney-general of New Brunswick, and all forming part of a return presented to the New Brunswick Legislature last June.
Letters Cited.
One letter was written by George W. Fowler, formerly M.P. for Kings and Albert N.B. and recently elevated to the senate. In suggesting the personnel of the commission to investigate the affairs of the New Brunswick Central Railway Mr. Fowler remarked that "we can put the general William (Mr. Pugsley) out of business if this matter is properly handled." A letter from H. A. Powell, K.C., counsel for the Landry commission, expressed regret that certain matters

were included in the commission's report, as they might "give the opposition a chance to attack the commission." Judge Landry, said Mr. Powell, had changed his draft of the report as regards the provincial bond guarantee of \$250,000. "Altho I would have liked to have seen several things put more strongly, and the responsibility for the misappropriation placed on Pugsley's shoulders, I think you will find the report pretty strong," concluded Mr. Powell.
The third letter was one which Mr. Pugsley read to the house on his resignation. It was from Sir George Foster, asking for copies of the Landry report and evidence. "We propose to get after him (Mr. Pugsley) before he gets a copy of the evidence," wrote Sir George. "If by any possibility he does get it, then we will need a copy of the evidence to meet him here."
Laurier's Charge.
This correspondence, Sir Wilfrid said, proved conclusively that the debate in parliament on the Landry report had been deliberately precipitated before the evidence was available. The report of a commission, he maintained, was no more than the opinion of one man unless the evidence backed it up. There should be no censure possible on such unsupported opinion. Luckily the truth had come out at last and the member for St. John was fully vindicated "out of the mouths of his own adversaries."
Naval Service Estimates.
There was no comment from the government benches, and the house passed directly into committee of supply in sub-departments. Of a total expenditure last year of some \$16,000,000, he said, \$4,000,000 was out of the regular appropriations, \$4,000,000 was under the war appropriation, and was under the royal naval Canadian volunteer reserve, of whom 1,188 had been sent overseas. In addition 282 officers had entered the royal naval

air service, and 400 Canadians were in the imperial motor boat patrol.
The Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux asked the minister whether the government was not to some extent relying on Japan to protect the western coast, and on the American navy to convoy vessels to England. Mr. Hazen said that doubtless the U. S. navy would render valuable assistance.
N.W.M.P. Enlistments.
After 6 o'clock the house took up miscellaneous estimates. Hon. George P. Graham asked regarding the enlistment of northwest mounted police. The prime minister told him that, altho a great willingness to enlist had been shown by members of the force, the practice had been discouraged, owing to the necessity of keeping the men in Canada. The force had increased by 500 men in two years. The term of enlistment had been changed from three years to one.
Sir Robert added that if the time ever came when cavalry were of service in the war, the government would be able to send a considerable force of mounted policemen. The force had recently been equipped with machine guns and motor cars.
Not to be Abolished.
F. F. Pardee of West Lambert referred to a rumor recently published to the effect that the N.W.M.P. was to be abolished. There was nothing in that report, Sir Robert said. The federal government had made an arrangement with the governments of the western provinces, under which the "mounties" had ceased doing certain police work in the provinces, and the provinces had stopped paying the federal government for that service. The commissioner had recommended the change for two reasons. The force had enough strictly Dominion work to do, and the work which was to be done for morale and efficiency.
Parley's Status.

A comparison of the figures given in the sixth annual report on labor organization in Canada with the general enrollment in Canada and other countries, proves that there is no more loyal section of the community than those who belong to the ranks of labor.





MUST FACE SITUATION.



RESISTING DRAFT CAPITAL OFFENCE

Government Asks That Death Penalty Be Imposed on Oklahoma Agitators.

SEVERAL LIVES LOST Armed Bands of Objectors to Draft Create Reign of Terror.

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 6.—United States District Attorney McManis announced this afternoon that the men arrested on charges of resisting the army draft in connection with the Oklahoma uprising will be tried for treason, and that the death penalty will be asked by the government. The district attorney has sent two deputy attorneys to the infested districts of the state to gather evidence. The centre of the uprising of armed bands of objectors to the selective draft, which for nearly a week has spread terror thru four central southern Oklahoma counties, changed today from Seminole County to Hughes County, where two men were killed and two were injured last night. Various Clashes. Shortly before midnight Ed. Blaylock was shot and killed near Holdenville and two members of the posse which his band encountered were wounded. Later J. F. Moscoe, of Okemah, was shot and killed as he drove a motor car toward Holdenville. He apparently was unaware of conditions that had resulted in a cordon of armed citizens being thrown around the town. He was killed when he did not heed or hear an order to stop. BLOW AT ALIENS. Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 6.—Aliens were dealt a blow by two local draft district boards today. At a special joint meeting of draft districts 15 and 18 an open letter was addressed to Cleveland employers, calling on them to put this ultimatum up to alien employers: "Become citizens or lose your jobs—if you want to work with us you must fight with us." It was also announced today that a city-wide hunt for slackers would begin today or tomorrow by federal officials in automobiles.

IN CANADIAN CAMPS

Canadian Associated Press Cable. London, Aug. 6.—Orders have been given for the Canadian overseas forces that only non-coms and men who come within one of two categories, may be given the discharge from their service in the United Kingdom. The categories are: (a) Those who are unmarried and whose physical condition is such that they require care for medical treatment. (b) Those whose parents or friends are in the United Kingdom and are prepared to look after them; (c) Those not coming under category (a) and (b) who are dependent on the military forces and it would be inequitable to send them to Canada for discharge or further medical treatment. The duty of deciding into which class men fall is left to the pensions and claims board.

STRONG PACIFIST CHANGES OPINIONS

Premier of New South Wales Trusts to Arbitration of Sword.

London, Aug. 6.—(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)—Hon. W. A. Holman, premier of New South Wales, speaking at Sheffield, said that as one who had been all his life a pacifist he had been compelled to adopt the view that the peace of Europe and the safety of the democracy could only be secured by the arbitration of the sword. This was he said, was a war of pacifists against militarism. It was a war of the peace-loving people of the world against the war-loving peoples. He wanted the war carried to a final and victorious conclusion in order that democracy could devote its energies to the activities of peace. He wanted the peace for which so-called pacifists clamored, we should have to devote all our energies to further preparation for war. Germany would sell her people that the teaching of Bismarck was right, that she had defied the world without punishment. Instead of having a permanent temporary measure we should have it as a permanent institution. Educational, social, and industrial reforms would be delayed by the production of war. The German sword would be heard at the slightest opposition to German policy.

MEN RUSHED TO BE SAVED BY WOMEN LIFEGUARD

Epidemic of Drowning Follows Women's Appointment as Guard.

Asbury Park, N.J.—Miss Ruth MacNeely made her first official appearance on the South End bathing grounds here today, whereupon all the men in sight began to drown with woful cries. Miss MacNeely, he it understood, is the first woman lifeguard to be employed on the Jersey coast. She is also pretty, and her bathing costume is as fetching as it could be under the bathing blue laws enforced here. She had not been at her job more than five minutes when the undertow gripped a willing victim, who was saved by Miss MacNeely. In the hour that ensued the lifeguard rescued a half-dozen men. After they had been saved they showed a desire to express their gratitude at great length. Finally Otis Lee, manager of the bathing grounds, approached his exhausted employee, who had just rescued her sixth man. "Help! Help!" another cry resounded on the Jersey coast. "Drown!" said Miss MacNeely sweetly to the victim of the undertow, and then sat down to rest.

HAS POWER TO CHECK PRICES.

"The primary duty of a food controller is to see that the people of the country are not starved," said Hon. W. J. Hanna in a recent interview, "is to see that the men at the front do not suffer from want of food, and that our men in the country and our European allies should not suffer from want of food." FRANCE PASSES LAW FOR REQUISITIONING

Civil Authorities Obtain Power to Seize Necessities for People.

Under the provisions of the act, these authorities may, during the duration of the war, seize in the first place everything necessary for feeding and clothing the civil population and supplying it with heat and light. In the second place, they may seize all industrial and commercial materials and establishments used in the production, fabrication, manipulation or conservation of the supplies needed for the population. Industrial or commercial establishments may be seized wholly or in part. In the latter case, if the operators of the establishment to be partly requisitioned agree to produce supplies as determined upon by the minister

SPAIN HAS INTERNERED GERMAN SUBMARINES

Government Organ Points Out Legality of Procedure to Pro-Germans.

Madrid, Aug. 6.—The Epoca, a government organ, protests against the comments of the pro-German press regarding the internment of the German submarine U-23, which arrived at Corunna seriously damaged, and was taken to Ferrol. The Epoca points out that the German Government itself has made no protest. Replying to one paper, which contended that the internment decree is contrary to The Hague convention, The Epoca recalls that the convention left neutrals the right to legislate on certain points, including the question of submarines. It is explained also that Spain is not the first neutral to exercise this right. Holland having taken analogous steps.


