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Gen. The operation entrusted to the second army, under Gen. Grip-penberg, was the capture of Sandepas, which, once in Russian hands, would serve as a pivot for a flanking movement against Field Marshal Oyama, but Sandepas proved too hard a nut to crack, and the Japanese, taking advantage of the check of the Russians, hurried up their reinforcements and assumed the offensive on the Hun River, as well as along the railroad and the Great Mandarin road. The Russians, however, appear to have been successful in repulsing all the Japanese attacks. Gen. Grippenburg did not press the attempt to storm Sandepas.
