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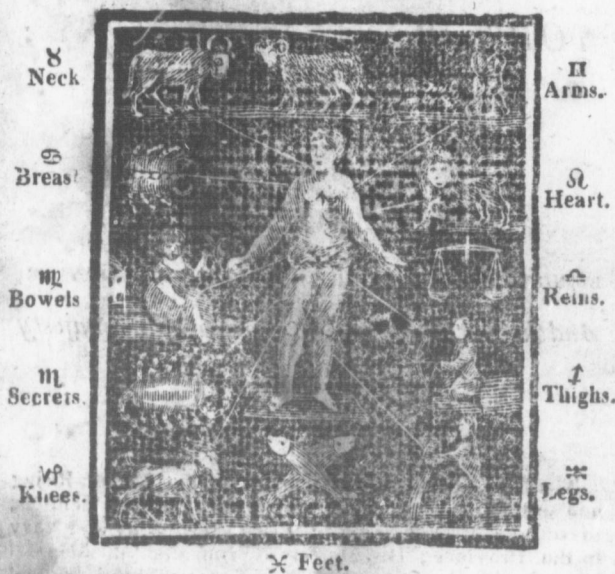

## Eclipses for the Year 1825.

There will be 4 Eclipses in the year 1825, two of the Sun and two of the Moon, in the following order:—

1st. The first will be of the Moon on the evening of the 31st of May, partial and visible as follows.

1-5 of a digit eclipsed on the moon's southern limb, or from the northern side of the earth's shadow.

2d. The second will be of the Sun on the morning of the 16th of June at 8 hours 8 minutes.—Invisible here on account of the moon's south latitude.

3d. The third will be of the moon at noon of the 25th of November consequently invisible.

4th. The fourth will be of the Sun on the evening of December 9 at 4 hours 20 minutes.—Invisible.

Venus will be evening star from January 1st until the 19th of May, thence morning star until the end of the year.

## EXPLANATION OF ECLIPSES.

An Eclipse of the Sun, is occasioned by a diametrical interposition of the moon between the Sun and Earth.

An Eclipse of the Moon, is occasioned by a diametrical opposition of the Earth between the Sun and Moon.

Eclipses of the Sun happen only at the time of New Moon, and Eclipses of the Moon only at the time of the full Moon, and not at every new and full Moon, by reason of the obliquity of the Moon's way, with respect to the Sun, but only in those new and full moons which happen in or very near the nodes. Eclipses, as to their kinds, are either total, partial, or annular. Total, is when the whole disk of the body eclipsed is deprived of light. Partial, when only part is darkened. Annular, relates only to Eclipses of the Sun, and happens

when the moon being in her apogee, appears much less than the Sun, which is most sensible, when he is in his perigee; the cusp of the lunar shadow not reaching the earth, she becomes in a central conjunction with the sun; but not being able to cover his disk, his whole limb or edge appears like a lucid ring. Between an Eclipse of the Sun and Moon there are several remarkable differences; 1. The Moon really loses her light, and is obscured for want of the illumination of the Sun; but the Sun does not suffer any loss of light, only we are deprived of it. 2. The moon's Eclipse is not only real, but universal, and appears always in the same quantity on every part of the earth's superficies, where it is visible; but the Sun's Eclipse is varied, and is greater, lesser, or not at all, according to the several parts it is beheld from. 3. The Moon always begins to be eclipsed on the west side of its face or body; and the sun on the East side.

*The Dream of Borreray.*—In the 15th century, Macdonald, Lord of the Isles, invaded the island of Mull with a large force; and Maclean, the chief of that clan, being taken by surprise, was not prepared to resist his powerful enemy in the field. He therefore retired and took up a very strong position near a place called Leckalee, on the western side of Benmore, the loftiest mountain of that mountainous island. The Lord of the Isles encamped by the sea-side, below the men of Mull.

Maclean, of Borreray, was a vassal of Macdonald, and attended his superior on this expedition with all his people. He was a man of great prudence, and stood very high in the esteem of his Lord, who was accustomed to consult him on all important occasions.—Every attempt to compromise the feud having failed, the Lord of the Isles announced his resolution to attack the Macleans on the following morning.—His men were brave and numerous, but the advantage of the ground which his enemies occupied, gave them every chance of success; and there could be no doubt that the Macdonalds must suffer severe loss, whatever the ultimate result might be.

Situated as Borreray was, it did not become him directly to oppose the attack; but availing himself of the credulity and superstition so prevalent in that age, he adopted a more effectual means of preventing the destruction of his mutual friends, and it deserves to be recorded to his honour.

On the morning of the intended battle, Borreray was summoned to council at a very early hour, and he appeared extremely dejected. Macdonald observed this, and remarking that it must naturally be distressing to his feelings to be engaged against his own clan, he kindly entreated that Borreray should take charge of a body of men intended for a reserve. The other thanked the Lord of the Isles, but declined the favour; and assured his superior that though he felt much reluctance to spill the blood of his clansmen, that was by no means the chief cause of his sorrow. The Lord of the Isles requested to know what other cause he could have, and Maclean appeared very averse from disclosing it; but he at last informed Macdonald that he had a dream the preceding night, which gave him great alarm. In his sleep he had been visited by a supernatural being, which chanted to him some verses, which may be translated as follows:

“Thou dark and dismal Leckalee,  
The fatal fight befalls on thee;  
The race of Gillean shall prevail,—  
The stranger's strength this day shall fail.  
The lofty, towering Gardnyhu  
Shall yield the Eagles plenteous food;  
Ere swords to their black sheaths return,  
The Red Knight's blood shall stain the barn.”

These words are much more expressive in the original Gaelic. When Borreray had told this story and recited these lines in the presence of the leaders of the Macdonalds, they all declared their determination not to attack the enemy. Thus Maclean of Borreray, with great satisfaction, effected his judicious and humane purpose; and the Lord of the Isles left Mull without bloodshed.

*Horrible Assassination by a French Curate.*

PARIS, JULY 21, 1824.

A brochure (pamphlet) has been published here, giving a detailed account of the rape and assassination committed by Mingrat, ex-curate of St. Quentin (department of the Isere), who was condemned to death by the Court of Assize of Grenoble, on the 9th of December, 1822. The following are the principle facts:—Mingrat, a man of low extraction, was, at the age of 28, named to the curacy of St. Quentin. He had not been long in the situation when some strange stories began to circulate respecting him. Some scandalous and criminal adventures were laid to his account, and neither his tone nor his manners were calculated to discredit those rumours. He was a man of lofty stature, with a sombre, false, and disdainful expression of countenance. He was possessed of im-

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 mense strength, and has been seen to carry on his shoulders, from one part of the church to another, a heavy wooden confessional, which generally resisted the force of two ordinary men to move. With the strength of a giant, he had also the passions and arrogance of one. However, as an element of success in his profession, he affected great rigour in his sentiments and conduct, interdicting and discountenancing, as much as in him lay, the amusements and recreations of his parishioners. At a quarter of a league from St. Quentin, in the hamlet of Get, lived Etienne Charalet, a disbanded soldier, whose wife, Marie Gerin, was remarkable for her beauty. The curate Miogratt, who had been inflamed by the charms of the soldier's pretty wife, called one day at the cottage, and told Marie Gerin, when next she came to St. Quentin, to call upon him, as he should have to charge her with a letter for the curate of her village. Even at this early period he commenced his criminal

designs, by engaging Marie to listen to some pretended pious discourses, which he read to her in the most impassioned manner, not which he only used as a pretext to make a most warm and amorous declaration of his passion for her. This circumstance was proved on the trial by a young man who had been listening outside the window to the mystical declarations of Mingrat. A few days after this, Marie went to St. Quentin, and entered the church about six o'clock in the evening. On seeing Mingrat, she saluted him respectfully, and said, she came to confess to him. He, on some pretext or other, got her into the Presbytery where he lived, adjoining the church. There, it appears, he consummated the double crime of violation and assassination, in doing which he must have gagged the mouth of his victim, as low, inarticulate, and stifled moans, were heard by his

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servant maid. The marks of strangulation were found upon the neck of the unfortunate woman. 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that he was watched, he set about disposing of the body of his victim. The unfortunate girl, half dead with fear and horror, took the oath prescribed. After this extraordinary scene, Mingrat resumed his tranquillity. However, some days after, as some young shepherds were fishing in the stream which flows into the Isere, one of them, on drawing up his line, found a human thigh attached to it. Naturally alarmed at such a sight, they fled towards the village and told what had taken place. The authorities repaired to the spot, the thigh was recognised to be that of a young woman, and there, of course, was no longer any doubt as to Marie Gerin having been murdered. As public opinion pointed out Mingrat as the assassin

 he resorted to a last effort to remove suspicion from him. The authorities had ordered the thigh to be buried in the church yard. Mingrat repaired thither, and ordered the thigh to be removed, saying it should not rest in consecrated ground, for Marie Garin had committed suicide, and then, affecting to fall into a state of fanatical excitement, he exclaimed—"Yes, I saw that she was possessed by the devil!—yes, by Satan, who carried her away in his arms, and plunged with her into the the abyss of hell!" Those who were present could contain no longer their indignation, but loudly cursed and hooted this hypocritical ruffian. The next morning, while Mingrat was at breakfast, two gendarmes entered; they were not charged to make him prisoner, but merely to watch his motions. He appeared dreadfully alarmed, but endeavoured to conceal it, and invited them to partake of his breakfast. Before breakfast was over the vicar of Zallin came in, and brought a

letter from his Curate to Mingrat on the subject of the murder.—  
 The concluding words of this were, "The murmurs afloat respect-  
 ing the assassination of the woman weigh heavily upon you—if  
 you are guilty fly instantly" Mingrat took the advice and fled.  
 The Mayor sent the gens d'arms in pursuit of him, but Mingrat got  
 over the frontiers into Savoy, before they could take him. They  
 however, gave a description of his crime and person to some Pied-  
 montese carabineers, into whose hands he shortly after fell, and  
 was conducted to the prison of Chamberry, from whence he has  
 been transferred to the fortress of Fenestrella. The Sardinian  
 Government have constantly refused to deliver him up, though he  
 has been condemned to death by the tribunal of Grenoble. The  
 trial was heard with closed doors—a rather remarkable circum-  
 stance. A Grand Vicar of Grenoble went to visit him in the

prison of Chamberry. Oo Mingrat seeing him, he threw himself at his feet and exclaimed, " Ah father, I am guilty, pardon me !" This public avowal was not at all relished by the Grand Vicar, who immediately ordered those present to retire when he had a *tete a tete* with the worthy curate. This Grand Vicar ran no little risk on his return to Grenoble ; for the people supposing that he had brought back Mingrat for the purpose of delivering him up to the law, attacked the Vicar's carriage, determined to do justice upon him themselves.

To this detail of the facts of his horrible case, is annexed a letter written by the brother of Marie Gerin, in which he says—  
 " Before publishing this notice, I had resource to every effort to bring the guilty to punishment, but they have all proved fruitless. Every door has been shut against me. My poor sister's husband and myself had a memorial presented to his Majesty. In the answer to which, signed by the Duke de la Chatre, the King acknowledges the justice of our demand—he assures us of his protection and justice, but invites us to follow the usual and constitutional forms, and address ourselves to the Keeper of the Seals. This we did, accompanied by a copy of the King's letter, but we have not been able to obtain an answer from his Excellency. We then presented a petition to the Chamber of Deputies, which had scarcely a better fate as the Chamber passed to the order of the day on it, the Reporter alleging as a reason that it was not known where Mingrat was. The brother also complains in this letter of the calumnies uttered against him, and the husband of his sister, by the country curates, who take part with Mingrat, and have not hesitated to attribute this crime to the brother and husband of the victim. The brother was not in the country when it took place.

*Preparation of a fire-proof and water-proof Cement.*—To half an equal quantity of vinegar, in order to curdle it; then separate the curd from the whey, and mix the whey with the white of four or five eggs, beating the whole well together, when it is well mixed add a little quick-lime, through a sieve, until it has acquired the consistence of a thick paste.

With this cement broken vessels and cracks of all kinds may be mended. It dries quickly, and resists the action of fire and water

*Ginger Beer.*—This when well made, is one of the most wholesome and agreeable beverages that can be imagined. The subjoined recipe for producing it in high perfection may be found useful during the summer months :—" Take one ounce and a half of ginger, well bruised, one ounce of cream of tartar, and one pound of white sugar ; put these ingredients into an earthen vessel, and pour upon them a gallon of boiling water ; when cold, add a table spoonful of yeast, and let the whole stand till the next morning. Then skim it, bottle it, and keep it three days in a cool place before you drink. Be sure to use good sound corks, and secure them with twine or wire.

*Cure for the Scrofula.*—A young man in the neighbourhood of Brechin, who was many years afflicted in his head with the scrofula, or king's evil, to remove which, almost the whole materia medica had been tried without any success, was last year advised to have his sores bathed with common spring water three times a day, or oftener, if they got dry, and always bind them up with linen dipped in the same. By this simple application, which has continued about three months, he has obtained at present, and apparently a radical cure; the hard scirrhous tumours are dissolved, and the skin has nearly gained its natural colour.

**S**AMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a breast of Chebucto Head, run N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

**T**HE Parrsborough Packet sails regularly between Windsor and Parrsbor-  
ough on Monday, wind and weather permitting so as to be at Windsor on  
Tuesday ; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or  
after eight o'clock in the morning of that day : the Packet frequently goes  
twice or three times a week when business requires it.

*Time of going through the Falls.*

**T**HE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

**To preserve Apples** — Dry a glazed jar perfectly well, put a few pebbles in the bottom, fill the jar with apples, and cover it with a bit of wood made to fit exactly ; and over that put a little fresh mortar. The pebbles attract the damp of the apples. The mortar draws the air from the jar, and leaves the apples free from its pressure, which, together with the principle of putrefaction which the air contains, are the causes of decay. Apples, kept thus, have been found quite sound, fair, and juicy, in July.

**Sick Head Ache.** — To remove an attack of the sick head ache, a correspondent in one of the monthly journals, recommends the patient to take a spoonful of ginger mixed with a lump of sugar, in a tumbler three parts full of water, with chill off ; to sit for quarter of an hour, with his feet in water agreeably warm and to apply a napkin wrung out with cold water to the temples or forehead, whichever appears the most affected.
