Eclipses for the Year 1825.

There will be 4 Eclipses in the year 1825, two of the Sun and two of the Moon, in the following order:-

1st. The first will be of the Moon cz the evening of the \$1st of May, partial and visible as follows.

1-5 of a digit eclipsed on the moon's southern limb, or from the northern side of the earth's shadow.

2d. The second will be of the Sun on the morning of the 16th of June at a hours 8 minutes.—Invisible here on account of the moon's south latitude.

3d. The third will be of the moon at noon of the 25th of November consequently invisible.

4th. The fourth will be of the Sun on the evening of December 9 at 4 hours 20 minutes.—Invisible.

Venus will be evening star from January 1st until the 19th of May, thence morning star until the end of the year.

EXPLANATION OF ECLIPSES.

An Eclipse of the Sun, is occasioned by a diametrical interposition of the moon between the Sun and Earth.

An Eclipse of the Moon, is occasioned by a diametrical opposition of the Earth between the Sun and Moon.

Eclipses of the Sun rappen only at the time of New Moon, and Eclipses of the Moon only at the line of the full Moon, and not at every new and full Moon, by reason of the obliquity of the Moon's way, with respect to the Sun, but only in those jew and full moons which happen in or very near the nodes. Eclipses, as so that kinds, are either total, partial, or annular. Total, is when the whole disk of the body eclipsed is deprived of light. Partial, when only part is darkened, puniar, relates only to Eclipses of the Sun, and happen.

when the moon being in her apogee, appears much less than the Sun, which is most sensible, when he is in his perigee; the cusp of the lunar shadow not reaching the earth, she becomes in a central conjunction with the sun; but not being able to cover his disk, his whole limb or edge appears like a luciding. Between an Eclipse of the Sun and Moon there are several remarkable differences; 1. The Moon really loses her light, and is obscured for want of the illumination of the Sun; but the Sun does not suffer any loss of light, only we are deprived of it. 2 The moon's Eclipse is not only real, but universal, and appears always in the same quantity on every part of the earth's superfices, where it is visible; but the Sun's Eclipse is varied, and as greater, lesser, or not at all, according to the several parts it is beheld from. 3. The Moon always begins to be eclipsed on the west side of its face or body; and the sun on the East side.

The Dream of Borreray.—In the 15th century, Macdonald, Lord of the Isles, invaded the island of Mull with a large force; and Maclean, the chief of that clan, being taken by surprise, was not prepared to resist his powerful enemy in the field. He therefore retired and took up a very strong position near a place called Leckatee, on the western side of Benmore, the loftiest mountain of that mountainous island. The Lord of the Isles

encamped by the sea side, below the men of Mull.

Maclean, of Borreray, was a vassal of Macdonaid, and attended his superior on this expedition with all his people. He was a man of great prindence, and stood very high in the esteem of his Lord, who was accustomed to consult him on all important occasions — Every attempt to compromise the feud having failed, the Lord of the Isles announced his resolution to a tack the Macleans on the following morning. — His men were brave and numerous, but the advantage of the ground which his elemies occupied, gave them every chance of success; and there could be no doubt that the Macdonaids must suffer severe loss, whatever the ultimate result might be.

Situated as Borreray was, it did not become him directly to oppose the attack; but availing himself of the credulity and superstition so prevalent in that age, he adopted a more effectual means of preventing the destruction of

his mutual friends, and it deserves to be recorded to his honour.

On the morning of the intended battle, Borreray was summoned to council at a very early hour, and he appeared extremely dejected. Macdonald observed this, and remarking that it must naturally be distressing to his feelings to be engaged against his own clan, he kindly entreated that Borreray should take charge of a body of men intended for a reserve. The other thanked the Lord of the Isles, but declined the favour; and assured his superior that though he felt much reluctance to spill the blood of his clansmen, that was by no means the chief cause of his sorrow. The Lord of the Isles requested to know what other cause he could have, and Maclean appeared very averse from disclosing it; but he at last informed Macdonald that he had a dream the preceding night, which gave him great alarm. In his sleep he had been visited by a supernatural being, which chanted to him some verses, which may be translated as follows:

"Thou dark and dismal Leckalee, The fatal fights befals on thee; The race of Gillean shall prevail,— The stranger's strength this day shall fail.

The lofty, towering Gardnyhu
Shall yield the Eagles pleuteous food;
Ere swords to their black sheaths return,
The Red Knight's blood shall stain the burn."

These words are much more expressive in the original Gaelic. When Borreray had told this story and recited these times in the presence of the leaders of the Macdonalds, they all declared their determination not to attack the enemy. Thus Maclean of Borreray, with great satisfaction, effected his indicious and humane purpose; and the Lord of the Isles left Mull without bloodshed.

Horrible Assassination by a French Curate. PARIS, JULY 21, 1824.

A brochure (pamphlet) has been published here, giving a detailed account of the rape and assassination committed by Mingrat, excurate of St. Quenten (department of the Isere), who was condemned to death by the Court of Assize of Grenoble, on the 9th of December, 1822. The following are the principle facts:—Mingrat, a man of low extraction, was, at the age of 28, named to the curacy of St. Quentin. He had not been long in the situation when some strange stories began to circulate respecting him. Some scandalous and criminal adventures were laid to his account, and meither his tone nor his manners were calculated to discredit these rumours. He was a man of lofty stature, with a sombre, false, and disdainful expression of countenance. He was possessed of im-

The concluding words of this were, "The mornurs afloat respecting the assassination of the woman weigh heavily upon you—if you are guilty fly instantly" Mingrat took the advice and fled. The Mayor sent the gens d'arms in pursuit of him, but Mingrat got over the frontiers into Savoy, before they could take him. They however, gave a description of his crime and person to so me Piedmontese carbineers, into whose hands he shortly after fell, and was conducted to the prison of Chamberry, from whence he has been transferred to the fortress of Fonestrella. The Sard inian Government have constantly refused to deliver him up, though he has been condemned to death by the tribunal of Grenoble. The trial was heard with closed doors—a rather remarkable circumstance. A Grand Vicar of Grenoble want to visit him in the

prison of Chamberry. Oo Mingrat seeing him, he threw himself at his feet and exclaimed, " Ah father, I am guilty, pardon me !" This public avowal was not at all relished by the Grand Vicar, who immediately ordered those present to retire when he had n tete a tete with the worthy carate. This Grand Vicar ran no littlarisk on his return to Grenoble; for the people supposing that he had brought back Mingrat for the purpose of delivering him up to the law, attacked the Vicar's carriage, determined to do justice upon him themselves.

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To this detail of the facts of his horrible case, is annexed a letter written by the brother of Marie Gerin, in which he says-Before publishing this notice, I had resource to every effort to bring the guilty to punishment, but they have all proved fruitless. Every door has been shut against me. My poor sister's husband and myself had a memorial presented to his Majesty. In the answer to which, signed by the Duke de la Chatre, the King acknowledges the justice of our demand-he assures us of his protection and justice, but invites us to follow the usual and constitutional forms, and address ourselves to the Keeper of the Seals. This we did, accompanied by a copy of the King's letter, but we have not been able to obtain an answer from his Excellency. then presented a petition to the Chamber of Deputies, which had scarcely a better fate as the Chamber passed to the order of the day on it, the Reporter alleging as a reason that it was not known where Mingrat was. The brother also complains in this letter of the calumnies attered against him, and the husband of his sister, by the country curates, who take part with Mingrat, and have not hesitated to attribute this crime to the brother and husband of the victim. The brother was not in the country when it took

Preparation of a fire-proof and water-proof Cement .- To half an equal quantity of vinegar, in order to curdle it; then separate the curd from the whey, and mix the whey with the white of four or five eggs. beating the whole well together, when it is well mixed add a little quick-lime, through a sieve, until it has acquired the consistence of a thick paste.

The subjoined recipe for producing it in high perfection may be found useful during the summer months :- " Take one ounce and a half of ginger, well bruised, one ounce of cream of tartar, and one pound of white angar; put these ingredients into an earthen vessel, and pour upon them a gailon of boiling water; when cold, add a table spoonful of yeast, and let the whole stand till the next morning. Then skim it, bottle it, and keep it three days in a cool place before you drink. Be sure to use good sound corks, and secure them with

Cure for the Scrofula .- A young man in the neighbourhood of Brechin, who was many years affleted in his head with the scrofula, or king sevil, to remove which, almost the whole materia medica had been tried without any success, was last year advised to have his sores bathed with common spring water three times a day, or oftener, if they got dry, and always bind them up with linen dipped the same. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no, shoat or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note - The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all

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To preserve Apples -Dry a glazed jar perfectly well, put a few pebbles in the bottom, fill the jar with apples, and cover it with a bit of wood made to fire sactly; and over that put a little fresh mortar. The pebbles attract the damp of the apples. The mortar draws the air from the jar, and leaves the applies free from its pressure, which, together with the plinciple of puttefaction which the air contains, are the causes of decay. Apples, kept thus, have been found quite sound, fair, and juicy, in July.

Sick Head John .- To remove an attack of the sick head ache, a correspondent in one of the monthly journals, recommends the patient to take a spoontal of ginger mexed with a lump of sugar, in a tumbler three parts sail or athier, with chill off; to sit for quarter of an hour, with his feet in water agreembly warm and to apply a napkin wrung out with cold water to the temples or forehead, whichever appears the most affected.
