


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#### General Notices.

Dorset Sunday School (168 Adelaide Street The Weekly Prayer Meeting is held on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, in the Lecture-room. Ordinary meetings of the Kirk Session are held on the first Saturday in each month.

The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the first Sunday in each month.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed on the last Sunday in January, May and October.

Meetings of the Board of Managers are held quarterly on the first Monday in the months of January, April, July and October, at 7.30 p.m.

Meetings of the Women's Association are held fortnightly.

Collectors appointed by the Women's Association call monthly for contributions to the Missions of the Church, and distribute copies of the Presbyterian Record to all contributors.

The Penny Savings Bank, under the management of the Young Men's Association, is open every Saturday from 7 to 9 p.m., at 168 Adelaide St., West. Deposits from 2 cents upwards.

Meetings of the Young People's Association are held fortnightly.

Pew rents are payable to the Treasurer, quarterly in advance, at the Managers' Room, on the 21st day of March, June, September and December. Sittings not paid for within six weeks thereafter may be re-let by the Managers.

The Managers will be in their Room on the first Monday in each month from 7.30 to 9 p.m., to attend to applications for sittings. Those who give up their sittings should notify the Managers, as sittings cannot be transferred to other parties except by the Managers.

Packages of envelopes will be furnished, on application to the Managers, to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is the following: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's name on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays.

The Minister will, as a rule, be found at home between one and two o'clock p.m., except on Mondays and Fridays. He will also make a point of being at home on Friday afternoon and evening, after 4 o'clock; and will be glad if members of the Congregation, and especially those who are comparative strangers, will avail themselves of the opportunity of coming to the Manse.

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#### Missions and Schemes of the Church.

Contributions for the following objects are collected monthly by the Women's Association:

1. Home Missions.—In the Western Section of the Church, including Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia, there were, according to the last annual report, 422 Mission Stations, and 116 Supplemented Congregations, receiving grants from the fund. To meet the liabilities of the current year about \$45,000 will be required.

2. FOREIGN MISSIONS.—The Western Section of the Church provides for the support of Missions in three fields. (1) Among the Indians in the North-West; (2) In Formosa, where Dr. Mackay is at the head of the work; and (3) In Central India. Between \$30,000 and \$40,000 is needed for this year.

3. French Evangelization.—Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed, under the direction of he Assembly's Board, in spreading a pure gospel among the French-Canadians. The estimated amount required for the current year is \$35,000, viz.: \$27,500 for the general work, and \$7,500 for the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools.

4. Colleges.—There is a common fund for the support of Knox, Queen's and Montreal Theological Colleges. The amount required this year is \$19,000. This Congregation is responsible for two scholarships, one of \$60 and the other of \$50, to be competed for by students of Queen's University who have the ministry in view. A grant is also made for the support of Manitoba College.

5. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, for pro-

viding annuities for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church.

6. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

7. Assembly Fund, to defray expenses connected with the proceedings of the General Assembly, and the expenses of committees that have no other funds.

8. "St. Mark's" Lot.—A portion of the purchase money of the lot on which St. Mark's Mission School stands is still due.

## Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

The Fifty-second Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was duly organized, in accordance with the Constitution, on Wednesday evening, the 17th of January, 1883, in the Lecture Room of the Church.

The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell was appointed Chairman and Mr. Wm. Mitchell Secretary of the meeting.

The minutes of last Annual Meeting of the Congregation, as printed in the Annual Report, were held as read and sustained.

It was moved by Mr. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Pearson, and agreed, "That owing to the lamented death of Mr. James Michie, a member of the Board of Managers of this Church during the past twenty-two years, this meeting do now adjourn, and shall stand adjourned until Wednesday evening, the 31st inst., at 8 o'clock, then to meet for the transaction of such business connected with the Congregation as may be brought before the meeting."

The Adjourned Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the Lecture Room of the Church, on the evening of Wednesday, the 31st January, 1883.

The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell was appointed Chairman and Mr. Wm. Mitchell Secretary of the meeting.

The Chairman constituted the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the meeting held on the 17th January, which were sustained.

The Annual Report of the Board of Managers was read by the Secretary, and the Treasurer-'s Statement was submitted to the meeting.

Moved by Mr. D. McGee, seconded by Mr. W. Price, and agreed, "That the Managers' Report and Financial Statement, submitted to this meeting, be received and adopted."

Moved by Mr. D. McGee, seconded by Dr. Geikie, and agreed, "That Messrs. John Kay, William Mitchell, and Russel Inglis, whose term of office now expires, be re-elected as Managers; and that Dr. Thorburn be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. James Michie."

Mr. Gemmel gave notice that at next Annual Meeting he would move that the Constitution of the Church be so altered as to increase the number of Managers to twelve—five to form a quorum, and four to retire annually.

It was then moved by Mr. James Maclennan, seconded by Dr. Geikie, and agreed, "That the recommendation of the Board of Managers, to erect a fitting memorial within the Church to Mr. James Michie, receive the hearty approval of this meeting; and that the Board of Managers, with the Rev. D. J. Macdonnell and the mover, are hereby appointed to carry the same into effect; all expenses connected therewith to be paid for out of the revenues of this Church."

Moved by Mr. James Maclennan, seconded by Mr. McGee, and agreed, "That the sale of the Humber property, agreed to and recommended by the Managers and the Trustees of the property, be approved."

Reports of St. Andrew's, St. Mark's, and Dorset Sunday and Evening Schools, were submitted by the Superintendents, whereupon it was

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wills, seconded by Mr. A. W. Croil, "That a vote of thanks be tendered to the Ushers, for their efficient services; and that Messrs. John Bowman, Jas. Paterson, John F. Muir, W. B. Rogers, P. McIntyre, George S. Michie, W. S. Frost and W. McC. Miller be appointed to assist the Managers for the current year." Carried.

On motion of Mr. J. M. Rogerson, seconded by Mr. W. Price, the Chairman and Secretary were appointed a committee to arrange, revise and get printed the reports now submitted, together with such other matter as they may deem advisable.

## Fifty-Second Aunual Report of the Board of Managers.

The Board of Managers herewith respectfully submit a detailed Statement, showing the Receipts and Disbursements of the ordinary revenue for the year 1882.

It will be observed that the receipts from Sunday collections amount to \$7,537.06, being an average of \$143.00 for each of the fifty-three Sundays of the year. Of this sum, \$5,243.88 was received through the envelope

system, and \$2,293.18 by open collection. In comparision with the revenue from the same source for the year 1881, there is an average diminution of \$21 per Sunday. This diminution occurs almost exclusively in the amount received by envelopes.

The revenue received from Pew Rents amount's to \$4,513.00, and there remained past due Pew Rents unpaid amounting to about \$800. These items are almost identical with those reported on this account in the year 1881.

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The Managers having received frequent enquiries from parties desirous of purchasing the property belonging to the Congregation at the river Humber, it was deemed advisable, in the interests of the Congregation, to advertise this property for sale, and invite tenders. This having been done, several tenders were received in response. The highest and in all respects the most favorable tender received was one of \$21,000 for the whole property as it stands. After prolonged and very full consideration, the Managers resolved to recommend the acceptance of this tender by the Congregation, as they now hereby dothe terms of payment being one-fourth cash, the balance within six years, secured by mortgage on the property, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable half-yearly. The sale of this property on these terms would at once relieve the interest account of the Congregation to the extent of \$1,260 annually, and would when paid reduce the loan from the Standard Life Insurance Company to \$19,000.

On no former occasion have the managers met the congregation under circumstances so sad as the present. Mr. Michie, who has so unexpectedly been removed by death, was elected a member of the Board of Managers in July, 1861, and up to the time of his death continued an active member of the Board. In this capacity, and in innumerable other ways, Mr. Michie has, during the past quarter of a century, rendered invaluable services to the congregation; and the managers believe that there exists a general desire that Mr. Michie's memory should be perpetuated by the erection of some fitting memorial within the Church which he loved so well and for which

he did so much. They therefore recommend that imme diate steps be taken for the carrying out of this object.

Whilst in the full vigour of manhood, and in the midst of an active and useful life, it is desired by the members of the Board of Managers, with whom he was associated, to place on record their testimony to his personal worth and to the high esteem in which he was held, not only by themselves, but by the whole congregation of which he was an active member and office-bearer during the past twenty-five years.

By his unobtrusive Christian bearing, his wise counsel, and his large-hearted liberality, as well as by the invaluable services he rendered to the congregation as Manager, as member of the Choir, and as Chairman and Treasurer of the Building Committee of this Church, Mr. MICHIE had endeared himself to every member of the Congregation, and by his removal it is felt that a blank has been left which will not be easily filled.

The number of families has increased by 9, and the number of single persons has decreased by 14. The number of Communicants is smaller than last year, though the decrease is not so great as would appear, inasmuch as the number of Communicants in January, 1882, was by mistake reported as being 640 instead of 624. The decrease is chiefly accounted for by the writing off from the roll of the large number of 30 names of persons who, though they have not asked for certificates, are known to have removed from the bounds of the congregation, or to have ceased to attend the Church. It is satisfactory to note in this connection, that at the Communion Service recently observed, 462 Communicants were present, the largest number yet recorded in the history of the Congregation.

The Session call attention to the reports of the three Sunday Schools, under the superintendence of Messrs. Cassels, Joss, and Strachan, respectively; and they commend this work anew to the liberal support and personal interest of members of the Congregation. The plan adopted, at the beginning of last year, for raising the money necessary for the efficient carrying on of the Schools, has proved tolerably successful, \$284 having been realized from the quarterly collections, as against

Contributions to the Session Fund, on the three Communion Sundays, together with some donations and one-half of the collection on Thanksgiving Day, amounted to \$360.96, as compared with \$396.80 in the previous year.

The Women's Association have rendered important service to the Session, by aiding in administering the fund for the relief of the poor; by calling upon members of the Congregation for their monthly contributions to the Missions and Schemes of the Church; and by visiting strangers or other persons whom the Minister has from time to time asked them to look after.

The Church census, which was undertaken in the course of last year, under the management of the Ministerial Association, resulted, so far as the Presbyterian Church was concerned, in the finding out of between 500 and 600 persons calling themselves Presbyterians, but not connected with any particular congregation. About 60 of those thus reported have been assigned to St. Andrew's Church to be visited. This work has been divided between members of Session and the Visiting Committee of the Women's Association, and it is hoped that good results will be secured.

The Session are glad to know of the successful continuance of the good work of the Young Men's Association in connection with the Savings Bank and Night School; and they trust that valuable results will flow from the organization of the Young People's Association, which has made a vigorous beginning. It is satisfactory to note an increase in the amount contributed for the Missions and Schemes of the Church. The amount raised by monthly contributions is \$1,774. Two special collections for Home Missions realized \$126, making a total of \$1,900 from the Congregation, which has been appropriated by the Session as set forth below. The following amounts have also been contributed to various missionary and benevolent objects: By the Women's Association, \$427.75; by the Young Men's Association, \$225.45; by the Young People's Association, \$10; by the St. Andrew's Sunday School, \$224.13.

In addition to the amount thus raised, contributions of members of the Congregation to the Endowment Fundof Queen's College amounted to \$441; to the Endowment Fund of Knox College, \$335; and to the North-West Church and Manse Building Fund, \$1,150—making a total for extra-congregational purposes (missionary, benevolent, and educational) of \$4,748.33, as compared with \$2,911.57 in 1881.

The reports of the work done are cheering, though it remains true that the most important elements of the spiritual life and work of a congregation cannot be set down in figures. We trust that there is real growth in grace on the part of those who meet from week to week in this Church for worship. The prolonged absence of the Minister on account of illness was not suffered, through God's goodness, to interfere with the welfare of the Congregation, thanks to the kindness of brethren in the ministry, and to the hearty good-will of the people, whose sympathy the Minister desires personally to acknowledge. Thanks are especially given to Dr. Jenkins and Mr. Milligan, for their valued services.

We begin the new year under the shadow of a great sorrow. The Session have endeavored in the following resolution, passed at a recent meeting, to express their sense of the loss which we have sustained:

"The Session resolved to record an expression of their deep sorrow at the death of Mr. James Michie, whom God has been pleased to call away from his friends on earth to His own immediate presence.

It is no ordinary loss which this Congregation; in com-

mon with the Church at large, and the whole community, has sustained. By the simplicity, geniality, and unselfishness of his Christian character, Mr. MICHIE attracted all who knew him, so that there is a sense of personal loss even on the part of those who were less intimately acquainted with him. In the service of the Congregation and of the whole Church he grudged neither time nor money, giving his generous gifts and his painstaking labour without stint. Ever ready to help the poor and struggling, a kindly and wise counsellor of young men the friend of every good cause, Mr. MICHIE was esteemed by men of every class. His death is mourned by rich and poor together, and not for many years has this community been so profoundly moved by the death of any private citizen.

The Session record their sympathy with the bereaved relatives, by whom he was so much loved and so worthy to be loved, and commend them to "the God of all comfort, who comforteth us in all our tribulation."

I beg to submit the following report for the year ending 31st December, 1882:

The roll of the School shows 51 boys and 54 girls, making a total of 105 scholars, an increase over last year of 10-the average attendance being 61, the highest attendance for any one Sunday 105; the lowest attendance for any one Sunday 42.

The Children's Collections for the year amounted to \$37.57, an increase over last year of \$3.93; and in addition to this we raised \$22.02 by entertainments, making a total of \$59.59.

At a social meeting, held in the beginning of the year, the children and parents partook of tea and cake, followed by addresses by the Rev. Mr. Macdonnell and others, which were enjoyed by all present. This was followed by other entertainments during the year, of a

musical and literary character, at which the St. Andrew's Young People's Association and also members of the Choir rendered valuable assistance, which we gratefully acknowledge.

The Library is still under the very efficient management of Mr. Alex. Hay. We have added to our list 154 new books, at a cost of \$48, making it very complete for the present, and a source of profit to the scholars.

The children are supplied with copies of the British Workman, Children's Friend, and Child's Paper, and also the Westminster Lesson Leaf. This year the teachers have been supplied with copies of the Westminster Teacher.

We would be glad to have a visit from any members of the Church any Sunday afternoon. Our School meets from 3 to 4 o'clock.

In looking over our work for the year, we are encouraged to go forward in the work of sowing the good seed in the hearts of the young, knowing that God will give the increase in His own good time.

It is with regret we have to mention the loss of Mrs. John Paul, on account of her removal to Kingston. She was a faithful worker in the School for over five years, and we miss her presence on account of her worth as a teacher and friend.

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#### Dorset Night School Report.

In presenting our report for the past year, we are glad to be able to state that progress has been made. The boys themselves are taking a greater interest in the School, for they have found out that it is a benefit to them; and they show their increased interest by coming more regularly, behaving more orderly, and by bringing other boys to the School. Some of the older boys have improved so much that we have no trouble in getting them to take charge of the younger boys in the occasional absence of teachers. But this is only occasionally, as the teachers have also shown an increased interest in the work, for they see the extent of it, and regardless of the weather or the long walk, they are seldom absent from their classes. We closed the School on the 27th April, (a month later than the year before), and commenced work in the fall a month earlier. This season we have extended our work a little, the School being now open three nights in the week, instead of two as last winter. And this has not hurt the average attendance, for during the year it has been 41, which is 25 per cent. over last year. Our Library is open every Saturday night for the larger boys, and many of them take advantage of it; but more good story books would be acceptable. We are trying to impress the boys with the necessity of saving their money, and a good many have opened accounts in the Penny Savings Bank.

## Report of Young Men's Association.

Sec .- Treas. Dorcas Committee.

The number of members attending the regular meetings of this Association had fallen off to such an extent that it was deemed best, in the early part of the year, to discontinue the monthly meetings and the literary exercises connected therewith, leaving that part of our work to be carried on by the Young People's Association, which has been most successfully done. We have confined ourselves chiefly to work in connection with the Savings Bank and the Night School.

The roll now numbers thirty-five. Much to our regret, the business engagements of Mr. J. M. Matthew have obliged him to leave this city. Since the institution of the Bank he has given constant and untiring attention to its interests.

The different branches of our work show an encouraging increase in prosperity. The Dorset Night School, as will be seen by the Superintendent's report, has grown in usefulness, and additions have been made to the properties calculated to attract a still larger number of boys. The Treasurer's report of the Penny Savings Bank, although showing no large increase over last year's business, gives ample proof of the usefulness of that institution. As all Savings Banks in connection with other churches in the city have been closed during the past year, it is confidently expected "St. Andrew's" will have a large increase during the year.

Our financial state, as shown by the Treasurer's report appended hereto, is satisfactory. Our revenue was increased to such an extent, by liberal donations from numerous well-wishers, and by contributions from the Young People's Association, the Women's Association, and St. Andrew's Sunday School, that we have been enabled to entirely relieve the Kirk Session of the annual grant of \$120 to the Dorset School.
