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NOTES to the READER,

1st. THE Calculation of this Almanac are made to solar or apparent Time, to which, for the mean or Clock time, apply the equation given in the sixth Column, adding when the Sun is slow, and subtracting when fast.

2d. The Sun's declination is fitted to the Meridian of *Halifax* for every noon of the present Year, in order to save the accurate American Mariner, the trouble of proportioning the declination taken from the *London Tables*, to his meridian, in voyages near our coast, &c.

3d. The rising, setting, or Southing of a Star, may be carried several days backward by adding, or forward by subtracting, 4m per day; for instance, on the 15th of the first month (*January*) *Sirius* is South at 47m. past 10. adding 12 minutes for 3 days sooner, we have 10h. 59m. for the Southing on the 12th, and deducting 8 minutes for 2 later, leave 10h. 39m. for that of the 17th of the same month, &c.

4th. The Time of *Alioth's* passage over the meridian, or when a plumb-line apparently cuts both the Pole Star and *Alioth*, is given for the first six months, above, and the last six, below, the Pole to five days in each month and may be readily known for any day by the preceding Note. These two Stars will be visible coincident with a level east and west line at 5h. 59m. before or after *Alioth* passes the meridian, by which we may regulate Time-Pieces to a minute, or tell the time without them. The Pole Star is on the meridian five minutes later than *Alioth*, when a true meridian line may be drawn by it, and the magnetic variation be thereby determined.

ALIOTH is the first Star in the Tail of the Great Bear, viz. that next the square; or, it is the third Star of the seven, commonly called the Waggon or Plough, counting toward those two of them, denominated the Pointers.

AGRICULTURE.

Observation on the best Method of
 restoring worn out Fields, without
 Manure.

THE first things which is necessary
 to be done, with worn out lands is,
 immediately after harvest, (it is not
 then too late) to turn them up with
 the plough as deep as possible—In
 order to do this effectually, it will
 be sometimes needful for a second
 plough to follow the same furrow (this
 is called trench-ploughing) which will
 throw the mould over, and bury the
 stubble and weeds: There will then
 be a new soil uppermost, which being
 fresh to the air, will receive much
 greater and more lasting benefit from
 the sun, the snow and frost, as it will

attract a greater quantity of the nutrition which these afford. The stubble and weeds being, by this method of ploughing, buried deep, will much sooner rot than when just covered, and will become a kind of manure. By this deep ploughing, the worn out soil being turned in, the second stratum, or fresh earth, will be uppermost; which having never been exhausted, by being exposed to the air, and frost and snow of winter, is thereby sweetened and cleansed of all its impurities, and becomes a new fresh, and fertiliz'd earth, in the best possible state for vegetation.

Many farmers will probably object to this method, on account of its being attended with a little extra expence; but I wish farmers would consider first, that it will be a great saving to him, if, instead of going on to exhaust one field after another till he has worn out the whole of his land, he by this method recovers it. He will save labor in the spring, and will be ready to sow as soon as the weather will permit.

I last year in November, gave an old worn out field a double ploughing. In the spring, as soon as it was dry enough, I ploughed it across and sowed it, harrowing the ground well. I then sowed 10bbls. of clover seed to the acre, which was harrowed in with a light seed harrow, and after-

wards rolled, which left an even surface for mowing. When the oats were all up, I laid upon it two bushel and a half of Plaster of Paris to an acre. My crop of oats exceeded my most sanguine expectation. It was superior to those of my neighbours upon their fresh land; and my crop of clover had I chosen to have mowed it, would have produced a ^{ton} and a half to the acre this year.—I am fully satisfied that it will amply repay me the full value of the land, by the two succeeding crops: in its former state it did not produce any thing.

H I N T S.

On the Uses to which ASHES may be applied.

ASHES are commonly accounted a manure most suitable for low and moist lands. A cold and sour spot certainly need them more than any other; but I have found them to be good in all sorts of soil.

They are not only a valuable manure, but an excellent antidote to the rapaciousness of worms and Insects. Therefore they are a more proper manure for all those plants that are liable to suffer by worms and insects; such as cabbages, turnips, cucumbers, melons, peas, and other pulse. They should be spread evenly, and not in too great quantities.—Wood ashes are an excellent nourishment for the roots of trees.

A CURIOUS SERMON.

By the Revd. M. Hyberdin, which he made at the request of certain thieves who robbed him on a hill, near Hartleyrow, in Hampshire, in their presence, and at that instant.

I Greatly marvel that any man should dispraise thieving, and think the doers thereof worthy of death, considering it is a thing nigh unto virtue, being used in all countries, the which thing I cannot compendiously shew unto you at so short a warning, and on so sharp an occasion. Fartitude and stoutness of courage, and also boldness of mind, is comendable of some men to be a virtue; which being granted, who is there then that will not judge thieves to be virtuous? for they are of all men the most stout and hardy, and most void of fear; for thieving is a thing usual among all men; for not only you that are here at present, but also many others, in divers places, both men, women, and children, rich and poor, are daily of the faculty, as the hangman of Newgate can testify.

But most all I marvel that men can dispraise you thieves, whereas in many

EXTRAORDINARY CHARACTER.

MAFFEUS who wrote the history of the Indies which has always been Model of veracity as well as elegant composition, mentions a Native of Bengal, named Nunis de Cugna, who died in 1566, at the Age of 370. He was a man of great simplicity, and quite illiterate, but of so extensive a memory, that he was a kind of living chronicle, relating distinctly, and exactly, what happened within his knowledge in the compass of his life, together with all the circumstances attending it. He had four new sets of teeth, and the colour of his hair and beard had been very frequently changed from black to grey and from grey to black; He asserted that in the course of his life he had seven hundred wives, some of whom died, and the others he put away. The first century of his life, he passed in idolatry, from which he was converted to Mahometanism which he continued to profess till his death.

N. B. HIGH Water at *Windsor*, is when the tide begins to Ebb at *Halifax*, it begins to flow at *Windsor*, and at the Full and Change of the Moon, it is High Water at *Windsor* at Noon, and at the Quarters of the Moon it is High Water at Six o'Clock.
