

ONDON, Nov. 19.—Dowager Queen Alexandra, mother of Le King George, is critically ill from a heart attack, it is officially announced. The Queen, whose 81st birthday falls on December 1, suffered the attack this morning. A statement issued from her home, Sandringham Castle, this afternoon, reads:

"Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, who for some time past has been failing in health, suffered a severe heart attack this morning. Her Majesty's condition is critical.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—London has lost 100,000 children since 1914, according to public school attendance figures for last April. There were 797,149 children then on the school's registers, 3,982 fewer than in 1924 and 96,699 than in 1914.

The decrease is attributed almost entirely to the decline in birth rate, but a contributing factor is the removal of families to new settlements outside the metropolitan area with little counter balancing inflow.



Drug is One of Most Potent and Dangerous in India

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—Twenty acres, growing wild in an old dump alongside the Sunnystac Yards in Long Island City, was found to be a variety of hashish, one of the most potent and dangerous drugs of India. The discovery was made by Commissioner of Corrections Frederick A. Wallis, and resulted from the arrest as week ago of Andres Huerta, a young Mexican sallor, who was sentenced to an indeterminate term in the penitentiary for having satchel full of the weed in his possession.

Huerta, facing a twe-years' term in prison, guided Commissioner Wallis to the spot near the rallroad yards. Mr. Wallis was amazed to see a drug field as large as six city blocks, just across the river from the heart of Manhattan. He was amazed, too, when Huerta told of the way in which he had found the weeds there. The Mexican had been looking for employment in one of the factories in the neighborhood. As he walked across the swamps near the tracks he noticed a weed similar to the drug which is imported from the East and grown in Western Mexico and in the Southwestern United States. Not thinking it was against the law, he took some to his room in the Seamen's Church Institute and smoked it.

The above was the first resolution adopted by the great conference this afternoon, and it was greeted with more vigorous applause than any others of those adopted.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 18—Formation of a Dominion Board of Trade, recognition and endorsement of the Maritime case, creation of a non-political advisory board on colonization and agricultural development, etc., were endorsed in resolutions formulated today at the final session of the first Dominion-wide economic conference.

Action, which will follow, will place in the concrete form the results of the three-day deliberations of the conference which was participated in by individuals, and leaders from every section of

TELLS APPRECIATION

The resolution adopted, besides the Maritimes and the Dominion Board of Trade, related to scientific research, coal, Governmentateonomy, immigration and Imperial trade. One relating to the Hudson Bay Railway and some others were referred to the Dominion Board of Trade.

"B—The official recognition of the patent fact that any attempt to exclude European agricultural colonists physically fit and of satisfactory mental and moral endowment purely on racial grounds must inevitably delay indefinitely the solution of our present problem for the sufficient reason that desirable agricultural settlers of northernorigin are not available in sufficient volume to make any adequate impression on Canada's population resolution.

Mr. Beatty referred back to the earlier part of his speech in which he had outlined the history of the Canadian Pacific during the past 40 years and something of the story of the great men whose vision and courage had carried it to a successful issue.

Secretary of Canadian Association Writes to Trojans' Manager

IN a letter received yesterday by Manager Golding of the Trojans A. C. from the secretary-treasurer of the Dominion Basketball Association, J. P. Page, Edmonton, Alta., says that the question of rules for girls' leagues will come up again for vote this year, the latter part of December. This matter is now being considered by local clubs and Secretary's Page's letter is, therefore, timely and interesting. He

therefore, timely and interesting. He says:

"My personal opinion is that until such time as provincial organizations are actually formed in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and notification of such organization by myself that you are the logical representative of the Dominion body and that you are entitled to act personally or appoint someone else to act for your section. I feel that your affiliation with the Dominion body last season entitles you to this consideration.

"As to the question of what rules should be used by girls, I am expressing my own opinion in this letter and it must not be interpreted as official, since, as I have already stated, the question of rules must be voted on by the members of the council. We have found in Edmonton that girls' rules are probably best-suited for immature girls as we find them in the public and perhaps the high schools. After leaving high school, however, only those girls who are keenly interested in the game and physically fit to stand up against 40 minutes of strenuous in the game and physically fit to stand up against 40 minutes of strenuous play, stay with it. For these girls, men's rules are certainly not objectionable and possess several advantages. He is the most spectacular player ever to don the cleated shoes. Grange, however, can be ranked as the greatest of all in one angle of the grid game. He is without a doubt the greatest open field runner that ever lived. He has one habit, peculiar alone to Grange, which has been the prime factor in earning him this honor. That is his ability to sidestep an opposing player. All great ball runners have been adepts at stiff-arming, have been wizards in mapping out their fields and outguessing the opposition. Necessarily they have all been crafty runners, in side stepping flying tackles and wriggling from the arms of would be tacklers. But Grange has the uncanny ability to rush full tilt at the would-be tackler, stop dead in a single stride and then dash off full speed at a sharp angle, much as a rubber ball bounces. The tackler, set to halt Grange according to orthodox methods of running and tackling, is left helpiess, sprawling grotesquely on the sod. Reams can be written, of course, about his specific achievements on the gridiron which would only prove the point accepted—that he is a wonderful player in every way. But in passing it must be said of Grange also that he has been a credit to the game. He has preached, by his modesty, cleanliness of thought and action through three hectic years of football the value of clean living and clean sportsmanship. Which makes him a greater athlete. 




