J. E. DALRYMPLE PAYS VISIT TO COURTENAY BAY

Vice-President Says Facilities to be Used Fully

THE POTATO SHED

Railway Expects to Keep It Occupied for Rest of Season

AN INCREASE in the amount of traffic brought to Saint John by the Canadian National Railway this winter as compared with last year was forecast this morning by J. E. Dalrymple, of Montreal, vice-president in charge of traffic, who is in the city on official business.

Speaking of traffic through the port this winter Mr. Dalrymple said: "We expect to use our present facilities here to the fullest extent and that will mean, I am sure, more business than passed over the same wharves last year."

MORE CARGO; MORE GRAIN

We expect to have more general cargo and also more grain than we had a year ago. We have taken over the frost proof potato warehouse and we expect to keep that fully occupied through the winter of the shipping season.

In connection with the Courtenay Bay matter Mr. Dalrymple said that before work was begun on the terminal facilities it was felt wise for the public works engineers and representatives of the railway and C. G. M. M. to confer and agree on the best possible layout and it was arranged to have this conference right on the ground.

POSITION OF DOMINIONS IS IN FOREGROUND

Lack of Consultation Is Called Serious Error

SMUTS IS QUOTED

Foreign Secretary Declares Britain Unable to Confer Before Pact Debated

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The House of Commons having last night by a vote of 375 to 13 given its sanction to the security pact formulated at Locarno with the purpose of bringing peace to Europe, the expectation now is that the German Reichstag shortly will follow suit and ratify it.

The adoption of the measure by the lower house of parliament, partook somewhat of the nature of an ovation for Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary, to whose efforts the success of the Locarno conference, was largely due.

DOMINIONS' POSITION

The position of the Dominions, with regard to the treaties formed a large part of the parliamentary debate last evening. Apart from a few discussions on the subject of Russia, the debate last night centred almost entirely on Imperial relations. Ramsay MacDonald said that he was unable to conceive a more arbitrary system of conduct than the Imperial foreign policy, that the method enshrined in the Locarno pact.

CHAMBERLAIN REPLIES

Mr. Chamberlain, in reply, said it was due to the circumstances of the various governments of the Empire that the British government was unable to meet them before the consultations at Locarno began, but Britain was faced with a situation not of the Empire that He declared that the British government had sought a conference with the Dominions before announcing its policy in respect to the Geneva protocol, and merely to decide what was to be done with the protocol about which all the governments agreed, but to decide an alternative policy. Britain has not yet been able to meet all the governments of the Empire, and in the meantime she is unable to do anything.

HASHISH FIELD FOUND IN N.Y.

Mexican Prisoner Revelation of Patch May Win His Liberty

Drug is One of Most Potent and Dangerous in India

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Twenty acres, growing wild in an old dump alongside the Sunnyside Yards in Long Island City, was found to be a variety of hashish, one of the most potent and dangerous drugs of India in which the discovery was made by Commissioner of Corrections Frederick A. Wallis, and resulted from the arrest a week ago of Andres Huerta, a young Mexican sailor, who was sentenced to an indeterminate term in the penitentiary for having satchel full of the weed in his possession.

NOT SURPRISED.

Special Deputy Police Commissioner Carleton Simon, in charge of the Narcotic Squad, was interested, but not greatly surprised to learn of the Long Island City drug field. The American variety of the drug, cannabis americana, is not uncommon in this part of the country, and grows from hemp seed. Dr. Simon said there is a large hemp factory near the Sunnyside Yards, which would seem to explain such a large tract of the hashish, he explained, only a few days ago Dr. Simon picked a stalk in Bowling Green.

FRANCE BARS CLAIM IN POLAR REGIONS

Won't Seek to Retain Any Lands Discovered by Expedition

PARIS, Nov. 19.—Polar lands which may be discovered by the proposed French expedition to cross the top of the world from Europe to the United States by motor-aided and airplane will remain the prize of any power that care to claim it, for France will not call it her own, it was said at the Ministry of Education Wednesday. The French navy will supply the planes, the crew and the fuel for the polar expedition, and the Ministry of Education will advance the necessary funds, but the organizers explain that the mission will be purely scientific.

FRANCE RESOLVES TO SEE IT THROUGH

Will Clear Syria of Revolt; Adopts Pacification Policy

PARIS, Nov. 18.—France has determined to "see it through" in Syria and clear the country of rebellion by one means or another as the situation may permit. For the time being, a policy of political rather than military pacification is being followed under direction of Colonel Andrea, who has been moving among the minor tribes endeavoring to win them to peace. Three thousand rebels, as a result of his efforts, have submitted to the French, surrendered their rifles and paid fines commensurate with the extent of their rebellious activities, the Foreign Office announced Wednesday. Negotiations with minor tribal chiefs are continuing. The French in each case offering to assess a fine against the tribe in proportion to its activities. Sultan Alastrasse, the outstanding figure among the Syrian patriots, has not yet been approached nor is it likely that he would come into the French camp on such terms as are offered.

BANDIT IMPLICATES THEATRE ENGINEER

Turns King's Evidence and Brands Other Master Mind at Montreal

Canadian Press Despatch.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—Confessing that he held up the cashier of the St. Denis Theatre last Sunday night and stole \$882 at the point of an unloaded revolver, John Boyd, New York consulting engineer and inventor, today pleaded guilty to the formal charge, turned King's evidence, and branded A. Finlayson, the theatre engineer, as the master mind of the project. Boyd was remanded until Nov. 24

for sentence. Finlayson was committed for voluntary statement on the same day, bail of \$5,000 being set. Boyd swore that while inspecting boilers in the theatre, Finlayson suggested that they hold up the cashier of the house. Finlayson made the plans for Boyd's getaway, but in his excitement, the latter took the wrong bank headed by J. T. Morgan and Company.
