Washington, Dec. 4—Between 800,000 and 350,000 deaths from influence and pneumonia have occurred among the civilian population of the United States since Sept. 15, according to estimates today of the public health service. Article XXVI. of the armistice provided that all German merchant ships found at sea after the signing of the armisitee would be liable to capture and that the Allied blockade would remain in force.

Article XXXIII. declared that no German merchant shipping should be

sferred to neutrals after the signing of the armistica.






"Turn To The Right," Fils The Imperial and Wins Instant Favor-Many Laughs and a Few Tears in This Delightful Pro-


