MAY FUTURES DROP 8 1-2 IN FIVE MINUTES

Rush to Liquidate and Many Traders Are Unable to Get Out.

WINNIPEG, Man. Feb. 6—With an unexpected crash, wheat prices went skidding today for the third break within two weeks, when the May future dropped to \$1.95½ cents, a net loss of 8½ cents from the high scored earlier in the session.

The spectacular decline came with sudden force, sweeping prices downward to these new levels within a period of five minutes. Liquidations were of an almost unprecedented volume, and traders were confronted with the same situation which characterized former recessions—they were unable to get out. Speculators saw further inroads made into profits piled up during the sensational rise which carried May wheat to \$2.20.

The only way in which it seems practicable to ascertain whether the claims and assertions made by both parties are correct or incorrect and what bearing they have on the dispute appears to be by means of a thorough fact-finding or truth-finding enquiry conducted by a competent authority lawfully constituted and clothed with adequate power to make such an enquiry and to discover the bearing which such facts and the truth have upon the present dispute.

"When the results of such an enquiry, together with such recommendations as that authority might see fit to make in connection therewith have been made known, the two parties to the dispute could then proceed to negotiate an agreement with the light of truth shining on the whole question. It might be confidently expected that an agreement would be reached, that it would be fair and that it would be satisfactory to both parties.

Finds Interest Here Keener in Russian Affairs Than Labor Government.

Incidents of the Russian revolution rather than the story of British Labor Government and its accomplishments were of interest to the Canadian people, Mrs. Philip Snowden said last evening in her address in Pythian Castle here. Coming to Canada with the object of bringing about a closer understanding between the Dominion and Mother Country, she said she was surprised at this greater interest in Russian affairs. She also declared that the time would come when a Labor Government would be permanent in England. She gave a graphic description of her visit to Russia when Communism was at its height and of the forced demonstration of welcome arranged for the British delegation.

Warmly Welcomed.

Bolshevism, Mrs. Snowden described as Communism plus militarism. Communism was the abolition of all private property and it was a creed for the saints in her opinion. It was certainly not a creed for which the world was ready at the present time. Of the 120,000,000 people in Russia the Communists numbered only 600,000 and of these only 122,000 were sufficiently tried and tested to be given responsible positions.

reiently tried and tested to be given responsible positions.

As to how the Bolsheviks came to power Mrs. Snowden held that war had given them their opportunity but they were the reaction of many years of Czarist oppression and as to why they had held on so long she believed that it was because of the attempted interference of other nations in the first instance and because as the need has arisen they have changed their policies. Since the withdrawal of foreign armies the peasants are no longer frightened of the foreign menace. They own their land and after paying a tax to the government have the right to sell what they produce. Private trading is no longer forbidden and there has been a great receding from Communism. Russia is now begging capital to come to her aid and even inviting government loans.

In vindication of her husband Mrs. Snowden said that the Chancellor of the Exchequer of the Labor Government had never intended to lend one cent of money except on guarantees that the money and interest would be paid.

Speaks of Russians.

Then Mrs. Snowden spoke of the actual characteristics of the Russians and the tremendous contribution they could make to science and the arts. She would like to see them admitted to the League of Nations and she closed an address which had been listened to with rapt attention by an eloquent plea for unselfish ideals and goodwill amongst nations to build up a new social order of brotherhood in which every child should have the opportunity to develop all of its God-

given capacities.

Mr. Myles in moving the vote of thanks explained that the Canadian Clubs had selected Russia as the subject for the address because the Clubs were non-political and had feared to introduce subjects of politics which an address on the Labor Government of Great Britain might induce.

Fight on Turkish Pact Getting to U. S. Senate Floors.

VARYING VIEWS ON IT ARE HEARD

President Coolidge and State Department Are Pressing For Ratification.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6—Flanked by the supporting legions of business on one side and the Christian army of foreign missionaries on the other, advocates of the Turco-American or Lausanine treaty are preparing to carry their fight to the Senate floor and force ratification within the month intervening before Congress adjourns.

With President Coolidge and the State Department pressing for ratification, Chairman William E. Borah of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee giving nominal support, the treaty's chief enemy is time. Important appropriation bills and foreign matters such as the World Court may, however, prevent consideration of the treaty at this session, its advocates admit.

Contest Is Assured.

Though the treaty, when it comes up, cannot be ratified without a fight, it is believed that its antagonists have lost rather than gained support in the Senate. These opponents charge that the treaty abandons extra territorial rights of United States citizens and ignores our responsibility for the safety of American missionaries and Turkish minority races. Including the Arme-

American missionary and business interests cannot acquire new land until the treaty is put into effect. against the treaty is that it was written in the interests of American "concession hunters," and that humanitaries in interests were sacrificed for economic and financial imperialism. Secretary of State Hughes has made the following reply:

"At no stage in the negotiations was the American position determined by the so-called Chester concession. This had been granted before negotiations of our country with Turkey and begun. Our position is a simple one. We maintain the policy of the open door or equality of commercial opportunity; we demand a square deal for our nationals."





Annual Report of Fire Marshal Presented-Sparks Caused Most Fires.

New Brunswick's fire loss for 1924 was \$1,999,963, an increase of \$74,513 over 1923, according to the annual report of Hugh H. McLellan, Provincial Fire Marshal, as presented at the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Fire Prevention Board here yesterday afternoon. The insurance loss for the year is placed at \$1,470,449, as compared with \$1,273,568 for 1923, while the loss not covered by insurance for 1924 shows a decrease from 1928, the former figure being \$529,514 and the latter \$651,882. There were 14 deaths in fires.
