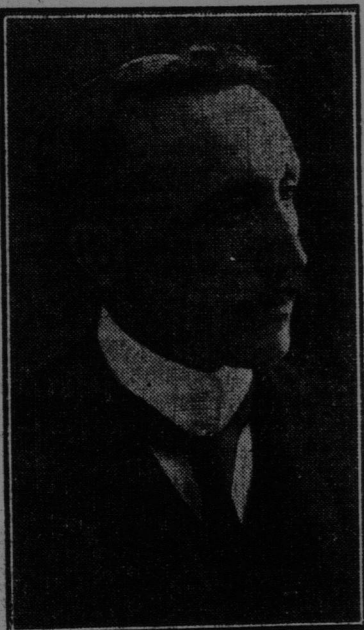

ENDINI GETS OFF WITH TEN YEARS IN THE PENITENTIARY

Jury at Burton Trial Declares the Italian is Guilty of Man-slaughter—Prisoner on Stand Decides He Had Much Provocation for the Stabbing

Burton, N. B., May 12.—John Endini, the Italian, who has been on trial here for killing John McKay, on November last, was tonight found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced by Judge McLeod to ten years in Dorchester penitentiary.

It took the jury only thirty-eight minutes to reach their verdict. Judge McLeod said he occurred in their finding. Endini was the only witness for the defense and at the close of his evidence the counsel heard, the judge's charge was delivered and at 7 o'clock the twelve men filed into the court room and the foreman announced that they had found Endini guilty of manslaughter.

MANY PERILS BESET MEN WHO FOLLOW DIVER'S LIFE

A greenhorn who had never put on a diving suit persuaded the crew of a lighter to let him go below while they were waiting for the regular man to come on duty, and in Motor Boat he gave an account of the experiences likely to accompany a first descent of the sea.

Quickly divesting himself of his coat, hat, shoes and cuffs, but still wearing his collar, tie and watch, the novice donned a heavy sweater, thick socks and a red knit cap, and the process of inserting him into the diving suit began.

Within an inch of the top the gauntlets were lashed to the arm by six turns of the machine, each half turn being drawn as tight as a strong man could pull it. The thickness and strength of the suit prevented pressure on his hands and knees, and back from water pressure was slipped over the new diver's head, great care being taken not to bark his nose during the passage.

The top part of the suit was pulled up smoothly inside the armor, and a broad heavy band that is attached to the suit, with holes in it to correspond with screws or bolts projecting from the lower edge of the armor, was forced up on the outside and the holes slipped over the bolts.

A strong metallic band in sections was slipped over the bolts and the whole fastened airtight by thumb screws firmly set down with a wrench—and the new diver lumbered out of the warm engine room to the open deck.

The lifeline was slipped under his arms and he stepped on about 15 pounds was hooked on his breast and another one on his back, he groaned, for the little bones on top of his shoulders were throbbing with the weight, the whole outfit resting accurately upon them.

The air pump was started, and amid chatting the signals were explained, the helmet twisted on, the familiar pat on the head given (all right to go below signal) when the novice felt as though plugs were being driven through his ears. He guessed it was too much air and signaled on the pipe "one," but as "one" is more air he got it, and opened his mouth to relieve the pressure on the ear drums.

COMMISSIONERS HAD ROUGH TRIP

Members of St. John River Commission Had to Cross Swollen River in Small Boats

Van Buren, Me., May 12.—Practical experience of the dangers of river navigation, a matter germane to their investigation of international logging conditions on the St. John river, was given the members of the committee of Canadian and American lawyers and logging experts when they arrived here today to begin the survey of conditions on the Maine side of the river.

It was with great difficulty, owing to the greatly advanced state of the water, that the commissioners were transported across to the American shore. It had originally been planned to bring the party across in a single boat but this was deemed too hazardous, and three trips were made. The passages across the stream were all made without accident, but each called for a display of all the inherent adaptability to river conditions that the boatmen possessed.

FRESHET SWEEPS A BIG BRIDGE AWAY

Suspension Bridge Between Fort Kent, Maine, and Clair, N. B., Swept Out By Swollen Tides—Loss is \$14,000—Other Damage Done

Van Buren, Me., May 12.—A belated spring freshet swelled the waters of the St. John river today, six inches an hour and tonight the high water mark was still rising, although at a diminishing rate. The principal damage was the carrying away of the suspension bridge across the river between Fort Kent (Me.) and Clair (N. B.).

Two horses were drowned near the former place, and a considerable quantity of wharfage fitted and some minor property immediately bordering the river's banks were drawn in with the increased flow of water. Whether the crest of the bridge would have held before morning was a question tonight, but the experience of rivermen here indicates that the present high stage, with its accompanying perils and damage, will be maintained at least, and possibly increased to a small extent.

S. S. AMELIA STRUCK ON A SUNKEN LEDGE

South Shore Steamer on Voyage From St. John Badly Damaged By Accident—She is Now at Halifax

Halifax, May 12.—(Special)—With her bottom badly damaged and several inches of water in the hold, the steamer Amelia, recently subsidized for service between Halifax and St. John via South Shore ports, arrived in port today from St. John via ports of call after having been ashore on a ledge of Lockport for an hour.

Part of the crew ploughed the steamer towards Lockport about 10 o'clock at night when she ran on the dangerous ledge of Gull Rock Light. The steamer was going eight miles an hour and the shock was terrific, many of the crew being hurled from their bunks.

"NEW BIRTH" OF TURKEY

Heterogeneous Races and How They Are Entering Into the Spirit of the New Era. Secretary James L. Barton, of the American Board of Missions of Boston, speaking recently upon "The new birth of Turkey and America's part in producing it," said in part: "It is impossible to realize the extent of the changes that have taken place in the Turkish empire during the last few months, or to understand the combination of forces that have led up to them. These amount to a veritable revolution, and the Turkish people have been awakened about without clash of arms, and is carried out without attempt at a revolution of not only political but also intellectual and religious. It is a reformation that effects social and moral conditions as much as political ones. The people of Turkey are the farthest removed from every suspicion of homogeneity. Turkey is presently made up of strong and mutually hostile races. The principal nationalities to be reckoned with in any reform measure are the Greeks, the Armenians, the Kurds, the Thibians, the Kurds and the Arabs. There are other races of minor importance and influence, but these named constitute the leading national forces operating in the empire. Each of these nationalities constitutes an integral part of the national problem in government and in reform."

The Royal Gazette, this week contains notice of partnership formed by T. Edwin Robinson, James N. Riley, M. Wellington Cox and J. Donald MacKenzie all of this city, under the name of the Standard Creamery Company. The company will engage in a general creamery business.

H. Price Webber, the veteran actor, well known in St. John, is touring in Eastern Townships, Quebec. His company is playing at Lake Megantic, Bury, Bishop's Crossing, East Angus, Cookshire, Cookville, North Hatley, Richmond, Danville and Sherbrooke. He is being warmly received by his many friends.

A copper boiler was stolen from a house on Lombard street recently by a youth and disposed of to a Jew. The boy walked into the rear of the building and carried the boiler away. The owner, a man named Cohen, notified Detective Killen of his loss, and the detective is tracing the receptacle to the junk buyer, who purchased it.

In the city court this morning a woman who was sued for rental due for months in April, was surprised when she was ordered to pay her former landlady the amount although she had resided in the flat for only five days of the month. She said the landlady instructed her to vacate the apartments summarily, but the landlady claimed that she ordered her to depart on May 1.

**MARINE NEWS**

The Yarmouth, N. S., steamer Usher, bound from Conception Bay for Europe, called at Montserrat on Saturday, cooled and proceeded.

Sabra Navala and Jennie A. Stubbs are among recent arrivals at St. Andrews, N. B., from New York. They are consigned to E. Devereux.

The charter of the steamer Prince George to the Bermuda Steamship Co. will expire on May 15th and will come to rest for an overhauling. It is expected that she will go on the Boston route about June 15th.—Yarmouth Times, May 11.

Tuesday's Yarmouth Herald says:—Government steamer Lansdowne, Capt. Binnett, arrived here on Saturday afternoon from the lightship Anticosti, after supplying her with coal and stores. She has been replacing buoys in position along the coast.

Contractor Reid, of Westport, Campbellton, has had her transferred to the registry of Canada. He was obliged to do this in self defence, as the customs authorities at Ottawa refused to allow him to use an American flag even when his property was engaged. The Phantom is a staunch and powerful little boat and will be used for general trade. She is in command of Capt. Frank Johnson, than whom there is not better master in these waters.

The lightship Lurcher came off the marine railway on Saturday night's tide at Yarmouth N. S., and the other lightships, belonging to George A. Cox, Esq., of Shelburne, took her place in the channel. Two immense anchors for the Lurcher have arrived, and she will probably be placed in position this week.

The British ship Erie, which has been purchased by Boston owners for the River Plate trade, is now on her way to Boston from Liverpool and will immediately load lumber for the River Plate. She is in command of Captain Pickens, formerly master of the Boston barkentine Allawaldie. The British ship Brynildis completed loading 1,000,000 feet of lumber for Buenos Ayres.—Boston Globe.

**WOMEN'S COUNCIL WILL MEET IN TORONTO**

St. John Women Will Attend Gathering of International Council From June 18th to 20th in Ontario Metropolis

—Good Programme Planned

The world-wide interest in the great quinquennial congress of the International Council of Women to be held in Toronto from June 18th until 20th, grows daily as the time approaches for that great meeting of the women of all countries and tongues.

The President, Countess of Aberdeen, the officers and convenors of international standing committees, the presidents and patrons of the National Councils of Canada and the United States, with more delegates from each together with many noted speakers, will during that meeting be entertained by the Toronto local council and be the guests of the National Council of Canada. The foreign visitors, numbering about 150, will receive hearty welcomes in Montreal and Ottawa on their way to Toronto. An incomplete list gives the following figures of delegates: From Great Britain, 65; Germany, 25; Holland, 11; Sweden, 5; Denmark, 4; Tasmania, 4; Victoria, 3; New South Wales, 2; South Australia, 2; Queensland, 1; Belgium, 7; Norway, 3; Austria, 1; Greece, 1; Smyrna, 1.

The congress will be held in nine halls in the University buildings, and may be attended by anyone holding a ticket for the entire congress or for any one day.

The various sections are philanthropy, educational, industrial, health, and physical training. Literary, social and moral reform, laws that concern women and children, and positions for women. There will be morning and evening sessions and six evening meetings.

Many large social functions will also take place of which there will be a reception on June 17th, by the Mayor of Toronto, and Mrs. Oliver, later a reception by Mrs. Sanford of Hamilton, at her residence in that city, at home' by Lady Edgar, president of the Canadian Council at her summer home on Lake Simcoe, and a luncheon by Mrs. T. M. Harris, at the Lambton Golf Club.

The Canadian delegates are Lady Taylor-Hamilton, Mrs. Edw. Edwards, Mrs. McLeod, Mrs. Thomson, St. John, N. B.; Mrs. Boomer, London; Miss Derick, Montreal; Mrs. Torrington, Toronto; Mrs. McEwen and Mrs. Deane, Halifax; with substitutes, Dr. Augusta Stowe Gulley; Dr. Ritchie; Mrs. Asa Gordon; Mrs. (Senator) Frost; Mrs. A. A. Choate; Mrs. Waycott; Miss Fitzgibbon; Miss Mabel Peters and Miss Ritchie.

Mrs. Robert Thomson, formerly president of the National Council of Women and now holding the office of vice president, will be the delegate of the local council at the meeting. There are nine delegates from all over Canada. Miss Mabel Peters, Mrs. David McLellan and Miss Elizabeth Robinson Scovill will also go from here to attend the meeting. Miss Scovill will read a paper before the council on "Pure Food."

Those attending the meeting are to be entertained to a trip to Niagara by the Historical Society of Toronto and at the close of the meeting a trip through western Canada as far as Vancouver has been planned. A very large attendance is looked for as there will be about two hundred women from abroad as well as those attending from the United States and Canada.

On July 1 the National Council of Women will hold their annual meeting in Toronto, when Mrs. McLellan, president of the local council, and a member of the national executive, will attend with five delegates chosen from the local body.

**THE FISH MARKET**

A Few Harbor Shad Offered, but Prices are High—More Expected Next Week.

Harbor shad has now a place in the fish market, although the price is somewhat prohibitive. Small quantities of shad have been caught in the harbor nets and it is expected that the catches will be of large volume next week, otherwise the shad season is likely to prove a failure. Local retailers are demanding 35 to 50 cents for shad.

Lobsters are quite abundant and the retailers here are receiving large sized shipments from St. John and Anticosti county by rail and also from Westport, N. S. However, all fish from the latter port arrives here only once weekly as the town is not connected with a railroad and the steamer Westport which plys between Westport and adjoining ports and St. John makes but a weekly trip each Thursday to St. John. The shipments arrive opportunely however and are appreciated by the dealers in view of the local trade.

Practically all the lobsters consigned to local dealers are alive and are conveyed to the consignees. Most of the lobsters received from provincial sources are conveyed in vehicles and are cooked. The principal points from which they are obtained are Musquash and Chance Harbor. At Musquash and Black River where lobsters were particularly abundant five years ago they are now seldom caught. Lobster prices range according to size, from ten to forty cents each. Shad are selling at from thirty-five to fifty cents each and gasperaux are obtainable at twenty cents per dozen. Haddock and codfish are selling at five cents per pound and Halibut at fifteen cents per pound. Mackerel have yet to visit local waters.

Other strong features were Mexican 75, Pacific 181 1/2, Shawinigan 95 5/8, Rubber 77, Preferred 116 5/8, Converters 43, Textile 68, Preferred 108, Twin City 105 3/8, Power 110, Rio 99 5/8.


