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QUESTION XII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Home Mission and Contingent Fund ?

ANSWER.

The Conference gratefully records that there has been an encouraging increase to the Fund from some of the Circuits, as the result of the Home Mission Meetings, especially in the Halifax, St. John, and P. E. Island Districts; but it deplores the inadequacy of the whole increase for carrying out, to any great extent, the important objects contemplated in its

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formation, and aimed at in its management. It expresses its deep regret that, after the appropriation of the whole amount at its disposal, the brethren on the dependent Circuits and Mission Stations have to bear the loss of *nine thousand dollars* deficiency on the Circuits and Stations occupied by them during the year.

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"The Conference, believing that some action in relation to this Fund is necessary for removing misapprehension of its real nature, which the association of the term "Contingent" may have suggested, hiding, it is feared, from its friends its vital importance to the interests of our Connexion, the prosperity of the cause of God, and the welfare of souls, has adopted the following Resolutions, viz. :---

1. That the Fund known as the "Home Mission and Contingent Fund," and so designated in the printed Minutes, shall no longer exist as one Fund, but be divided into two separate and distinct Funds; one to be named The Home Mission Fund, and the other The Contingent Fund.

2. That the sources of income of the Contingent Fund shall be-(1.) A yearly Subscription to be taken in the classes, in the several Circuits, in the March Quarter. (2.) A Public Collection in all our Churches, to be made in the month of August.

3. That the income of the Home Mission Fund shall consist of -(1,) The Grant from the Committee in England. (2.) The Interest on Monies vested. (3.) A Public Collection to be made at the Home Missionary Meetings, which shall be held in all the principal preaching places in the Circuit. (4.) Such special donations as may be made to it for the special objects contemplated by the Fund.

4. That suitable arrangements for holding the Home Missionary Meetings shall be made at the September Financial District Meetings.

5. The Conference trusts that by this arrangement the Home Mission department may become increasingly popular with our people, and its income greatly augmented by their enlightened and cheerful liberality, and their zealous co-operation in securing its increasing prosperity; and that the Contingent department will also continue to receive its share of their support. 6. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Treasurers of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund, the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., and the Hon. John H. Anderson; and also to the Rev. James Taylor, the Secretary, for the very valuable services rendered by them severally to this department of our Connexional Finance during the year.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

QUESTION XIII.

What does the Conference resolve respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund?

ANSWER. Then I did bandern i

1. The Conference observes with satisfaction that this Fund is supported in every part of our extended work. Nevertheless it appears that the amount of contributions this year is not equal to the sum raised last year; which may readily be accounted for by the depression of trade in some places, and the failure of the fishery in others.

2. The Conference directs the earnest attention of the Superintendents of Circuits to the 5th, 6th, and 7th Rules of this Fund; (which is—

"V. Every Minister shall, at the renewal of the Society Ticket, during the September visitation, fully explain to the members the nature and reasonableness of the claims of this Fund upon the justice and liberality of our Church. He shall then enter in the Class Book the individual annual subscriptions which are to be paid before the ensuing District Meeting.

"VI. Our annual public collection shall be made in our Chapels and other preaching places, in the month of December.

"VII. Applications shall be made to our friends, in each Circuit, for subscriptions and donations to this Fund.") and that they endeavour so to explain and apply these Rules on their respective Circuits, that the yearly income to this indispensable institution of our Church may enable it fully to accomplish its benevolent design.

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3. The Conference presents its best thanks to the respected Treasurers of this Fund, the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., and Mariner Wood, Esq., for their faithful and successful attention to its interests.

4. The thanks of the Conference are hereby presented to the Secretary of the Fund, the Rev. E. Botterell, for his very acceptable and satisfactory services.

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PARSONAGE AID FUND.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the Besolutions of Conference with regard to the Parsonage Aid Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would again call the attention of our Members and Congregations to the importance of securing, on every Circuit, a suitable Parsonage free from debt.

2. The Conference orders that the rules for the formation and Constitution of this Fund, as printed in the Minutes of 1862, continue in force.

3. In order to accomplish the intention of Conference in the formation of this Fund, and to insure greater uniformity in the applications to this Fund, and in the distribution of its grants, the following regulations are adopted, viz :---

1st. In regard to applications for grants in the erection of new Parsonages :

In every case where it is proposed to seek for a grant in aid of a new Parsonage, the parties about to build shall communicate with the Secretary of this Fund, and procure from him a copy of the model plans; and shall also lay before the Committee of this Fund, full particulars in regard to the size, location, tenure, and value of the land upon which it is proposed to build; the plans of the building, details of size, height, materials, and estimated cost; amount of reliable subscriptions in aid of purchase of land and erection of the building, aud also the amount of the anticipated grant. 2nd. In regard to applications for grants in aid of purchase of Land and building :

(1.) In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a Parsonage, it shall be necessary, in order to obtain a grant in aid of such a purchase from the Parsonage Aid Fund, for the parties to communicate with the Secretary of the Fund, and furnish all the required particulars; and until the permission of the Committee of the Fund is given, the purchase of the property is not to be completed.

(2.) That in every case when a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear that with the assistance of the grant, the property shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt.

3rd. In regard to applications for grants to liquidate debt⁸ on Parsonages :

(1.) Applications for grants can only be received from Circuits where there has been a distinct charge upon the Circuit accounts, and a claim upon the Contingent Fund for rent, or interest.

(2.) Satisfactory evidence must be presented to the Committee that with the assistance of the grant sought to be obtained, and the local effort, the debt shall be liquidated, and all charges for rent or interest shall cease.

4th. No grants can be made from this Fund, to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in repairs and alterations to parsonages, or for the purpose of assisting in the the erection of outbuildings in connection with Parsonages for which no grant is obtained.

5th. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meetings, either Financial or Regular, before it can be considered by the Committee.

6th. The Treasurer of this Fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts, until he shall have received satisfactory evidence upon the following points, viz :—

(1.) That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan. (2.) That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available and secured, so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge

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for rent or interest. (3.) A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of mortgage, judgment, widow's thirds, or otherwise.

1. That the Conference deems it of great importance for the welfare of our Connexion that our official organ, the *Provincial Wesleyan*, receive a more liberal patronage than bitherto from the Methodists of the lower Provinces, believing that thereby the work of God would be greatly promoted; while the present much embarrassed state of the office would be greatly relieved by an enlarged and prepaid subscription list, and therefore most earnestly enjoins the hearty co-operation of ministers, and most earnestly, as well as respectfully, solicits that of our people generally, in aiding to bring about so desirable a result.

2 The Conference is gratified to learn that some progress has been made in the collection of former years' arrears in the *Provincial Wesleyan* accounts, but regrets to find that the amount of unpaid subscriptions is still so large, while the liabilities are so heavy and pressing, and therefore urges upon the agents the necessity of all possible effort to collect these, without unnecessary delay.

3. The Conference approves of the action of the Book Steward in tespect to the payment of postage on papers; and though suffering large loss thereby, which in its present financial condition it cannot well afford, it authorizes for another year the offer of pre-payment of postage to be made to all subscribers who pay strictly in advance, in hepe that this generous arrangement may be serviceable in maintaining and extending our list of good subscribers. 1. 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That the Conference is still deeply impressed with the necessity of supporting, and rendering more efficient, our Book Room, as a means of diffusing our religious literature; and grateful that, in a year of considerable commercial depression, our liabilities have not been increased, it encourages the hope that the Book Room will yet relieve itself from all present embarrassment.

MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.

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What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Mount Allison Educational Institutions ?

ANSWER.

I.---THE ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.

1. That the Conference, in reviewing the work of the Mount Allison Academics, regrets that the past year has been one of unprecedented trial and difficulty, chiefly arising from the great and very general depression in business circles, which has prevented the enrollment in its classes of so large a number of pupils as may be reasonably anticipated in future years.

2. That the Conference gratefully acknowledges the favour of Divine Providence, whereby the indefatigable Principal has been enabled to complete the ercetion of the new Academy, whose opening services and subsequent management have evinced the abiding determination of its conductors to impart to all their pupils a careful and christian education; and cherishes the hope that, with increased accommodation, a

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much larger number of students, from the recently improved common schools of our country, and from the families of our people, will be found within its halls, seeking a suitable training for the marts of commerce, or the professional pursuits of the land.

3. The Conference, having carefully considered the condition and management of both branches of the Academy, again records the expression of its high appreciation of the educational efficiency of this truly excellent Institution, which it cordially and earnestly commends to the generous and intelligent patronage of the christian public throughout the Lower Provinces ; and it now tenders to the Rev. Dr. Pickard, the Principal, and to the entire staff of Professors and Teachers, its thanks for the very faithful discharge of their high and important duties during another year.

4. The Conference observes with pleasure, that many of the subscribers towards the erection of the new Academy have, in the course of the year, honourably redeemed their obligations; and it now ventures to hope that those friends who have not yet fulfilled their pledges will do so at the earliest possible period, and thus prevent the diversion of the funds of this useful Institution from other and more legitimate channels, by the payment of interest on the debt which still remains.

II.-THE COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENT.

1. That the Conference learns with pleasure that the year has been one of success in this department, —that the Students have pursued their work with considerable assiduity, and that a promising class of young men has graduated; and it hopes that, in the new positions which they shall severally occupy, they may justify the reasonable anticipations founded on the high intellectual and moral training they have enjoyed, and thus induce in others a laudable effort to secure similar advantages.

2. That the Conference gladly learns that the influence of the Holy Spirit has been largely vouchsafed during the past year, and that several young persons in the different departments have experienced converting grace; and while it enjoins upon its ministers that they shall publicly and SC

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solemnly, in their pulpits, invoke the Divine blessing both upon the College and the other branches of the Institution; it recommends also to the families of our people generally, that, in approaching to God, they shall make earnest prayer that those sent forth from the halls of the Institution may, in their several spheres, become new centres of light and influence.

3. The Conference approves of the plans proposed by the Board of Trustees, for the partial endowment of professional chairs, and the establishment of Scholarships; and it pledges its members to cordial co-operation with the Board in this important movement.

. O III. --- THE THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

1. The Conference adopts the Reports of the Theological Professor, Examining Committee and Treasurer, and duly appreciates their valuable services during the past year.

2. It occasions much regret that the impaired health of Rev. C. DeWolfe, D.D., requires him to obtain a Supernumerary relation, and the Conference cannot allow him to retire from the Theological Chair without an assurance of great fraternal regard and prayerful sympathy in his affliction, and an expression of our earnest hope that by means of rest his health may be restored, and his pre-eminent gifts yet rendered highly subservient to the interests of our Church.

3. The Conference expresses its solicitude and regret that the number of suitable candidates for our ministry should be this year nunsually small, being little more than sufficient to meet the imperative exigencies of Circuit work; and again commends to our Churches the duty of beseeching Him whose sole prerogative it is, to thrust forth labourers into his harvest.

4. The Conference resolves that the Theological Students be placed under the direction of the President of the College for the present year, who shall make such arrangement as is necessary to provide for the prosecution of their studies.

5. The following shall be the course of study appointed for probationers for our ministry, and they are required to be examined (particularly upon it at the Annual District Meetings, viz :

While believing that the impoverished state of many portions of this country may account in no small degree for this deficiency, the Conference confidently hopes that, with the improved condition of our people, their support of this Institution will more fully consist with its claims upon their liberal consideration.

2. That the Conference re-affirms the following Resolutions of the past year, viz :--

(1.) That those senior members of the Conference, who do not expect to derive benefit from this Fund in the education of their children, shall pay *two dollars* annually. That all other members of the Fund shall pay an annual subscription of *three dollars*, except those who are actually receiving from the Fund, who shall pay *four dollars* per annum.

(2). That the attention of our people be especially called to this Fund, and that its claims upon their generous support be affectionately and strongly urged in all our congregations.

(3). That the Chairmen of the respective Districts be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Fund for the amounts due to the claimants within their charge.

3. That the cordial thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented to the Rev. Charles Stewart, and William B. McNutt, Esq., the Treasurers, and to the Rev. Henry Pope, (B), the Secretary of this Fund, for their faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices for the past year.

STANDING ORDERS.

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1. The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily required to procure *three* complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairmen and Secretary; one of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records, the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Connexion. Furthermore, it is required that the last-mentioned copies shall be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory Committee meeting may be appointed to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined, that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by their respective Chairmen and Scoretaries, they shall not be altered, except by the special permission of the Conference.

II.-PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

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In consequence of the annually increasing arrearages of subscriptions for the *Provincial Wesleyan*, enquiry be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such monies—the accounts previously being sent to the Chairman, and distributed at the Financial District Meetings.

III.-CANDIDATES RECOMMENDED.

Each District Chairman is required to instruct young men recommended by his District Meeting as probationers for our work, to attend the Meeting of the Committee for the examination of Candidates.

IV .- MISSIONARY LISTS.

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Each Superintendent shall be required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Nova Scotia decimal currency, a perfect list of all Missionary Monies collected on his Circuit ; and each Chairman is required to present such lists, in a state ready for publication in the Missionary Report, to the Missionary Secretary, on the day previous to the meeting of the Missionary Committee.

V.-QUARTERLY FASTS.

That the days upon which the Quarterly Fasts are to be observed through the Connexion for the following year, shall be Fridays, Oct. 2nd, Jan. 8th, March 26th, and June 25th. The Ministers are desired to hold special religions services in their principal Churches, on the Fast days, and to preach on each preceding Sabbath, a sermon on the revival of the work of God.

VI .- CLASSIFICATION OF CIRCUITS.

In regard to the classification of Circuits embraced in the Conference, the following regulations are adopted, viz :--

1. That the Circuits which receive at least one married preacher each, and meet the full expenditure, including the claims of the Children's Fund, shall be considered as constituting the *First Class*.

2. That the Circuits which receive at least one married preacher each, and meet all the claims for Circuit expenses, except that for the Children's Fund, shall be considered as constituting the Second Class.

3. That the *Third Class* shall include all other Circuits which are occupied each by a married preacher, and raise annually towards meeting Circuit expenses, not less than \$400; and also all Circuits to which unmarried men only are appointed, and which meet all the claims for Circuit expenses, including that for the Children's Fund.

Nore.—Every Circuit in the above class having had the services of an unmartied preacher four years, must be prepared then to receive a married man. 4. All other Circuits shall be considered as constituting Home Missions.

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The Chairmen of the respective Districts are directed to call the attention of the approaching Financial District Meetings to these regulations.

NOTE—The foregoing classification is one which regards the *financial concerns* of the Circuits, and not at all the standings of the ministers employed on those Circuits.

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PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA. .

BELOVED BRETHREN, DOP 10 SEADONE ME Froper of Sea

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Under the auspices of a favouring Providence, once more convened in annual Conference, we tender to you our most cordial greetings in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, your Saviour and ours. Many and various are the considerations which by a sweet constraint, as partaking "the love of the Spirit" and the gentleness of Christ, move us in our Pastorate capacity to rejoice over you as fellow citizens with the saints and of the household of God, and to "beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called."

You will rejoice to know that as another token of the judicious and affectionate regard of the Parent Connexion for our prosperity as an affiliated organization, we have had the honour and happiness during this session, to have our Presidential chair occupied by one of the most gifted sons of English Methodism, in the person of the Rev. Wm. Morley Punshon, A.M. The pre-eminent endowments of genius and of grace, by which this servant of Christ and His Church is so remarkably distinguished, have shown forth in his luminous expositions of Methodistic doctrine and polity-both in the course of Conferential deliberations and amid the more purely spiritual associations of the sanctuary, alike enlarging our conceptions of Christian duty and privilege-and inspiring us to purpose for ourselves, and to hope in your behalf, that by the grace of God we shall continue " to walk by the same rule and to mind the same thing."

On a prayerful review of the work of God throughout our nounds, our hearts have been greatly rejoiced by the indubitable evidences afforded that the Holy Ghost, the Lord and Giver of Life has been with us during the past year—giving testimony to the word of His grace, by more or less copious effusions of His saving influences upon the numerous congregations and societies committed to our care. It is our happiness to record an increase of 320 members to our church, with upwards of 2011 on trial for a similar relationship. You will gladly unite with us in devoutly ascribing all the glory to the God of our salvation—while we gratefully exclaim, "Now thanks be unto God, which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place."

We feel it to be a just occasion for deep thankfulness to God that our ministerial ranks have been unimpaired by death, except in the case of a brother beloved—the Rev. Joseph Suteliffe—who was enabled to glorify God in the fires—and efficiently equipped and led by the Captain of his salvation—triumphed in the mortal hour, and passed exultant home.

The excessive labours, peculiar in a large degree to our work, have wasted the strength of several of our more highly esteemed fellow workmen in the vineyard of the Lord, and they have been permitted to rest from Circuit work at least for a year. We confidently bespeak your prayerful remembrance of them at the throne of Grace—that by the Divine blessing they may be speedily privileged, with recruited energies, to resume their hallowed and much-loyed toil.

The painful concern occasioned by so large a reduction of our effective agency, is, however, much relieved by the provident wisdom and goodness of the Head of the Church, whose prerogative it is to supply His Church with pastors aft

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after His own heart, as evidenced by the fact that seven young men, of more than ordinary promise, having witnessed a good confession before many witnesses, have been this year solemnly set apart to the full work of the ministry among us, by prayer and the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery while four others have been received as Candidates for the same sacred office.

The manner in which several material interests of our Church have been sustained and promoted during a year of general depression in the monetary resources of the country, gives pleasing evidence that you deem it not unreasonable that, having participated in our "spiritual things"—ye should of the ability which God giveth contribute of your "carnal things," to the sustentiation and extension of the cause of God in these Provinces, and the sending forth of the Word of Life, through the agency of the Parent Missionary Society, to foreign lands. We acknowledge with gratitude the grace of God manifested by many of our beloved people, under circumstances of more than ordinary embarrassment and anxiety, of whom we can testify "How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty, abounded unto the riches of their liberality."

We have had much pleasure in renewing our annual expression of confidence in the operations of those important auxiliaries of our work, namely, the *Provincial Wesleyan* and Book Room, in Halifax, and our Educational Institutions in Sackville, and would earnestly recommend them to your increased sympathy and Patronage.

But now, beloved brethren, recalling your thoughts from the past, permit us to direct your attention to the future, and suggest the objects for which you should live—the principles by which you should be actuated, and the encourage-

ments it is your privilege to command. We sincerely trust that you are all alive to the Apostle's meaning, when he affirms, by the universality of redeeming love and the commensurate fullness of sacrificial merit in the blood of a dving Saviour, that it is the gracious purpose of our Heavenly Father "that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him which died for them and rose again." In order to the full realization of a life thus exalted in its pureness and dignity, we pray you "reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord." Be assured of this, that there is no such thing as doctrinal, sacramental, or denominational holi-Looking beyond your creed however pure-your cereness. monial observances, however scriptural in their character, or just in their performance-your Church organizations, however time-honoured and apostolic they may be-embrace Christ as all your salvation and all your desire. To receive and communicate of the grace of God to others by diligence in prayer, fidelity in instruction, and virtuousness of example is the obligation your profession devolves, and the honourable destiny your privilege bespeaks. In the various relations of life illustrate the high-toned principles of Christian morality. that ye may be proven by your own lives to be the sons of God without rebuke, holding forth under all the aspects of your intercourse with the church and the world " the word of life." By the godly training of your children, and the intelligent and pious government of your household, the sanctified observance of the Christian Sabbath, and a constant use of the more public ordinances of the Lord's House. together with a frequent waiting upon God through the social and private means of grace, seek to advance in personal piety and usefulness, -so shall your lives be admired to the glory of God. " And this we pray that your love may abound

THE ANSWER

OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1867, TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1867.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We are much refreshed in our Annual Assembly by the greetings of Conferences in other lands, in the prosperity of which we feel an interest that deepens year by year. We heartily respond to the sentiments of affection expressed in your Address; and we thank God that you continue in unabated attachment to the principles and doctrines of Methodism, and that you still emulate the zeal of our fathers, whose example is among the most precious heritages of our Church. If the Ministers and people of Methodism are faithful to their traditions, the future is full of hope.

We are not surprised to learn that commercial depression and other untoward influences, have combined to render your review of the year less satisfactory, so far as numbers are concerned, than we have desired. But we congratulate you, with gratitude to God, that in many of your Districts the Lord has been making bare His arm, and encouraging His servants by the conversion of souls and the building up of His Church. The test of success is not always numerical. The "little one," in its "day of small things" may lay up such resources of spiritual wealth, as shall fit it, in due sea. son, to "become a thousand." There can be no fear as to the ultimate success of those who earnestly contend for, and zealously publish, "the faith once delivered to the saints."

The prosperity of your educational institutions is most gratifying. We are glad to learn that your new building at Sackville has been completed, and that you are not likely to be seriously embarrassed by the results of the calamitous fire to which you referred in your Address of last year. The welfare of Methodism in your Province is involved, to a great degree, in the character of your educational efforts. Observing the vigorous and judicious administration with which this department of your work is favoured, we have no misgivings as to the future.

We rejoice that the year has passed without any thinning of your ranks by death. The necessitated retirement of honoured Ministers from active labour is not an unmixed calamity. The example of their ripened piety, and the grace of their declining years, may be as valuable to the Church as the work of their earlier and more vigorous days. Methodism owes much to its living fathers ; who, while they link it with a blessed Past, stimulate and direct it to a more glorious Future. It is our earnest prayer that, while God spares to you the venerable men whose day of active toil is over, He will continue to raise up candidates for your ministry, who shall grasp their falling standards, and carry on their work. mé

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In the midst of religious controversy and political excitement, we are endeavouring to maintain "the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace, and in righteousness of life." Standing aloof, as far as fidelity to the truth will permit, from the spheres of strife, we are seeking to fulfil our mission, by spreading scriptural holiness throughout the land. Our services, the glory of which is the presence of the Master, are truly "means of grace." In many places we have been blessed with times of refreshing. Some thousands have been added to our Societies. On every side there is the anticipation of revival. All our departments bear witness to the liberality of our people, and evince the favour of the Head of the Church. We trust that we are on the eve of days of grace, and we pray that we may be found faithful.

We assent to your earnest request, and appoint our valued brother, the Rev. William Morley Punshon, M.A., President of your next Conference. We know that you will accord to him a fitting reception; and we trust that his visit to America will be fruitful of much good to the Churches. We have pleasure in accepting your nomination of the Rev. Henry Daniel, whom we appoint as Co-Delegate. On your recommendation, we have received into full connection with our Conference the Rev. Geo. Butcher, and have appointed him to a Circuit.

We commend you and your work "to Him who is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy," in full confidence of hope that He will create upon every dwelling place of Zion, and upon your assemblies, "a cloud and smoke by day, and the shining of a flaming fire by night."

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1868, TO THE BRITISH CONFREENCE OF 1808.

VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

Your annual Address, which is ever most welcome to us, became doubly so at our present Conference, because it was received by us from the hand of one of your own body, the Rev. Wm. Morley Punshon, M.A. We heartily thank you that he, the President of our choice, has been allowed in your kindness and wise regard to our welfare to come to this part of the colonial possessions of Great Pritain ; and not only to see how we do, but also to help us forward in our great work of spreading the common salvation. With gratitude to God we inform you that our President arrived in Fredericton in health and peace. Since he landed in America his journeys have been long, and his official and other labours have been incessant ; and yet, by his unabated efficiency he exemplifies the inspired promise, " As thy days, so shall thy strength be." We think ourselves most happy, and most honoured to have in the chair of our Conference, a Brother, so widely and justly esteemed, as an eminent preacher of the gospel, an exemplary, successful, and true evangelist. Mr. Punshon is accompanied by the Rev. Dr. Nelles, the gifted Principal of Victoria College, Ontario, who has laid us under obligations by the part he has taken in our public services : and cur Conferential deliberations.

We receive with encouragement the expression of your belief that we are holding fast by the principles and doetrines of Methodism. We hope never to forfeit this character, nor expose ourselves even to the suspicion that we have departed

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from those clear and well defined views of the "Truth as it is in Jesus," which were held by our fathers. To these doctrines we adhere with unabated tenacity; and we resolve through grace, to give them still greater prominence than hitherto, because that many of whom better things might have been expected are substituting the traditions of uninspired men, for that pure Word of God, which alone can make wise unto salvation.

²¹⁴You will rejoice to know that our labour in preaching the old truth has not been ineffectual. Many delightful dying testimonies from our departed people have been witnessed during the year. "Showers of blessings" have come down on several of our Circuits. God has put his seal to our ministry, by causing numerous additions to the societies, so that the number of our members has been increased by 320, whilst there remain on trial 2011. In the Sabbath Schools there are 270 teachers, and 14,729 scholars. All these, together with the many thousands of others who constantly attend our preaching, constitute our pastoral and missionary oharge in Eastern British America one of considerable importance.

The financial position of our Connexion has assumed a grave aspect, particularly in the returns from the eastern portions of our Church. The failure of the fisheries there, and the unusual severity of last winter impoverished the people. Thus is explained the regretted diminution in the sum received for the Missionary Society. Some of our funds, however, exhibit tokens of progress, although the past year has been one of exceptional solicitude. New measures have been enacted in two of the Provinces, intended to confederate them with Canada. To these some have objected. We have learned of you to take no active part in political questions

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which are attended by strenuous partizanship. Our daily prayer is that after a brief season, confidence and mutual good feeling will every where prevail; and that general quietness will be attended by wide-spread prosperity in secular things; which God may sanctify to the enlargement and edification of his Church, throughout the spacious territory comprised in our Conference.

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Through mercy, we have to inform you that but one of our ministers—the Rev. Joseph Sutcliffe—has died during the year; but several have been compelled to seek (two it is believed only for a year) relief from the charge of a Circuit. Among those who now become Supernumeraries are our greatly beloved Theological Professor, the Rev. C. DeWolfe, D.D., who was formerly a student at your Institution at Hoxton: and the Rev. W. E. Shenstone, who for many years has been labouring in Newfoundland. These honoured Brethren we commend to your undiminished affection; as only infirmity, the inevitable sequence of the rush of years, obliges them to seek the relation of Supernumeraries.

We have been much grieved, beloved Fathers and Brethren, to learn that you have lately sustained the loss, by death, of several honoured ministers. Of these we cannot forbear to mention the names of the Rev. John Hannah, D.D., the Rev John Scott, the Rev. Robert Spence Hardy, and the Rev. T. H. Squance. Fragrant and precious is their memory. It is impossible that they should be forgotten in our life time. The rich fruit of their lengthened and holy toil is found in every part of the Methodism of our empire, widely as it extends, and even beyond its ample pale. We glorify God for His grace bestowed on these His servants. We trust, and will not fear, that as the residue of the Spirit is with Him, He will take of the spirit that was upon them

and put it upon others of those who serve Him, that as it used to be said, it may still be seen, "God buries His workmen, but carries on His work."

One of the interests of our Connexion to which we have given our best attention, is that of our Educational Institutions. The new Academy, to replace the edifice destroyed by fire, has been opened for the classes during the year. In appearance, no less than in adaptation, it is allowed to be an improvement on the original. Great changes in the laws relating to Education have lately been made in some of these Provinces. It is believed that these have had the effect of lessening the attendance of youths at our Academy. But as our staff of instructors is efficient, and we are determined by adopting the best modes of instruction, and by aiming at the highest ends in our Academy and College, to preserve for them the confidence which they have hitherto obtained. We hope shortly to have our classes for education well filled ; for our conviction deepens, that nothing is more important to a family-a church-a country, than to have its youth highly educated upon Christian principles. In our praverful deliberations on this subject we have derived valuable assistance from the extended experience, and acknowledged success. of the estimable Principal of Victoria College.

We sympathize with you in the anxiety occasioned by the unsettled state of the Laws for Public Instruction in England. We deprecate any changes therein which should impair that noble effort for the good of the nation, which has so greatly prospered by the watchful care of your Committee of Education. Your Home Missionary proceedings command our admiration. We are striving to establish a "Home Mission Fund, the operations of which are urgently needed in the sparsely-settled portions of our country. Our progress

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herein has been necessarily slow, for there are more demands on our limited resources, than will admit of our accomplishing every object that Christian zeal, the love of Christ, and the love of souls, would prescribe.

At this Session of our Conference we have set apart by ordination to the work of the ministry seven young men, who have passed the usual period of probation with much credit, and usefulness. These brethren have undergone a good examination on those subjects which we deem essential to ministerial reputation and power. In their preparation for our work several of them derived great benefit from the lectures of our Professor of Theology, and the tuition of the other members of the Faculty of Wesley College, Sackville. We have also received on probation four Candidates to our ministry, all of whom have been appointed to Circuits.

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The session has been one of earnest and thorough attention to our diversified business. The utmost kindness has been manifested by the Brethren towards each other. We all admire the ability, and courtesy, with which our President so agreeably leads our conversations, and discussions. The religious exercises have been numerously attended. They have been from the beginning times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. We hope soon to enter on the spheres of duty which shall have been allotted to each of us. May we have a large supply of the spirit, not of fear, but of power and of love, and of a sound mind. Soon you will be holding again your annual assembly. May the God of our Fathers endow you with all needful wisdom, that you may know how to act for the advancement of His kingdom in the eventful times which have come upon us, and that, whether or not the boasted theories of men who obey not the Gospel of Christ, shall be suffered more extensively to influence the world, both you and we may be found not unworthy to be employed by the Master of us all, in doing His work upon earth with ever increasing tokens of His acceptance and sanction.

By a unanimous and hearty vote of the Conference, we heg to nominate the Rev. William Morley Punshon, M.A., for our President next year. We have proved him no less skillful and considerate in the Chair, than able and edifying in the Pulpit. We request therefore his reappointment as our President, which will afford to us great satisfaction, and be in all probability, by God's blessing, highly advantageous to our work. With much cordiality we designate for your approval the Rev. Henry Pope, Jr., for Co-Delegate of our Conference, which is appointed to be held in Charlottetown in 1869.

Receive, dear Fathers and Brethren, our renewed assurance of filial and fraternal love. The bonds which unite us to you are as strong as ever, they are equally permanent and endearing. We acknowledge the trust which we have received from you and from the Lord. To this trust it shall be our endeavour to be faithful. The time with some of us is short. May we all have grace from Him whose we are, and whom we serve, to be "faithful even unto death."

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OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE IN THE PRO-VINCES OF ONTARIO AND QUEBEC, TO THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE IN THE PROVINCES OF NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK, &C.

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REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We have listened with delight to your truly fraternal Address. The condial reception given to the beloved Brother who conveyed to you our greetings, has been highly gratifying to us. We rejoice, that your field of labor, in common with the general area of Methodistic ground, has been favoured with religious prosperity in its best and most desirable forms.

The patriotic sentiments which you have uttered, and the interest which, as fellow subjects, you take in the Dominion, have afforded us much pleasure. We cordially co-operate with you in this matter. We are moreover fully persuaded that a truly Evangelical ministry is designed and fitted to give every man a properly enlightened conscience; and thus to provide the best safeguard of the person, the character, the property, the rights and privileges of our fellow-countrymen. We believe that the truth as it is in Jesus can, more than any thing else, promote that delightful union of personal freedom with united submission to law, which is specially exhibited in the loved and honored country that presides over us, and which foreign visitors have looked on with wonder and admiration.

We rejoice still more that your best energies are devoted to the spiritual and eternal interests of men. In these days of ceremonial eccentricity, of unenlighted Rationalism, and other "childish things," it is peculiarly cheering to see the various branches of Methodist Christianity manifesting the ancient and apostolical zeal for the promotion of the glory of God by the salvation of men; pointing them to a divine Redeemer, a divine Pardoner, a divine Sanctifier, that they may obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory. We, too, make the salvation of souls the grand end, and the divine Gospel plan, the grand means.

By the liberality of our members we have been enabled to take up a new Mission in the Red River Settlement, and one to the savage tribe of Blackfeet Indians near the Rocky Mountains. We are giving increased attention to the religious instruction of Juveniles, under the deep and solemn conviction that the Christian Church has, in many places, lost through negligence, from the families of her own members, more than the number of aduks gained from the world by revival efforts. We have held several Sabbath School Conventions during the past year, and purpose to hold them in future in connexion with every May District Meeting.

We have 810 Sabbath Schools, an increase of 89; 54,034 Scholars, an increase of 5839; of these 7518 are over 16 years of age, an increase of 1600; and 4310 meet in class, an increase of 704. Our church membership is 60,400, an increase of 1943. Qur Ministers and Preachers number 638; of these 21 have been ordained at this Conference, and 29 received on trial.

Six Preachers have been favored with permission to avail themselves, for this year, of the advantages of Victoria University. We regret that these do not yet include the tuition of a Theological Professor. We confidently expect, however, that the time is near when such a Chair will be established. We congratulate you, Dear Brethren, on being in advance of us in this important matter.

We are endeavouring by the organization of a Home Mission Fund to make provision for such portions of this wide field; and the employments of agencies upon a Home Mission Basis.

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To the practical wisdom and sanctified gifts of our beloved President, we are indebted for the harmony and hallowed interest of a Conference which will be long remembered in this city. We cannot but feel that under the same Presidency we are linked into closer union.

We have cordially welcomed the Rev. Dr. Nellis, known to us especially in connection with the successful administration of Victoria University.

Imploring on your behalf and also on ourselves, the spirit of power, of love and of a sound mind, we remain Reverend and Dear Brethren, yours in the bonds of the Gospel.
