Member for Bonaventure Interrogates Minister of Marine and Fisheries

Last Thursday Mr. Chas. Marcil, the member for Bonaventure took up-in the House of Commons the matter of issuing licenses for the fishing of salmon in tidal waters. The question and Mr. Hazen's reply are given be-

CHARLES MARCIL: Mr. Speaker, will you allow me, on this motion, to ask a question of my hon. friend the Minister of Marine Fisheries (Mr. Hazen) of some urgen-cy to my constituency? I intended do-ing so yesterday, but the sudden ad-journment of the House prevented me, It is regarding the issuing of licenses for salmon fishing in the tidal waters of Quebec. There is some doubt existing as to whether these licenses are to be issued by the provincial Government or by the Ottawa Government. Notices have appeared in the Canada Gazette, and I have received a number of letters on the point. I would ask the minister if he would kindly tell us how the matter stands.

Mr. HAZEN: I shall be very glad to give the information to my hon. friend from Bonaventure (Mr. Marcil). My hon. friend, with the courtesy which always distinguishes him, intimated to me yesterday that he would ask this question, and I had prepared a little statement so that the facts might be absolutely accurate. In 1898, in a reference known as the Fisheries Reference, to the Privy Council, a decision was given to the effect that whatever property interests in the fisheries were held by the different provinces prior to Confederation remained vested in them subsequent to it but that the exclusive sequent to it, but that the exclusive power to legislate or make regulations governing the conduct of the fisheries vested in the Federal Government. As soon as that decision was given or immediately afterwards, all the provinces claimed the fisheries, not only in the tidal as well as the non-tidal portions of all the rivers, but in the bays and in the three-mile limit as well. AUDACIOUS, THOUGHT SUNK, WAS SAVED AND TO REJOIN FLEET



The Audacious, one of Great Britam's finest and most powerful battle ships of the superdreadnoughts, which was supposed to have been sunk in the North Sea, is reported to be safe in Belfast and will rejoin the guard fleet again.

The mighty first line war vessel of the Royal Navy did not rise like Venus from the sea, as might be supposed from the reliterated reports of her destruction off the North Irish coast on October 27 last.

In the light of the news received from England the Audacious, although badly crippled either by a German torpedo or affice, was not sink. With her wounded bull bound in collision mats and the gaping hole below the water line adequately plugged, she remained affoat and was safely guided into drydock, several hours in the wake of the Olympic, of the White Star Lote, which put about in response to the battle ship's radio signal of distress.

CHARLES MARCIL: Mr. Speaker, will you allow me, on this motion, to ask a question of my hon. friend the Minister of Marine and Fisheries (Mr. Hazen) of some urgency to my constituency? I intended doing so yesterday, but the sudden adjournment of the House prevented me. It is regarding the issuing of licenses for salmon fishing in the tidal waters of Ouelea. There is some doubt exof Quebec. There is some doubt existing as to whether these licenses are to be issued by the provincial Government or by the Ottawa Government. Notices have appeared in the Canada Gazette, and I have received a number of letters on the point. I would ask the minister if he would kindly tell us how the matter stands.

Mr. HAZEN: I shall be very glad to give the information to my hon. friend from Bonaventure (Mr. Marcil). My hon. friend, with the courtesy which always distinguishes him, intimwhich always distinguishes him, intimated to me yesterday that he would nak this question, and I had prepared a little statement so that the facts might be absolutely accurate. In 1898, in a reference known as the Fisheries Reference, to the Privy Council, a decision was given to the effect that whatever property interests in the fisheries were held by the different provinces prior to Confederation remained vested in them subsequent to it, but that the exclusive power to legislate or make regulations power to legislate or make regulations governing the conduct of the fisheries is vested in the Federal Government. As soon as that decision was given, or immediately afterwards, all the provinces claimed the fisheries, not well. The officers of the department in Ottawa, however, contended that, while there was no question about the

AUDACIOUS, THOUGHT SUNK, WAS SAVED AND TO REJOIN FLEET



THE AUDACIOUS

The Audacious, one of Great Britain's fluest and most powerful battle ships of the superdreadnoughts, which was supposed to have been sunk in the North Sen. Is reported to be safe in Belfast and will rejoin the guard fleet again.

The mighty first line war vessel of the Royal Navy did not rise like Venus from the sea, as might be supposed from the relierated reports of her destruction off the North Irish coast on October 27 last.

In the light of the news received from England the Audacious, although badly crippled either by a German torpedo or mine, was not sunk. With her wounded hull bound in collision mats and the gaping hole below the water line adequately plugged, she remained affoat and was safely guided into drydock, several hours in the wake of the Olympic, of the White Star 150, which put about in response to the battle ship's radio signal of distress.
