THE OPPOSITION'S OPPOR-TUNITY

The Opposition convention to be held in St. John next Monday and Tuesday will mean much for New Brunswick. Ever since the disgraceful revelations of two years ago, when Mr. Dugal made his charges of wrongdoing in the Legislature, thinking people throughout the province have been demanding cleaner, better government. They have looked in vain to the new Premier and the new Attorney General, who instead of following up their professions of reform, were content to sit in silence and watch the Flemming wing of their party condone the conduct of their ex-Premier that had met with such condemnations at the hands of the Royal Commission that investigated the Dugal charges.




