
HYDROPHOBIA CURED.—A correspondent from the Detroit *Zealand* describes the case of a fearful case of hydrophobia, which he cured by means of the following remedy:—The patient, resembling like a dog, "frothing at the mouth, and making strenuous efforts to eat everything that came near. During these convulsions the patient would bite the pillows from his bed in his teeth, and shake and rend them with the raging ferocity of an angry dog. An abundant supply of water was administered by the rectum, and the patient gradually subsided. The doctors decided to place the patient under the same treatment which had been successful in a former case, and, lo! there, to his aid it may be to others to suffer from this disease, we here give as follows.—The injection under the skin of the neck of a solution of the administration of large doses of castor oil which is a powerful anti-spasmodic, and one grain of the sulphate of morphine was injected under the skin in four hours, and half a drachm of powdered castor oil mixed with xylol, given internally. In about half an hour, when the convulsions returned at intervals of an hour to an hour and a half, till nine o'clock Sunday morning, when last convulsion occurred, after which the patient suffered severely from obstinate vomiting until Monday at two o'clock, when he gradually subsided, leaving the patient comparatively easy, but very much prostrated. LARGE GOLD CAKES FROM VICTORIA.
