BIRCHELL AT EASTWOOD.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 7.—When the court resumed at 1 o'clock p.m. the prisoner Birchell was arraigned.

George Hay testified as follows: Live at Windsor, Ont. Am brakeman on the Grand Trunk Railway. I have seen the prisoner before—on Monday, Feb. 17. at Eastwood station, on the G. T. R., west of Princeton about six miles. My train was coming east. It was about eight minutes late leaving Woodstock, which is five miles west from Eastwood. I saw Birchell on the platform at Eastwood when I got off the train. It was Conductor Charles McArthur's train. Birchell was standing on the platform; he was the only passenger ply to the charges against the Parnellites.

After consultation the prisoner was allowed to remain here until the morning under police surveillance, to enable her counsel to interview the Attorney-General and see if bail could be arranged. Mrs. Birchell is looked upon by the people as being an innocent woman to the crime, and has been duped by her husband into a marriage, and the hearts of the citizens go out in sympathy for her. As the excitement ran high this afternoon quite a few hisses were heard when Detective Murray was contending that bail be not allowed.



STEAMER ASHORE. A White Cross Liner in a Bad Place-The Crew Safe

Boston, March 7.—The Belgian steamship DeRuyter, Capt. Arftlin, of the White Cross Line, which left Antwerp in February with a cargo of iron, glass and rags for Boston, went ashore on the reef off Scituate ton, went ashore on the reef off Scituate Harbor. There was a thick snow storm, and the ship mistook the light on Minot's Reef for that at entrance of Boston Harbor, and steered south instead of north. The crew of 27 men came ashore safely.

The DeRuyter's captain supposed he was four miles from shore. Without warning the vessel struck, and almost instantly was high and fast on the sand bottom.
