

CANADA'S CHEESE EXPORT.

It is gratifying to know that the export trade in Canadian cheese has been very successful this year. Up to date the exports from the port of Montreal to Great Britain have exceeded \$5,000,000 in value, and there is still left the August, September and October product to market. Up to the present time factorymen have experienced no difficulty in selling their goods at renunerative prices, and it remains to be seen if the fall make is taken off their hands as readily as that of the past three nonths has been. Upon this point there is a great diversity of opinion, some is a great diversity of opinion, some of the Montreal leading men in the trade, according to the Trade Bulletin, "maintaining that a great deal of the buying of late has been more on speculative than consumptive account, and the retail buyers have been pretty well stocked. If this be true, and the retailers in Great Britain have been induced to buy, on an average, say five boxes each over their present requirements, it would mean a remendous quantity put on one side. If retailers have anticipated their wants to the extent reported, that fact alone will account for the promptness with which the heavy landings in England have of late gone into the hands of retailers; but at the same time this fact has been misleading, as the stock has not gone into immediate conumption, but a large portion of it is being stored for future requirements. On the other hand, it is claimed that owing to the healthy condition of trade in England and the fine weather suitable for outdoor work, the consumption of cheese has been simply phenomenal, and that the amount of stock in the hands of retailers is not as large as many believe. An Act That Seems to Have Been Lost Sight Ot.

Recent events in connection with a baby farming establishment in this city set Sheriff Mackellar a-hunting among the laws of the land, dead and alive. He found that in the time of James 1. an act of Farliament was passed making it legal to put illegitimate children to death. That law was certainly more convenient and perhaps more merciful than the medern way of getting rid of the unfortunates. Of course the law was repealed long ago.

But in 1887 the Legislature of Ontario passed an act, chapter 26, which directs that "it shall not be lawful for any person to retain or receive for hire or reward more than one infant, and in case of twins more than one infant, and in case of twins more than two infants, under the age of 1 year, for the purpose of nursing or maintaining such infants apart from their parents for a longer period than 24 hours, except in a house which has been registered as herein provided."

Clause 2 provides that "the municipal council of every local municipalty shall aceps a register of the names of persons applying to register for the purposes of this set, and therein shall cause to be registered.

I question whether the American did not derive the bigger profit. Within the last few days I notice that one of the Canadian lines has reduced its charge to 30 shillings, which is likely to result in a general reduction, but this will not affect the profits of those who have already sold."
