



The same temple also yielded portions of Sanskrit manuscripts on birch bark, which were of far earlier date, and had no doubt been imported from India. There were further discovered some excellentlypreserved large rolls bearing Buddhist texts in Chinese, and having on the reverse side what was evidently a translation into the unknown language of old Khotan. It may prove that these will furnish the long-desired clue whereby the latter language may be deciphered.



The Japanese trench is about 30 yards down the hill from this one, and the zigzag saps lead from this right down to the valley below and up the opposite hill, which is roughly 700 to 800 yards from 203 Metre Hill itself. The remains of the sandbags can still be seen. The whole face of the hill is deeply pitted and scored with shell craters, and the yellow splashes caused by the bursting of the shells are still plainly visible. Practically every boulder is splashed with bullet marks, In the remains of the trenches one can still see bits of old leather belts, uniforms, etc. Cartridge cases and clips bespatter the whole hillside, and the human remains are very numerous. I

Hand grenades are still to be found. piping, sealed and provided with a small bit of fuse. They were filled with dynamite or any other explosive that was procurable. They are still said to be very dangerous.




